Old Things People Remember.

To return to the main road, I think most of us have these odd quirks of memory. For my own part I have a wretched memory for most things but can remember bits of poetry, nonsense rhymes, and so forth without the slightest effort.

Digby from Boston and Halifax. The total in since New Year is 5,962 barrels for the port of St. John's as compared with 2,497 this date last year. May pork strengthened up one dollar at the close of Wednesday, the first upward move for three weeks.

Beef-The S.S. "Digby" brought in 345 barrels of Beef this week from Halifax and the Sable I. 100 barrels; total 445 barrels. The Customs record for St. John's is 7,663 barrels, as compared with only 3,000 at corresponding date last year.

Butter-New Zealand butter which has taken such a popular hold on the local market the past six months, has strengthened in price considerably the past three weeks, so that it is now about seven cents a pound higher in the market of origin.

Molasses-The holdings of old molasses are very low and the quality is by no means of the best as is now retailed in some grocery stores. Some of it is probably the remains of two year old stock and is beginning to sour.

Sugar-The market for refined sugar continues firm, but is no change in price. In New York standard white granulated is still quoted this week at \$8.90 per 100 lbs., but any change that may take place is expected by dealers to be in an upward direction.

Potatoes-The potato market is dragging as is usual at this season of the year. New Florida crop, the first for the season arrived in New York last week and sold at \$10.00 a barrel in car lots for No. 1 and \$8.00 for No. 2.

Hay-A good demand for hay still continues as there is no likelihood of cattle getting out to graze for several weeks. There is quite an active movement in No. 2 Timothy in Canada and as high as \$30.00 per ton was paid this week, although the general price is \$28.00 to \$29.00.

Oats-An easier feeling prevails in the oats markets in Canada this week, and sales if car lots were made at 65 cents per bushel for No. 2 "Canadian Western." There were none imported this week, but there are some large consignments to come in during this month, which will keep the local supply well up to the average.

Wheat-The wheat market is steady at the winter prices viz: \$3.90 per bushel for mixed and \$4.00 for white. Some importers have shaded down these prices on large cash orders.

Seal Fat-The price of seal fat is \$4.00 for young harps per cwt., \$3.50 for Bedlamers, and 3.00 for old harps, and hoods. The number of seals accounted for to date is about 100,000.

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Viceroy of India Accepts Responsibility

For Montague Incident--Miracle Can Only Avert Civil War in Ireland--Collins Charges De Valera With Despotism--Extremists Want Military Dictatorship.

READING ACCEPTS RESPONSIBILITY.

LONDON, April 9. According to a Reuter Despatch from Peshawar, Lord Reading, Viceroy of India, in replying to an address of the Northwest Frontier Provinces, took the fullest responsibility for the telegram which led to the resignation of Edward Montagu as Secretary of State for India.

COLLINS'S WARNING.

DUBLIN, April 9. Speaking at Wexford to-day Michael Collins declared "unless there was a change in the attitude and tactics of certain persons it looks as if civil war can only be averted by a miracle."

De Valera today appealed for 50,000 pounds for election purposes. The Pro-Treaty Party issued a similar appeal. To the statement that disorders in Ireland were being promoted by Reds and other irresponsible persons, De Valera said that it was not the first time the Irish race had to face misrepresentation and slanders of the British controlled press.

Reduce Taxation.

It has been asserted by exponents and advocates of the Government's policy of taxation, when referring to the resolutions passed by the Board of Trade last Tuesday, that no suggestions were made as to the direction which reduction of expenditure should take, or where the pruning knife should be first employed. The press opposing the Government has also come in for its share of uncalculated and undeserved criticism for not likewise offering suggestions. In this case one is tempted to ask the question, would it be worth while? For if the Government is bent on pursuing the course laid down in the Budget Speech, nothing that the press could say would have the slightest effect on the attitude of the acting Minister of Finance, who in this instance is the Prime Minister. Such suggestions should properly come from the trade, and doubtless the petition presented last week will have outlined a certain course of procedure in this direction. If not, then a change should be made in the language of the prayer, or a memorandum of the desired changes added. Be that as it may, a correspondent on Saturday—himself being a manufacturer—placed himself on record in our columns as being the first to take the initiative in recommending where and how money could be saved to the Colony, and the burden of taxation made less grievous to be borne. Two and a half million dollars saved means something to two hundred and fifty thousand people. It means ten dollars per head or an average of fifty dollars per family.

