



The settlement of East Africa by Europeans on the high first week of June. table lands which extend over a great part of that territory began in the latter part of Queen Victoria's reign, and the discovery of its wonderful resources on an equable climate resulted in an influx of Europeans, mostly British, and in the building of the Uganda Railway. This work was performed by Indian coolies, but unfortunately when it was completed, they were not quirements of the public. It was not long before the Kenya administration was faced, among other matters, with the racial problem. With the increase of white settlers a form of representative government was established, the members of which, representing the different factions, namely the colonists, the Indians, and the natives, were nominated by the Governor. As a result of the war, the Governor was faced with new difficulties. The number of casualties among the white population was greater than in any other part of the Empire. Of the native population, 60,000 out of a total of 600,000 who served in one capacity or another gave their lives. The Indian faction, in marked contrast to the loyal service rendered by their compatriots in India, did nothing. In fact, not one single individual met his death at the hands of the enemy, but five of them received the full penalty-for acts of treachery.

They have been active in their agitation against certain regulations which for obvious reasons have been enforced. These are—the reservation of certain parts of the plateau for Europeans, segregation, and the limitation of Indian representation on the Council to two members elected from and by themselves. They have demanded—and to enforce their demands have induced fanatical agitators in India to support them-unrestricted immigration, the right to equal representation with the European on a common franchise, equal rights in the civil and military services, in addition to the abolition of the restrictions mentioned above.

There are so many aspects of such a problem from which it, and many others of a like nature, must be viewed by those arduous task. The estate of the late Charles Ransom Miller who was first vicepresident of the New York Times and member of its board of directors, has been appraised at \$1,270,784.40 in a transfer tax report filed at New York. Mr. Miller, who died July 18, 1922, was editor-in-chief of the Times for nearly ferty years. His holdings in that newspaper, which were the second largest, amounted to 1,022 shares of common stock appraised at \$780.86 a share, aggregating \$746,-938.92, and 4,088 shares of preferred stock, appraised at par, totalling \$408,800. The estate is shared equaly by a son and a daughter.

'In the most illiterate sections," she asserted, "conditions approach the barbaric, marriage has no anctity and commerce is carried on through barter and trade."



Suez Canal Company's Report.

stagnation in the shipping Industry such a result is rather surprising but a study of the report supplies a reasonable explanation. It seems, indeed, that while the volume of goods passing through the waterway increased to a considerable extent compared with the previous year, the total of 21,360,000 tons does not spent on the stage. weight of goods carried to the capacity of the ships passing, which has as the volume of traffic is concerned owners, who are for obvious reasons tonnage passing through the waterwelve months ago, we observed that in view of the notable recovery which had taken place it might be expected that the traffic figures for 1912 would surpass those of 1913. That this has actually been the case without any revival of the shipping industry is a notable tribute to the exertions which are being put forth by shipowners of all nationalities, and especially British, to keep as many of their ships as possible in commission, even though the results in pounds, shillings and pence may be

the reverse of profitable. The Canal directors dwell with satisfaction on the noteworthy growth of the company's receipts, which was accompanied during the past year by a decrease in expenditure. These facts, coupled with the removal of a substantial charge on the funds due to the complete repayment of the consolidated coupon bonds, have enabled them to recommend a material increase in the dividend, while at the same time they have been able to allocate from the profits a sum of 25,000,000 francs to pay off a part of the installation expenses recently effected. Shipowners have also been privileged to participate in the prosperity of the undertaking, and the Canal directorate are not backward in throwing bouquets at themselves on this account. Drawing attention

to the fact that the rapid growth of the traffic enabled them to reduce by 25 centimes the Canal dues on shipping as from March 1 last, they add in a characteristic passage that this concession appeared to them opportune "in order to conform to the liberal policy of enabling shipowners who are still to-day suffering the consequences of a formidable crisis to benefit from the reascent prosperity of the Suez Canal, and to contribute their share to lighten the burdens which weigh heavily on the industry of marine transport." Railway companies and other organizations which profess to be unable to reduce their charges on the ground that the loss of revenue would seriously affect them would do well to ote the experience of the Suez Can-

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al Company since it lowered its rates.
