# In a Frenzy Authorized Statement

## Russians Working Night and Day Preparing Black Sea and Baltic Fleets.

St. Petersburg, March 2.—According to a special despatch from Port Arthur, twenty Chinese have been arrested there for signalling to the Japanese ships from the shore with flashlight and lanterns. A warning has been issued that similar offenders will hereafter be treated as spies and shot.

Although it is denied that the present plans of the admiralty contemplate the despatch of the Black Sea or Baltic fleets to the Far East, it is reported that the fleet is being prepared with haste to meet any emergency. General Altkovskiy, chief of the admiralty, is reported to be inspecting the fleet in the Black Sea.

Work on the fleet is being pushed night and day. The battleship Borodino, the battleship Orel and the transport Krutshchik are being repaired at the admiralty dock yards here.

The Nova Vremya today prints an editorial in which it expresses its regret at the news of Japanese victories, in which it says "the whole world with those exceptions, realize that the Russian occupation of Manchuria would benefit civilization."

A despatch from Vladivostok, dated today, says that according to private information received from the admiralty, 800 men each recently landed at Ching Chiao, Korea, about 120 miles north of the mouth of the Yalu, with the supposed object of reaching the valley of the Yalu river and threatening the communications of the Japanese warships which were on the horizon of Vladivostok. They were believed to be the Russian fleet, now powerful enough to blockade Vladivostok or endanger the Russian first-class cruisers whose base is that port.



THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC CONTRACT.

Despatches from Ottawa give some details of the amendments which the Dominion Parliament will be asked to sanction in the agreement between the Federal Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, at the ensuing session.

As was stated some weeks ago, these amendments will also require to be approved by the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company at their meeting next week in London.

There are other changes in the agreement to be made besides those now announced, and it is stated that these will not be made public until that meeting, which will be held on Tuesday next.

Generally speaking, the intent of the proposed changes is to assist the Company in carrying out the financial arrangements in connection with the securing of the large sum that the construction of a transcontinental railway will require.

The present time is not particularly propitious for an appeal to the money market for such a purpose, and only the prestige and confidence which the Grand Trunk Railway Company under its present management has gained in London, would make possible the success of such an application.

In any case, the promoters are confident that they will be able to obtain the necessary capital to carry out the undertaking. A failure to do so would be practically disastrous to the project, and at the same time, affect very injuriously the credit and standing of the Grand Trunk Company itself.

Among the amendments to the agreement announced from Ottawa, the most extending the time for the completion of the line to 1911, that is, two years beyond the period fixed in the original agreement. This is a point of a wise precautionary measure on the part of the promoters, but it does not necessarily imply that all that will be required.

It is obviously in the interests of the Company to push construction, when once commenced, as rapidly as possible, so as to secure traffic, and it is not improbable that this second transcontinental line, like the Canadian Pacific Railway, will be completed well within the time fixed in the agreement.

One of the most important concessions made by the Government is the assistance it will grant for the mountain route—that is, from the eastern side of the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific Coast. Under the original agreement the Government was to guarantee bonds to an amount not exceeding \$2,000,000 per mile, if the cost reached that figure. Now it is proposed to abandon that limitation by arranging that 75 per cent. of the cost of that section shall be guaranteed. As it is probable that there will be some very heavy work on that part of the line, it is not unlikely that the Government will be required to advance a large sum of money to the Company.

Among other changes is one authorizing the Government to extend the lease of the Eastern section—that from Moncton to Winnipeg—to one hundred years, instead of fifty, with a provision that should the Government take over the operation of that section before that time has expired, the Company is to have running powers over it. As to the deposit of \$5,000,000 which the Company is to put up with the Government, it is now agreed that if the Western section is completed before the Eastern section is finished by the Government, the deposit shall be returned to the Company. An important change is also made in the original condition that the Grand Trunk Company was to hold the \$25,000,000 Ordinary Stock in the

Grand Trunk Pacific Company. This was done in order to secure an identity of interests between the two companies. Now the Grand Trunk Company may sell or dispose of a portion of its stock, provided it is held by parties interested in and identified with that Company. This will make available a mass of securities for the financial requirements of the new scheme.

On the whole we do not see that there should be any adverse criticism of the proposed amendments to the agreement so far as they have been announced. We should have liked, however, to have seen some consideration required from the Company in return for these concessions, in the form of undertaking by the Company that work on the Western section should be commenced on the Coast simultaneously with that on the Eastern side of the line.

The representatives of British Columbia in the Dominion Parliament should endeavor to have this agreed to when the matter comes up at the ensuing session.

THE MINING INDUSTRY.

We publish elsewhere a letter from Mr. Galt, of Rossland, referring to our article in Tuesday's issue on the mining industry. Mr. Galt, representing as he does two important mines in the Rossland district, is properly anxious and solicitous that every consideration be done to encourage such enterprises.

We quite agree with him that the prosperity of the mining industry means very much to every other interest and industry in British Columbia. We can assure him that the Provincial Government is keenly alive to that fact and that nothing will be lacking on its part to give practical effect to that view. But that does not imply that every suggestion that is made in connection with the mining laws or in the methods of the administration of them, should be adopted. It would be very easy to point out numerous instances where suggestions for changes in one direction would, had they been hastily adopted, have worked considerable evil in another.

