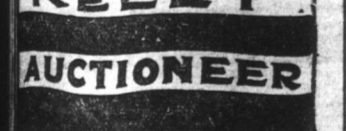

Lloyd George Uses Harsh Language.

"Criminal Maliginity" for Personal Ends--Lord Northcliffe Cables Denial to King George--Less Tension Between Britain and France.

REPUTATIONS ALLEGED

LONDON, July 29. Lloyd George, in the House of Commons today, read a statement, attributed to the King, concerning the Government's Irish policy, reported interview in the United States by Lord Northcliffe, to be a fabrication. The statement is as follows: "His Majesty the King has had his attention directed to certain statements, reporting an interview with Lord Northcliffe, appearing in the Daily Mail, and reproduced in the Daily Express and some newspapers. The statements contained in the report are a complete fabrication. No such conversation as those which are alleged, took place between His Majesty and Lord Northcliffe. His Majesty also desires it to be made clear, contrary to the suggestion in the interview, that in his capacity as King he has followed the invariable constitutional practice. Relating to the Thronon in Parliament, Lord George continued, "I am sure that this statement may do much to sterilize the effects of a maliginity which, for personal ends, is endeavouring to stir up animosity between the Allies, and understanding between the British court in Limerick in June last for having ammunition in his possession. The Crown attorney said appeal from the decision of the Master of the Rolls was possible, but the Master said, re-

"Well then you must come to some agreement with them," said the King, according to the interview. "This thing can't go on. I can't have my people killed in this manner."

NORTHCLIFFE DENIES INTERVIEW.

WASHINGTON, July 29. Lord Northcliffe made public today the following cablegram sent to Lord Stamfordham, private secretary to King George: "Please convey to His Majesty, with my humble duty, my denial of ever having ascribed to His Majesty word or words, as stated by the Prime Minister yesterday. I gave no such interview."

MILITARY OFFICERS CHARGED WITH CONTEMPT.

DUBLIN, July 29. The Master of the Rolls today issued writ of attachment against Sir General Nevill MacReady, commander of British troops in Ireland, Major-General Sir Edward Strickland, Division Commander, and others for failure to comply with writs of Habeas Corpus ordered by the Master of the Rolls on Tuesday last, demanding the production in Court to-day of John Egan, sentenced to death by military court in Limerick in June last for having ammunition in his possession. DAILY EIREANN TO MEET

DUBLIN, July 29. It now seems certain that summoning of the "Irish Republican Parliament" to consider the British terms, will be one of the very next steps to be taken in connection with the peace negotiations, although the calling of Daily Eireann for this purpose is not likely to occur immediately, no date having yet been fixed. The apparent fact that such session had been decided upon, encourages the hope here that negotiations will prove fruitful. No application has as yet been made for the release of those members who are still in prison.

CIVIL WAR IN CHINA.

PEKING, July 29. Fear of a general uprising along the Yang-Tse-Kiang River is felt here as a result of hostilities between provinces of Hunan and Hupoh, the former under control of the Canton, or Southern Chinese Government, and the latter under the jurisdiction of the Peking, or duly constituted Government. Troops from Huan have invaded Hupoh with the evident intention of ousting Wang Chan Yuen, Inspector Commissioner of the two provinces. Wang Chan Yuen is one of three "War Lords," who recently caused reorganization of the Peking Government. General Fu Pei Fu, commander of Government troops in Hunan, and idol of the Hordes, has been ordered to lead the advance on Hupoh.

A JOHN HOPKINS EDICT.

BALTIMORE, July 29. The Board of Trustees of John Hopkins Hospital yesterday issued the following edict: "The maximum fee that any surgeon ought to charge for an operation, no matter how wealthy the patient may be, is one thousand dollars. The maximum charge that any physician ought to make for attending patients in hospital is thirty-five dollars a week."

PREMIERS AND NAVAL DEFENCE.