It is not worth wasting time to preach economy, if the practice is not adopted. Neither is it worth while to have the Government go pecking here and there, eliminating the lesser items and allowing the greater ones to remain untouched. The axe must be applied at the root, if sincerity of purpose is to be the guide of the Government's action in this respect. If not then they are the real stranglers of trade, the deadly octopus with its tentacles coiled round the commercial body, rendering the members thereof helpless and powerless, in its cold embrace. High tariff Governments cannot be popular. Excessive duties retard production and hamper imports. The expression used on Friday we repeat. There is no need to amplify it, nor can it be reasonably challenged. Bolshevik to those who are lovers of that doctrine, and to the apostles of that cult in Newfoundland, who for a period boasted of its influence and the good it was going to perform in the world. Another change in the spirit of the dream of him whose mighty brains conceived and who hand hurried that thunderbolt of literary potency in the Advocate of Saturday. Getting fearful now that the chickens of misfortune

have come home to roost, and the consequences of tinkering with the trade of the Colony by special acts of Parliament are becoming manifest. And we emphasize that if the present Budget is carried out, if the present rates of tariff are continued, then indeed there will be no imports, and "no imports, no duties; no duties, no revenue; no reduction of taxation, no supplies for the fishery, or no employment for labor." It is up to the Government to act in such an equitable manner that this will not happen. Will they measure up to it? "The mill of the Gods grind slowly," it is said. But the mill of public opinion and resentment is pulverising the Government in its revolutions, none the less surely because slowly.

Bonne Bay Supports.

BOARD OF TRADE RESOLUTIONS.
The following message was received this morning by the N.M. Board of Trade:—
"Bonne Bay.—At a public meeting held here on the 8th inst. your message embodying a number of resolutions was placed before said meeting and thoroughly discussed, after which resolutions endorsing same were put before the meeting and carried by an overwhelming majority. The following additional resolutions were also passed:
"That the duty on gasoline for fishermen's use be omitted free; that the export tax on codfish, lobsters, salmon and cod oil be removed; that whatever amount of expenditure intended for completion of the Deer Lake Road that said work be commenced at Curzon village, and be continued on Deer Lake Road."

HOUSE RESUMED THIS AFTERNOON.

It is presumed that they have been attempting to cut down the Estimates, but it is doubtful if they have applied the axe to any real extent. The Opposition will, it is understood, do their utmost to compel a reduction in expenditure.

How Moonshine Tastes

JUDGE MAKES PRONOUNCEMENT.
The difference between local moonshine and the imported brand was discussed in the Magistrate's Court this morning. Mr. Davies Government Analyst, said he had tasted the liquor exhibited in the case, which was that of a man charged with having local made liquor in his possession, and he was certain it was not from the Controller's Department. A police witness told him he had found accused drunk and had arrested him. When searched at the Police Station, a part bottle of moonshine was found on him. This was sealed and hidden in Head Byrne's mysterious cupboard. Mr. Conroy, for accused, placed his client in the box. Witness said he had had several drinks of rum and later, when half drunk, a man had met him and given him the moonshine found on him. "I go said he knew poison liquor either locally made or smuggled from St. Pierre, was being sold at fifty cents a glass in the city. Everyone who had got drunk on this dope had said it was Controller's. The police were doing all in their power to prosecute in every case. He imposed a fine on accused of \$100 or 30 days.