But the actual situation in the mining industry today in British Columbia refutes Mr. Galt's main contention—that the mining industry is suffering from unwise legislation or interference manifested by the Government. We find some of the most important companies issuing most important reports to their shareholders. Better business methods; cheaper methods of treatment and lower railway freights are factors of no less importance than anything else. Excessive capitalization of some of the mining properties in Kootenay has had not a little to do with the discredit and disappointment that has attended some mining interests, and Mr. Galt can rest assured that incidents without it being necessary for us to mention them.

The question of the two per cent. mineral tax is one that has to be dealt with, and the Conservative party are pledged to that. But no one knows better than Mr. Galt that among mining men there is a great difference of opinion as to what system should be substituted for the one now in force. Mr. Galt does not like the term we used of "a cautious and conservative policy" in dealing experimentally with a matter on which those most closely connected with the mining industry have a diversity of views. But the Government has to look at the matter from the point of view of the revenue of the Province as well as from that of the mining industry, which alone occupies Mr. Galt's thoughts, and the result of its deliberations will, we doubt not, be such a proposal to the Legislature as will both meet the sanction of the body and the approval of the shareholders. Meanwhile we would suggest that the latter continue their efforts, which have so far been very successful, for improving mining methods with a view to greater economy in every direction.

LIBEL SUITS. We must congratulate our contemporary "The Times," on its successful defence of the libel action brought against it, and in which it secured judgment in the Supreme Court a judgment with costs. The cause of the action brought against it were some comments made by the editor of the paper against certain parties who were soliciting support and subscriptions for alleged charitable purposes. The facts, as brought out in our opinion, fully justified "The Times" comments. They were made in the public interest, were entirely without malice or prejudice and merited commendation.

The annual report on the public schools in the Province has been issued by the Superintendent of Education. In many respects the progress is a distinct improvement on previous years. Mr. Robinson's efforts will be appreciated by all those who are interested in the subject of education. At the present time the importance of a thorough and sound education being placed with the result of every child is being recognized throughout the civilized world, and there is continual rivalry between one nation and another as to which shall take the leading educational matters in British Columbia besides what shall be the direct interest in education. There is the circumstance that the burden imposed on the taxpayers by the cost of education has never become so heavy as to direct public attention to the matter with a view of ascertaining whether such a burden is justified for this purpose is necessary and if it is, the Province gets full value for the money.

The information given in Mr. Robinson's report will throw some light on the question of education in the Province during the past fiscal year on education amounted to about \$1,000,000, and the whole Provincial revenue, and that of the exception of the annual charge of the Provincial debt, the vote on education votes up the largest in the Eastern portion of the Province, and the manner in which it is increasing since 1901.

We must defer for another occasion a

Big Purchase Of Steamships Northern Pacific Liners Are Sold to Siberian Development Company.

According to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer of yesterday one of the most important transfers in Pacific Coast shipping history has just been completed. It would appear that the Northern Pacific Railway Company has succeeded in disposing of advantageous terms of their trans-Pacific fleet. It is understood that the company has sold to the Siberian Development Company a fleet of splendid new vessels at a very early date. The Post-Intelligencer says: John H. Hays, president of the Northern Pacific Railway Company, and the Northern Pacific Steamship Company, consisting of the steamships Victoria, Olympia and Tacoma. Announcement of the consummation of the deal, which was pending for several weeks, came yesterday morning from San Francisco. The purchase of these vessels practically puts an Oriental steamship line out of business and adds three vessels to the Nome and Northwestern Siberian fleet operated from Seattle.

The Northwestern Siberian Company holds concession for the exploration and development of a vast area of Siberia bordering the Arctic and Behring Sea, while the Northwestern Commercial Company is heavily interested in Nome transportation and mining. The latter corporation also holds a controlling interest in the Northwestern Siberian Company. Hays, managing director for America of the Siberian corporation, and president of the Northwestern Commercial Company.

The vessels purchased will probably be operated by the Northwestern Commercial Company, though they were secured as much as the Siberian as the Nome trade. Last year the Northwestern Commercial Company's vessels carried more freight to Nome than those of any other company. It operated five vessels between the port, Nome and Siberia. Over 20,000 tons of material were shipped to the mouth of the Yukon river for the rail road being constructed from that point to Council Bluffs. The company's total shipments to Nome and Siberia during the season exceeded 30,000 tons.

The vessels purchased aggregate 31,157 gross tonnage. They are cargo freight carriers and have passenger accommodations in proportion. All three have long plied between Tacoma, the American terminus of the Northern Pacific Steamship Company, and the Orient. They are British bottoms, having been built at Glasgow, Scotland, the Victoria and Tacoma in 1870 and the Olympia in 1888.

The Victoria is 300.5 feet long, 40.4 feet beam and 94.3 depth of hold; the Tacoma length 272 feet, beam 32.2 feet and depth 72.2 feet. All are iron vessels. They carry each an A1 rating. The purchase price has not been given, but probably exceeds \$500,000 for the three.

Mr. Hays is now in New York, where the final terms of the sale were arranged. Since his return from St. Petersburg, where he went early in the winter of 1903, he has been president of the Northwestern Siberian Company stockholders, he has been trying to sell vessels on the Atlantic for the two companies. He was unable to secure any takers, and he is now looking for a prospect for a security of the Nome tonnage for the coming season. The vessels now available to the firm have watched the progress of the development of the district and it will be much greater.

Numerous vessels in the Nome trade last year are not likely to be available this season. The steamship Manassas is no more and the Indian and Columbia, two of the largest, are now running to Nome last year, are now on the Atlantic.