LONDON, July 29. While no official statement has been issued, it is understood that the Conference of Imperial Premiers has reached agreement on the naval policy of Empire Conference, and reaffirmed the scheme whereby each Dominion is responsible for its own defense coastally.

BRITAIN'S REPLY TO FRANCE.

LONDON, July 29. Great Britain's note to France regarding the Silesian problem, delivered in Paris this afternoon, is described by officials as of a friendly character, in marked contrast to the attitude displayed in the French note, to which it is the reply. Great Britain, officials declared, is still anxious to consider any means by which the French can be met, but it is emphasized that, according to the news received in London, there is no danger threatening French troops in Silesia which renders the sending of reinforcements urgently necessary, as the French have claimed. The note calls attention to what is described as the extraordinary action on the part of France in endeavoring to act independently of the Supreme Council, in insisting upon an immediate despatch of troops.

Pawn Their War Medals

Toronto, July 26.—The Globe this morning publishes the following in its news columns: "War medals issued to Canadian veterans for the great war are already beginning to find their way into pawnshops and also into the hands of collectors and stores which supply collectors in great numbers. In one downtown store there are to be seen several D. C. M.'s, a number of M. M.'s, Mons Star, Victory medals, General Service medals and others. Even the Mother's medal finds a place. "One veteran who received his medals not long ago, consisting of the Military Medal, the Victory and General Service Medals, promptly took them to a store and received \$7 for them. "In a good many cases, the medals have been sold because the recipient was in actual want and had nothing else of value to dispose of. In very few cases have medals pawned been redeemed, and most of them have been sold outright. In place of remaining in the possession of the men who won them, they will ultimately become the property of collectors."

Household Notes.

If the percolator is clogged up, pour coarse salt into the coffee holder and scrub the stopped-up perforations. Then hold it under the hotwater faucet.

If a piece of watermelon is left after serving, press a sheet of waxed paper over the surface and, just before serving again, cut off a thin slice and discard it.

The washerwoman often forgets what to starch and what not. If you tack up a typed list of directions over the laundry tubs, much annoyance and trouble will be avoided.

A granite kettle may be mended with a dress snap. Put the ball through the hole and snap on other side. Rivet with a few light hammer strokes until secure.

Scoop out the centers of ripe tomatoes and fill with a mixture of chopped olives, celery and cubes of veal loaf marinated with salad dressing. Serve on crisp lettuce.

Ground steak seasoned with salt, pepper, chopped onion and parsley may be combined with boiled macaroni, shaped into balls, sauted and served with tomato sauce.

A delicious way in which to serve cantaloupes is to chill, cut in halves, remove seeds. Then sprinkle each half with a small bit of nutmeg and place in the center two tablespoons strained honey.

A Gift to the Blind.

The handing over of Waterford Hall by Sir Edgar Bowring to be used as an institution for the Blind in Newfoundland, is one more instance of that noble philanthropy of that gentleman, whose every desire seems to be in the direction of doing some great public good for those who can least help themselves. The blind are practically helpless. No mere affliction of the senses equals loss of sight. One may be deaf or dumb, but these ill are comparatively nothing compared with living for ever in great darkness. But a ray of hope shines through the blackness of life and the blind can now be trained to many professions of handicraft. Though the curtain before their eyes may never be lifted, yet science has discovered a way to make their lives less a burden to them by inventing processes whereby they are enabled to employ their hands and mental talents in the production of various articles of value and perform other light work which only requires training under experienced teachers. Some of the work done at institutions for the blind is marvelous, and ere long it is to be hoped that with Government and private subscriptions the first blind manual training school in Newfoundland will be well under way, amply and capably staffed, and with all the inmates that can be accommodated.

