Lo don, Sept. 5th.—A despatch from Shan hae reports that the difficulty between China and Japan in regard to Formosa has been sottled.

London, Sept. 5th.—The Irish team of riflemen embarked at Queenstown today on the steamship Scota for New York. Their departure was witnessed by a very large and enthusiastic crowd.

At noon yesterday, the Great Eastern had paid out 1,534 anutial miles of the Anglo-American Cable. She was then in lat. 51.30 north, long, 47.35 west. All was going on well.

The Times says the Marquis of Ripon has become a Roman Catholic. The announcement a few days ago that he had resigned the Grand Mastership of the Freemason; and that the Prince of Wales would amporarily succeed him caused much excitement, which is strengthened by the information that the Marquis has embraced Catholicism.

London, Sept. 6th.—Mario, the famous tonor, has been arrested at Venice, for violation of the Press laws. His residence has been searched, and he has been taken to Turin for examination.

Panis, Sept. 3th.—Victor Hugo has written a letter 'kellning an invitation to the Peace Congress at Geneva. He says peace cannot be established until another war has been fought between France and Germany. He points to the existence of a deep and undying hatred between the two countries, and declares war will be a duel between the principles of Monarchy and Republicanism.


