### **Keeping Kiel** Canal Clear.

Constant Care is Necessary to Keep Artificial Waterways in Working

In this war canals are perhaps of more frequent importance than railways, the Kiel Canal to the Germans and the Suez Canal to the British Government in Egypt. It is not generally known what enormous difficulties have to be faced in the endeavour to keen these canals clear.

The Germans have spent a gigantic sum on their Kiel Canal, which carries their ships from the North Sea to the Baltic. Just before they made this war they had widened it at a cost of fifteen millions.

Our American friends have great anxieties over the Culebra Cut, in the Panama but not more so than the Germans over their boasted waterway. For the ground through which he latter is cut is in most places which keeps on breaking up and fall-





### Germans Fear the Allied Fleet.

Admiral Von Koester Says Fleet Must Only Accept Battle When it Can Reckon on Victory.

Berlin, via London, Feb. 7.-Grand Admiral Von Koester, President of the German Navy League, in an address at Kiel University to-day, declared that the relative strength of the German fleet, compared to the Anglo-French-Russian fleet, is perhaps one

"We are full of the firmest confidence in our fleet." said Admiral Von Koester, "but we know that a sea battle means death or victory, and that a destroyed fleet cannot be replaced in the course of the war, even if it lasts for years. We must, therefore, under all conditions, be cautious in our procedure and not allow, ourselves to be incited to no deed which might eventuate in our defeat.

"For what would be the situation if a sea battle took place to-morrow in which each one of our ships took a hostile ship to the bottom with it, and perhaps some others? Then we should be without a fleet and England could proceed gradually in its attacks Emden to Memel would be most severely threatened. Landing attempts, if they were sufficiently well prepared, could succeed at places most un-

omfortable to us. "Our fleet must protect us under all nditions, and may accept battle only when it can reckon on victory." In conclusion, Admiral Von Koeser said the fact that Admiral Fisher, the British First Sea Lord, had not changed the plans that were being oursued by Prince Louis of Battenburg, the former First Sea Lord, can be taken as showing England's ntention to dictate terms of peace ventually with its fleet."