When it is considered that wonderful work has been accomplished by the School in Halifax, at which many Newfoundlanders attended, ample scope for a similar institution in St. John's, though necessarily on a much smaller scale at the beginning. But that it will assume larger proportions as the years go on cannot be doubted. Waterford Hall is the most ideal site that could be selected for the inauguration of this educational department, and under the supervision of Mr. John Weir, who for many years was connected with the Halifax Institution, and who has therefore the experience and knowledge required to manage our local St. Dunstan's, the school is bound to be the success which its promoters hope for it. The co-operation of the public will be needed in this venture, probably to a greater extent than their generosity has hitherto demanded, for this school is not for a day or a year, but for all time. It has come to stay, and the training of the blind may now be regarded as a perpetual duty for Newfoundland to perform. Quoting from a Circular issued by Mr. Weir, addressed to the Blind of Newfoundland, he says: "The branches of instruction taught at the outset, or introduced during the first two or three years, will probably include, for the males, Broom-making, Rug-making, Mattress-making, Hammock and Net-making; and for the females, Art Fabric Weaving, Cane Chair Seating, Knitting and Hand and Machine Sewing. During a limited period of training the learners will have their board, lodging and washing supplied at the institution, free of charge. Other inmates of the institution will also be taught to read books, printed in dotted characters (Braille) to represent letters, and to operate an ordinary typewriter, so as to be enabled to write their own letters to friends." To every blind person in the Colony, qualified for admission, a questionnaire has been mailed, so that a complete record of every individual case of blindness will be kept in the archives of the institution. Other instructions have also been distributed through clergymen, doctors and others, and in this

way it is hoped to reach, directly, all those who suffer from loss of sight, or partial loss. There are many details to be carried out before the establishment can take place, but with ready co-operation and assistance, it need not be overlong, ere those of the blind who can be accommodated will be in quarters. And all will primarily be due to the generous action of the benefactor of Newfoundland, to whom all honor is due.

Police Court.

A drunk was discharged for being drunk and disorderly, a man was fined \$5 or 10 days. For furious driving on the Topsail road, a motorist was fined \$10 or 10 days. For not stopping his motor, whilst near a stationary street car, a man was fined \$5. For refusing to support his wife, a man was ordered to find bonds for \$200. A boy was charged with driving a motor car without a license. Mr. G. W. B. Ayre for the defendant said he had driven the car because his father was ill. The Inspector General claimed that this was not the accused's first offense but as the summons was made out for Thursday only, he withdrew the case.

It is certainly about time that something was done to keep these war trophies from becoming a menace to children playing about and to care for them, as relics of this kind should be looked after.

NOT QUITE CORRECT.

In the judgement in the Game and Inland Fisheries Board case published in this morning's News, Judge Morris is represented as having said that it was no offence to jig a fish for the pot. Editorial comment was made on this statement but through some oversight, the copy of the judgement sent the News did not contain the word "grivous" before offence as was the case in the original document. This of course, alters the whole meaning of the sentence.

AUCTION OF MOTOR CARS.

Two motor cars and a truck were put up for auction to-day by Mr. W. O'D. Kelly at his auction rooms, Adelaide Street, but only one car was sold. This was an old model Maxwell well and fetched \$250. A Chalmers car which had a reserve price of \$1,000 did not get a bid and the same applies to a Maxwell truck.

UNFORTUNATE GIRL RELEASED.

We understand that arrangements have been made whereby the unfortunate girl sent to the Penitentiary yesterday for vagrancy, will be released to-day. Indignation was rife all over town yesterday in connection with this case, and it will no doubt be a source of general satisfaction that some people have been kind enough to look after the unfortunate girl, deserted by her inhuman father, and the wretched father of her child.

SCHOONER ASHORE.

A message was received to-day by the Superintendent of the Lighthouse Department, saying that the schooner Alice Roberts, M. Morris, master, from Bonne Bay, went ashore 100 yards West of the Lighthouse at Sandy Point at 8:30 a.m. The message further added that the schooner was lying easily and not making any water. It was expected that she would be refloated at high tide.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

INGONISH THREATENED.
SYDNEY, N.S., July 29. First reports of the destruction of the village of New Haven, sixty miles north of here, were exaggerated, according to information received here to-day. The fire burned an area twenty miles in length and five in width, in the District of Neil's Harbor on the Cape Breton Coast, but destroyed only a few buildings and houses in New Haven. Neil's Harbor was not damaged. The fire is said to be threatening Ingonish.