For the past four years, or in fact, since her son, Sergt. Gus Manning was killed in action in France, Mrs. Manning had been in failing health, but with a courage and unselfishness that characterized her in more than one period of great trouble and affliction, she made light of her illness, and it was only when the blow that resulted in her end came on Monday last, just a week ago, that her family realized that she had for so long been unflinchingly facing the inevitable. Her death was as beautiful and calm as had been her life. A perfect faith that had ever sustained her, no matter how heavy the cross she was called upon to bear, was hers to the end, and she passed into eternity with full possession of her faculties and surrounded by her children and the other members of her family. The late Mrs. Manning was in every sense of the word a lady and she secured herself to all who came in contact with her. She was a daughter of the late Patrick Lamb, a well-known planter and supplier of Red Island, P.B., and is survived by her husband, one daughter, Miss Lou Manning, two sons, Michael J. of the Star Publishing Co. and Raymond of the Board of Works office. Three sons predeceased her, viz: James, who was lost on the S.S. Regulus, Patrick who died at home, and Sergt. Gus, killed in action in France. She is also survived by two brothers, William and Patrick Lamb, the former of Red Island, and the latter in this city, and four sisters, Mrs. Barry of Redfield, Mrs. Moakler, of Providence, R. I., Mrs. Skinner and Mrs. L. Connelly in the city, to all of whom the Telegram tenders its sympathy.

TRADE SHOULD BE UNRESTRICTED.

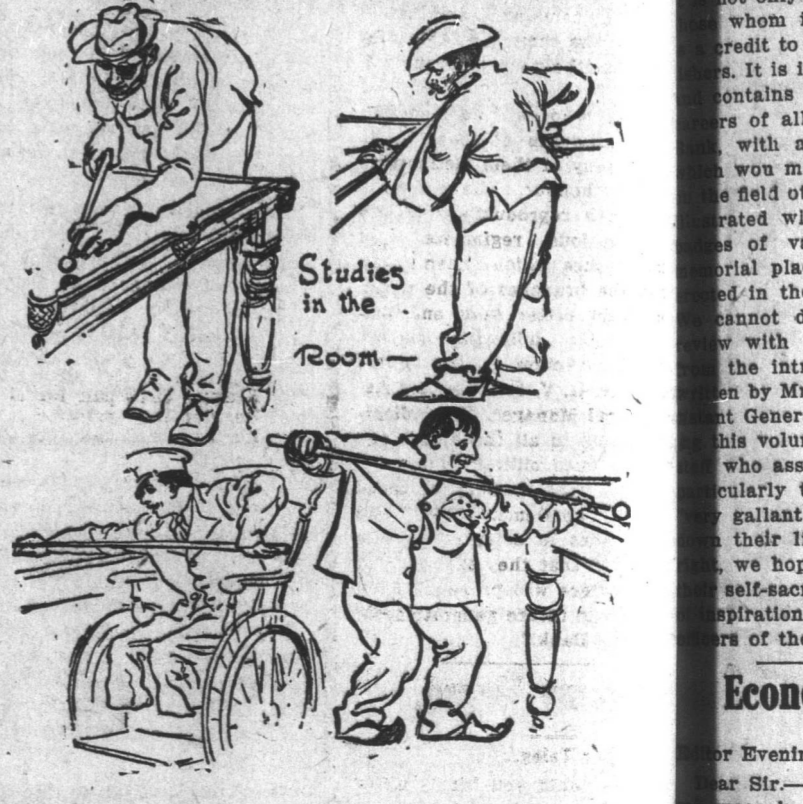

**Letters From
The Front.**

OF COMMERCE PUBLICATION.

