The Crew Saved by a Log. SEVEN WRECKED AND FROZEN SALOONS WHO OWED THEIR LIVES TO A NEWFOUNDLAND log, were rescued from a shipwrecked vessel on Saturday morning.

The furious gale and blizzard of Saturday morning swept down upon the lake just as the schooner St. Lawrence, of St. John's, was off South Point, N. S., making the sails out of the bolt ropes and broke both masts off. The captain rigged the schooner on the stump of the mainmast, and managed to keep the vessel's head before the wind. They had a narrow escape from striking the point, but altered their course and went down the lake.

The weather was intensely cold and the spray that broke over the crew with ice. It was necessary to keep the men at the pumps all the time, for the vessel had been strained and was making water very fast. They stuck to the pumps all day and all night, the vessel being all the time in the imminent danger of foundering in the tremendous surf. The captain kept her scudding under the storm.

At 3 o'clock Monday morning they drifted past Chicago and made signals of distress. A boat was sent out to help them but could not find them in the snow and darkness, and returned. At 4 o'clock the captain managed to run the schooner across an ice-barrier some distance from South Point, where the waves began to break her. There were seven men on board, and with the exception of the cook and the captain they were almost insensible from frost and had lost their wits. The captain had a rope about the neck and lowered his overboard, leading to the Newfoundlander log. The water was so cold that the men became insensible. However, and began to bark furiously for help. A farmer going by in his wagon on a road a short distance from the wreck, and going down to the beach under the insensible cook. He carried him to a farmhouse and summoned help for the vessel. A hawser was sent out by the line, that the cook had dragged ashore, and the captain fastened one of the frozen seamen in the boat's chair and pulled him on shore. The other two were pulled in half way from the vessel by the stock and could neither be hauled to shore nor back to the ship. Every time the vessel rolled it would be half submerged in the waves and then jerked into the keel air again, and in an hour he hung there in fear of his life, the people on shore looking utterly powerless to help, and the frozen sailors on the schooner in great danger of being blown into the water by the breaking up of the vessel.

Boston Letters.

A report from Ottawa, says, Hon. A. W. McMillan, postmaster general, left there Thursday, for Washington, to conclude the negotiation for the establishment of a postal post between Canada and the United States. This is entirely new news. 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Railway Horror Near Carleton Place.

St. John, Dec. 18. - On Saturday afternoon, while a train which was en route at 2 o'clock for Bathurst was approaching McIntosh's Cove Bridge, three miles west of the Carleton, the train men noticed a heavy snowdrift on the west side of the bridge. It was decided to detach the engine and snowplow from the rest of the train, cross the bridge and remove the drift. The passenger cars were cut off and the engine and snowplow set out on their own. There were thirteen people on board all told, only one passenger being among the lot. As the drift was when a full load of steam was put on and the engine made a dash for it. Large about half way across the bridge the plough suddenly leaped from the track and fell over into the river, dragging the engine and its human freight with it. As quickly as possible messengers were sent to the village for help, and the intelligence of the occurrence was wired to Bathurst, forty miles distant. Five men were rescued alive, but the other eight, who were pinned beneath the locomotive, were drowned. Removing the bodies from the river was not completed till ten o'clock this morning, when the last body was recovered. The walking men were all aged, and the rescued ones were most agonizing, and there was scarcely a dry eye in all the village.
