ORIENTAL RIVALRY. A NIAGARA PRODUCT. Facts About Acetylene Gas From the Ontario Bureau of Mines—What Niagara Power is Doing.

The most complete and accurate information yet given concerning the production of acetylene gas in Canada is in the recent report from the Ontario Bureau of Mines. The report states that the process for the economic production of acetylene gas in Canada has been made in recent years for the supply of light and heat in the industrial district of Niagara Falls.
