



The first despatch from General Haig, the Com-mander-in-Chief of the British forces in France, He pays in it two well-merited tri-butes to others. He has nothing but the highest praise to bestow on the resolute gallantry which the French have displayed during the past three months in defending Verdun against the continuous and fierce onslaughts of the Germans. This brilliant defence is one of the finest pages in French military history, and well deserves the praises which have been bestowed on it by the British Commander-in-Chief. It is by far the most notable military section on the serves and in this way honour the men who, mander-in-Chief. It is by far the most notable military section on the Western front during the past three months. General Haig states the British forces were called upon to aid only indirectly. The British took over part of the French trenches elsewhere, and enabled the relieved soldiers to be utilized in the defence of Verdun. This transfer was year given. Verdun. This transfer was very suc-cessful owing to the way it was carried on, and, particularly so, General Haig says, to the fact that the Germans were too much occupied elsewhere to give attention to it. He speaks of it as a delicate action, which might have been seriously disturbed had the Germans shown themselves on the offensive when the changes on the offensive when the changes were taking place. Outside of this the British forces since General Haig's accession to the Chief Command have been engaged in a very large number of what would appear to be minor operations as compared with the mighty operations around Verdun, but which were large undertakings as compared with battles of the past. 