WOMAN EXECUTED.
LONDON, July 30. Mrs. J. W. Lindsay, widow of a Cork land owner, who was kidnapped from her home in Coachford on February last by three armed men, was executed as a spy, according to information received this evening by Daily Eireann Authorities.

AGREES WITH BRITAIN.
OTTAWA, July 29. The committee on foreign affairs of the Chamber of Deputies to-day discussed the Silesian question, and decided to adhere to the British view, point of not sending more troops to Upper Silesia prior to a meeting of the Allied Supreme Council.

AN INVOLVED CASE.
LONDON, July 30. Eamonn De Valera still is silent. Another day has passed with no word from the Irish Republican leader. Temporarily, peace negotiations have been overshadowed by the extraordinary action of military authorities in Ireland. With General Sir Neville McCreevy, Major General Sir Edward Strickland and others, in defying the Master of the Rolls, by failing to comply with writs of habeas corpus, which he ordered in connection with the sentencing to death of John Egan, reported as the spiriting away of Egan from Limerick fall to an unknown place, what action the court will take is the subject of discussion, as the arrest of those concerned for contempt of court, it is believed, would involve legal technicalities connected with the operation or otherwise, of martial law.

UP TO CANADA.
OTTAWA, July 29. Cancellation of war legislation in the United States, including the right granted Canadian fishing vessels to use United States ports equally with American fishing vessels, is understood, now engaging the serious consideration of the federal cabinet. In 1918, to assist in the successful prosecution of the war, Canadian and United States Governments granted Canadian and American fishing vessels the right to make equal use of ports of both countries. The withdrawal of the United States, which became effective July 15, leaves fishing vessels of that country still enjoying privileges of Canadian ports, while Canadian vessels are refused the courtesies of American ports. Just what decision the federal cabinet will reach is not known, but as nearly as can be ascertained in circles close to the Government, it is probable that inasmuch as United States Government has withdrawn privileges hitherto accorded Canadian fishing vessels in United States ports, the Canadian Government will adopt a similar policy.

BRITISH YACHTS WIN.
RYDE, ISLE OF WIGHT, July 29. Great Britain won the first race, sailed to-day, in the international six metre yacht race for the British-American cup, British yachts outscoring those from the United States

on points. The race was sailed in squally weather.

VOLUNDA WRECKED.
SYDNEY, July 29. At 2.05 this morning the steamer Volunda, 1055 tons, Captain James Melkie, went ashore on Neil's Harbor Point, while bound from Sydney to Montreal, with twenty five hundred tons of coal, and is expected to be a total loss. The Volunda is owned, and was built by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co.

RETREAT CUT OFF.
SMYRNA, Asia Minor, July 29. The retreat of Turkish Nationalists, operating on Irmid Peninsula, is reported to have been cut off by Greek columns, which have appeared some ninety miles north of Eski Shehr, according to advices received here to-day.

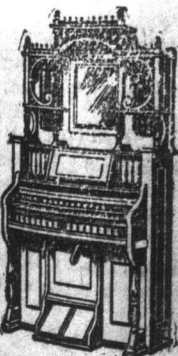

CONSIDERABLE BUSINESS DONE.

