Ontario and Quebec Railway. LARGE MEETING AT ORANGEVILLE.

A large and influential meeting was held in the town hall at Orangeville on Wednesday night, to hear explanations from Mr. J. Fowler respecting the construction of the Ontario and Quebec Railway from Montreal to Goderich harbor. The Reeve Mr. McCarty presided as chairman, and J. W. Shaw acted as Secretary. Mr. Fowler, who was frequently applauded, spoke for over an hour, explaining the merits and advantages of the projected line, after which the following resolutions were unarimously adopted:—Moved by Mr. J. Gilchrist, seconded ing resolutions were unaimously adopted:—Moved by Mr. J. Gilchrist, seconded by Mr. J. Flesher, "That after hearing the explanations of Mr. Fowler respecting the construction of the Ontario and Quebec Railway, from Moatreal direct through Peterboro', Lindsay, Uxbridge, Newmarket, Orangeville, and Arthur, to Goderich Harbor, with a branch from Orangeville to Guelph, this meeting is of the opinion that it will be a great benefit to the whole country, and worthy of liberal assistance from the municipalities along the line, and from the Legislature of Ontario, and that this town and county will be justified in granting a bonus towards its construction; and the inhabitants of this section pledge themselves to do all they can to promote and secure the construction of this road." Messrs. J. Foley, S. H. McKittrick, and W. Parsons spoke in favor of the project. Before the meeting was adjourned, Mr. J. Ketchum moved, seconded by Mr. St. M. McKittrick, "That the thanks of this meeting are due to Mr. Fowler for bringing this scheme before them, and for the energy perseverance, and ability with which he advocates it; and also for having first scheme to the prosent railway, which we should never probably have had but for his early and energetic effors for its construction."