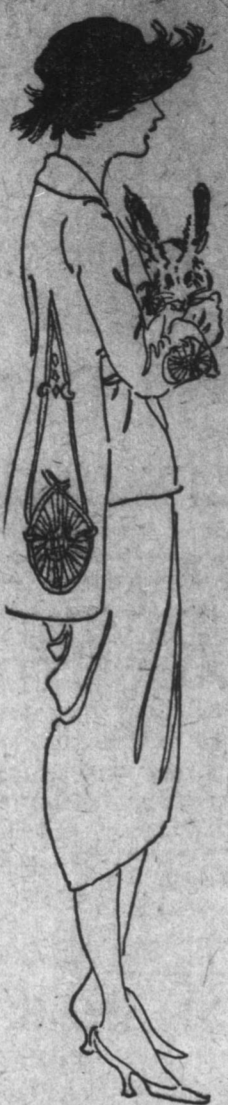
Some time ago we had the pleasure of reviewing the first part of "Letters from the Front," the work which the Canadian Bank of Commerce has had compiled in memory of those members of its staff who served, and in many cases died in the Great War. The volume now before us, and which is not only a commemorative, but it is also a magnificent tribute to the credit of the compilers, and publisher. It is in the main biographical, contains brief sketches of the lives of all who enlisted from the bank, with accounts of those deeds which won many of them distinctions in the field of honour. The volume is illustrated with reproductions of the medals of various regiments, and of the plaques which have been presented in the branches of the Bank. It cannot do better than end this review with the following extract from the introduction to the volume:—"The Bank of Commerce, through the assistance of Mr. H. V. F. Jones, the Assistant General Manager, has dedicated this volume to all those of our staff who assumed military duty, and particularly to the memory of those gallant gentlemen who laid down their lives in defence of the Empire. We hope that the example of their self-sacrifice will prove a source of inspiration to future generations of the staff of the Bank."

Economy Urged.

Dear Sir—Would you kindly allow me a few remarks on matters affecting the welfare of our country. Regarding Mr. Morgan's plans for building the railroad I notice that you people are expecting reduced fares and passenger fares, he plans to reduce them. He also plans to have a rolling stock. In 1900 we had half the rolling stock we have today and the road-paid expenses. Now it is the use of a man having a number of horses in his barn if he has work for them? It is the same with the railroad. I have travelled from John's to Port aux Basques and I have seen lots of box and flat cars lying on the sidings, this too when people were asking for cars to get out of the woods and timber. What is wanted is some men to see that the sidings are not piled with idle cars and also that no freight train leaves a station without taking all the freight. A good man is needed and no more rolling stock to rust out.

In regard to the present taxation I notice the Government has to give out enormous lot of relief work, but I am afraid they will have to continue to do so if they do not reduce the present duties. There are a great number of our young men who during the prosperous times saved considerable money by working in Canada and the United States. During the past few months the savings of these men have been eaten up by the high cost of living, and they too will soon be asking for relief from the Government. Had the powers that be reduced the taxes last year relief for so many would not be necessary as the fishermen would not have found themselves in debt at the end of the voyage. Why not cut down all the high duties on officials? They tell us they can live on two or three thousand dollars per year, even though they have families or none at all. Yet the men and others with a family of seven or eight to clothe and feed are expected to do it on one hundred and twenty dollars. Cut down the salaries, reduce expenditures and lower the taxes until a means is found to save us from ruin.

Terra Nova—(Saturday p.m.)—Dense fog all day. Did nothing. Viking—(Saturday p.m.)—40 miles S.S.W. Sotarie, thick fog. Total on board and stowed down, 18,500. All well. Viking—(Sunday p.m.)—50 miles S.S.E. St. Paul's; all well. TO REID NELD COMPANY. The following message was received by the Reid Neld. Company from their agent at Port aux Basques: "Viking due off Port aux Basques early Monday morning. If weather fine may not go in but will go on down coast; seals plentiful."

THE CATCH REPORTED. Sagona (landed) 8,903. Ranger (landed) 4,296. Theie (landed) 15,838. Seal (in port) 4,500. Terra Nova 18,500. Viking 18,500. Neptune 16,400. Eagle 15,000. Total 102,223.