There was a large attendance at last night's Regatta meeting held in the P. A. Amoury. 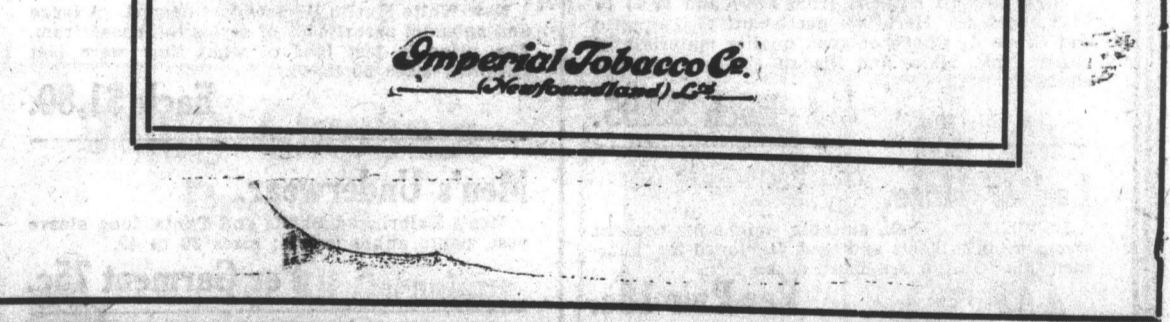

Legislative Council.
FRIDAY, July 29th.
The Council met at 4 p.m. The Committee on the Bill entitled "An Act for the protection of Neglected and Delinquent Children" sat, and after a short debate rose and reported progress.
The Bill ratifying a contract with the Pulp and Paper Corporation of America, went through the Committee Stage.
The second reading of the Railway Bill was then moved by Hon. George Shea, who reviewed the situation leading up to the present bill. He said that last year the Reid Co. had fought the Government to a standstill, and we were threatened with a stoppage of the railway. A Commission had to be appointed, the results of which were most unsatisfactory as far as the Colony was concerned. The work of that Commission having terminated, the position now was that the railway operation is again brought to a standstill. Another temporary arrangement had to be thought of, which was embraced in the bill. What the future of the railway would be, he said, remained in the lap of the gods. It was unfortunate, Mr. Shea said, that when the Bill was before the Lower House, it assumed a strong partisan hue. The Government had invited the Opposition to sit on a conference to consider a railway policy, but it refused. The Prime Minister was forced to get Sir George Bury here for a short period to investigate the difficulties of the road. The proposals he made were embraced in the bill. The Opposition made no move to help the situation, and the Amendment to the Resolutions showed that it was politics and embarrassment of the Government that influenced their action, with the possible object of driving the Government from power. The Government had to be solely advised by Sir George Bury, and the condition at present is that if the people want a railroad they will have to pay for it. It was Sir George Bury's opinion that no corporation could make a railway pay in this country. The Leader of the Government reiterated his statement that if we want a railway the people must pay for it, and added "that so far the Reid has paid for it. Reviewing the future, he said there were no people in the country capable of taking up the railway situation, and the duty would devolve upon the Government of getting competent people from abroad to make plans for the future."
Sir Patrick McGrath replied to the criticism of Hon. Mr. Shea, and then took up the Railway Bill, which he dealt with exhaustively. His speech was not concluded at the session and will be continued on Monday, and will appear in our issue on that day.
The Fishery Supply Act, which was in the hands of a Select Committee, was passed through the Committee stage, with the forfeiture amendment clause recommended by the Select Committee.
The House adjourned at 6:30 until Monday at 4 p.m.

House of Assembly.

FRIDAY, July 29.
The proposed reduction of the salaries of civil servants was discussed at considerable length at this day's session of the House. The Opposition demanded an undertaking from the Government that these salaries would not be reduced but could get no satisfaction.

The House met at 2.15 p.m. Mr. Archibald presented a petition from Mr. Gracie Island fishermen asking for a launchway to be signed by all the fishing population of the island. He asked that it should receive immediate attention.

Mr. Walsh introduced a bill to regulate the Cold Storage of fish which was read a first time.

In reply to a question of Sir Michael Cashin, Hon. Mr. Barnes stated the salaries of school teachers would not be reduced. The Prime Minister informed Mr. Moore that the farmers were purchasing milk from the model farms to assist them in all their contracts. He also promised a statement of account for the Department of Agriculture and Mines in that connection.

Mr. Bennett referred to an item in the Daily News concerning men for work on Labrador; now wanted in Canada, and said that 2,000 men would be needed later and that all those employed would be Newfoundlanders.

Supply was next taken up. The vote for the Justice Department was passed.

Mr. Coaker explained the vote for the Marine and Fisheries Department. In the case of Mr. Dunphy, Mr. Sullivan said that this was a peculiar case, and that Mr. Dunphy's services should be retained. Mr. Coaker said it was intended to place two supervisors of lighthouses in place of the Inspector of Lighthouses. Their salaries would be \$1,500 each. The ship-bounty was reduced to \$5,000. The Game and Inland Fisheries Board vote has been reduced from \$20,000 to \$3,000. The vote for the export of fish and trade commissioners was discontinued. The grant of \$15,000 for marine works was dropped. A large amount would be saved on lighthouse supplies. The maintenance of lighthouses vote was also greatly reduced. On other lighthouse votes large amounts were saved.

Mr. Moore asked if any of the Trade Commissioners were still being paid.

Mr. Coaker answered in the negative.

Sir Michael Cashin could not understand why the herring fishery was being abandoned. He thought Mr. Dunphy should be retained as herring inspector. The Government was abandoning the lobster fishery altogether. Last year it had cost \$34,000 but now they were not voting a cent for it. Returning to Mr. Dunphy, Sir Michael asked why he should have been singled out for dismissal. He presented a petition from the customs officials protesting against the reduction of their salaries. There was a discrimination shown here. He thought civil servants should be encouraged to do their work properly. Before salaries of \$1,200 were reduced in the House he would not close it for another month. The Opposition were going to help the Government as much as possible but they would not consent to a reduction of civil servants' salaries.

Mr. Bennett also protested against the reduction of civil servants' salaries. He termed it false economy to cut down a man's salary to such an extent that he could no longer keep body and soul together and it was a direct encouragement to dishonesty and wrongdoing. He protested against the discharge of Mr. Dunphy. He would like to know why Mr. Dunphy or Mr. Fitzgerald who had also been dismissed, had not been placed on the western revenue cutter instead of Mr. J. McGrath. He hoped that the reduction of civil servants' salaries would be considered a very necessary one.

Mr. Walsh also strongly protested against the dismissal of Mr. Dunphy who, at one time, had been a member for his district. He had given his sons to the Empire during the late war, and he was rewarded by being dismissed from his post. He protested against the discrimination which was shown in the matter of salaries of civil servants. He also protested against the dredge being put out of commission. His district and other western districts had been calling for the dredge for years but their calling was in vain. He regretted the vote was to be dropped. It was, in his opinion, a very necessary one. Mr. Walsh also brought up the matter of a fog alarm which had been promised his district last year. He concluded by telling the Government that if their financial conditions were as bad as they said they were, the best thing to do would be to start in and cut their own salaries.

Mr. MacDonnell also protested against the reduction of the salaries of civil servants and the discharge of Mr. Morgan from the lobster preservation or inspection service. He recommended the preservation of the lobster fishery.

Mr. Moore briefly protested against the reduction of civil servants' salaries.

The Prime Minister said that the matter would be discussed in Ways and Means.

Mr. Moore realized this but asked for an understanding now that the salaries of civil servants should not be reduced.

In reply to Mr. Sullivan who supported Mr. Moore, a reiteration of his former statement was made by the Prime Minister who further stated that certain amendments would be introduced by the Minister of Justice.

Sir Michael Cashin said that whilst the customs officials' petition was before the House the Prime Minister might say that the salaries would not be reduced. If he did so, there would be no difficulty in passing the estimates.

The Prime Minister stated that those civil servants who did not participate in the increase of salaries in the autumn of 1919, would not be subjected to the reduction. The police did not get an increase at that time as their salaries were scaled some six or seven months previously. Those who participated in the increase of the autumn of 1919 came under the head of reduction in the bill proposed to go through.