Seal at Harbor Grace.

HAILS FOR 4,500. The S.S. Seal, Captain Jacob Kean arrived at Harbor Grace at 1:40 p.m. yesterday hauling for about 4,500 seals, 3,000 of which are old. The Seal missed the Whitecoats early in the Spring owing to being jammed, but Captain Jacob went after the old ones and did very well considering the ice conditions, which of late have not been suitable for men to work on. The Seal started discharging this morning and it is likely the ship will make the second trip, though this has been left to the Captain's judgement.

St. Michael's Church.

INDUCTION OF RECTOR. Palm Sunday marked a milestone in the history of St. Michael's and will be long remembered. The mission which began in the days of the Hey-gates in a school at "Apple Tree Well" has now attained the status of a parish, and yesterday the Rev. Edwin Nicholls was inducted as the first Parish Priest and Rector. At the 9:30 Eucharist there was a Blessing, Distribution and Procession of Palms in remembrance of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem. There was a large congregation at this and the other morning services. The church and altar was decorated with fresh palms shipped from New York by a former St. Michael's boy, Mr. Robert H. Martin, ex-War Veteran. In the evening the Lord Bishop visited the church and performed the ceremony of inducting the new Rector. At this service the congregation was so great that sitting room could not be found for all, but the Wardens and Sidesmen did splendid work in giving satisfaction so that few had to go away. The Holy Week services are being continued every morning and evening this week.

Wealth of the Ocean.

SHOREMEN MAKE GOOD WAGES. Saturday morning a number of men from the eastern settlements brought their catch of seals to the city for sale Friday, the men from Outer Cove, Middle Cove, Flat Rock and other places as far as Cape St. Francis were out and nearly all secured lows. The seals were reported plentiful but the ice conditions were not good. Motor boats from St. John's were also out and all secured good catches. The tug boat Hugh D. Moulton and John Green also secured good fares, averaging about 30 seals. It is probable that during last week over 700 seals were brought to port. This is the first time since 1880 that seals in any quantity have come to land in this vicinity. In that year S. S. Walrus, Capt. Geo. Barbour loaded three times within sight of Signal Hill. Yesterday's westerly wind has driven the ice too far from the land for the boats to reach.

Fell Through Window.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE FROM INJURY. An aged resident of Monroe Street, Mr. William Wyatt, early this morning, fell through a third storey window, a height of 25 feet from the ground, but was unhurt. Wyatt is 81 years of age and has been ill for some time. He rose early in the morning and evidently became weak near the window and fell through. A clothes line and a small snow bank broke his fall. He was picked up by neighbours and Dr. Carnell was summoned. The medical man found that Mr. Wyatt was suffering only from shock.

A Fruitless Battle.

The Duke of Wellington's series of Campaigns in Portugal, Spain and Southern France ended on April 10, 1814, with the battle of Toulouse, in which he defeated the French under Marshal Soult. Abundantly enough a victory has been claimed for the French by ultra-patriotic writers, but this deserves serious discussion, in view of the fact that Toulouse, which Soult fought to save was occupied by the Allies, the morning after the battle, when Soult was in full retreat towards Carcassonne. The losses were heavy, casualties of the Allies, inclusive of 2000 Spaniards, totalling nearly 7,000 men. The French had two Generals killed and two wounded and captured, but no return of their killed and wounded was made, although it is certain that they suffered at least as much as the victors. Unhappily, the bloodshed was all purposeless, for when the battle was fought the Napoleonic Empire already was no more, and hostilities between France and the Allies had ceased a week before (on April 3). A courier had been sent southwards at once with the important news but by ill-chance his journey had been interrupted, and he did not arrive until the two armies, ignorant of passing events had expended their best energies, as well as many of their bravest soldiers, in a wholly superfluous contest. Another sortie from the beleaguered courier had been sent southwards at the 18th, spilled yet needlessly yet more blood, but that was the last shed in the long struggle. The abdication of Napoleon became known, a line of demarcation was made between the opposing armies, the white flag of the Bourbons flew over Toulouse, and on the last night of the month Wellington left the army that he had conducted from the Tagus to the Garonne, for Paris.

Branch railways no doubt are a benefit when travelling and freighting are considered, but when the country cannot afford it then the best measures should be adopted so that expenses be curtailed rather than increased. Why have a silk expand a rubber coat if we can barely bear the burden of a suit of olisks.—Twillingate Sun.

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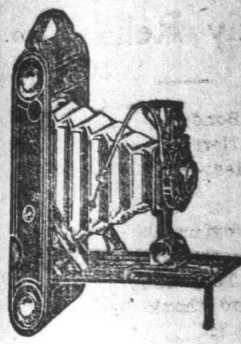

Increase Local Industries.

CONFEDERATION NOT AN ISSUE.

It has been advanced by some that Confederation with Canada would afford relief from the present high taxation. While we are not unmindful of the many advantages which would occur to this country through its joining up with the Dominion across the St. Lawrence Gulf, yet we fail to see where an increase of government machinery would in any way lessen the expenses of operation. Under Confederation, besides paying our quota towards the maintenance of the Federal Government, we would have the machinery of a Provincial government also to keep running which would have to be met principally by direct taxation. The one great feature, to our mind, that would reduce the capital taxation, is the establishment of industries that would keep our young people at home, and bring back those who have gone to fields afar. Increasing our population and its earning power and our per capita taxation will increase. Instead of a population of a little over a quarter of a million, we should have one of over two and a half millions. If confederation will accomplish this, then the quicker it comes the better, unless it can be accomplished in some other way—Western Star.

Quintal Not Uniform.

RANGES IN WEIGHT FROM 88 TO 220 POUNDS.

The following information as to the weights of "quintals," etc., in the different markets (extracted from "Fiskets Gangs") is useful in considering the prices quoted. In Spain the quintal at Bilbao, Santander, Cartagena, and Malaga represents 50 kilogrammes (equal to 110 1/2 English lbs.) while at Barcelona and Tarragona it represents 40 kilogrammes, or 88 1/2 lbs., while in Italy it is 100 kilogrammes, or 220 1/2 lbs. At Havana, in Cuba a whole case is 45 kilogrammes, or 99 1/2 lbs.; this is also the weight at Buenos, but at Rio de Janeiro the case weighs 53 kilogrammes, or almost 128 lbs.—Trade Review.

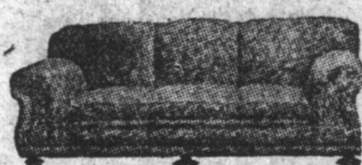

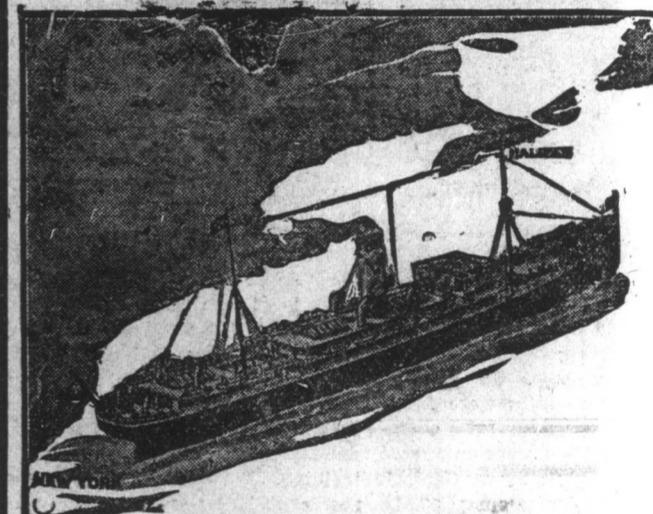