Mr. Letrow was accused by Mr. Fox of bribery and the latter announced his intention of moving for a select committee to enquire into the matter. The House adjourned at 2.30 a.m.

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**Bishop Renouf
Visits Bonne Bay
and Innismara.**

On Sunday, the 10th July, His Lordship Bishop Renouf left St. George's by train en route for Bonne Bay. He remained at Peirre's until Monday evening, when he continued his journey north by the S.S. Stella Maris. At midnight the Stella Maris reached Bonne Bay, where the Pastor, Rev. W. Brennan, received His Lordship.

On Tuesday afternoon a meeting was held in the Parish Hall, where a beautiful address was presented His Lordship from the people of Bonne Bay. The address, which was read by one of the school children, was presented with a bouquet of flowers. After His Lordship's reply the parishioners were introduced to him individually.

On the following morning the Bishop celebrated Mass and immediately afterwards many children from Woody Point and the surrounding districts were confirmed. Bonne Bay, pretty at all times, presented a more than usually pleasant aspect on this occasion. Decorations were an evidence everywhere, the arch at the Church between two cedar-like poplars attracting special attention. During the afternoon His Lordship received many visitors, the inhabitants

without distinction calling to pay their respects.

On Thursday Mass was again celebrated before a large congregation. The afternoon was spent by the Bishop in visiting Lomond and other settlements around the arms.

Confirmation Along the Coast.

The S.S. Home left Bonne Bay on Friday morning with the Episcopal party on board. Confirmation was held in passing at Cow Head and Bartlett's Hr., both of which places received His Lordship with the usual sign of greeting and welcome. The Home reached Ferrolle in the evening with all its decorations displayed. A great reception was given to the Bishop at Ferrolle. Flags flew from every dwelling, and arches decorated with flowers were erected at several points; salvo after salvo rang out welcome as the motor boat bearing His Lordship reached the wharf and continued till he had passed through the arches on his way to the house of Mr. Rumbolt, who entertained the Episcopal party.

The following morning the Bishop celebrated Mass for the people of Ferrolle and administered Confirmation to several children. Immediately after Mass His Lordship left by motor boat for Bird Cove, where again an enthusiastic reception was given him, evidenced by a display of flags and burning and continual pealing of mus-

etry. He left after confirmation and went by motor boat across St. John's Bay to Port aux Choix. Port aux Choix was "en fete." Flags and bunting were liberally displayed, and the road was beautifully lined with fresh green trees. During their stay the Episcopal party were entertained by M. Breton. Sunday morning began with the celebration of three Masses. Confirmation was held after the last Mass. In the afternoon His Lordship visited Point Riche, and on his return the party was driven by M. Breton to Port Saunders. The reception given by the people of Port Saunders was again whole-hearted and enthusiastic. On Monday morning a large number of children received the Holy Ghost at His Lordship's hands after Mass. At noon the S.S. Home reached Port Saunders on the return journey from the Labrador coast. The Episcopal party again boarded her, and the tour of Bonne Bay Parish was concluded by Confirmation on the same evening at Parson's Pond.

Confirmation at Innismara.

On Tuesday morning His Lordship reached Innismara. He was met on the bank by the pastor, Father Callan, and many of the parishioners. Innismara, in spite of the heavy rain, lacked nothing in the earnestness and enthusiasm of the reception given to His Lordship. Confirmation was held in the evening and many children, some of whom came from outlying districts of the parish, were recipients of the sacrament. The Bishop celebrated Mass on the following morning, and soon after took leave of Innismara by the mail boat George I.

The only trouble with us is we do too much of "hiding our light under a bushel," instead of letting loose that energy within us, and convincing those people what can be done by local help, and thus demonstrate to the world that there is no job in Newfoundland too big for a Newfoundlanders.
