GODERICH, ONT.—Bulk and separate tenders will be received by Dr. Daniels up to August 12th for erection of Methodist church on North street; J. A. Fowler, architect.

SAULT STE. MARIE, ONT.—W. J. Thompson, Mayor, invites bids up to Tuesday, Aug. 5th, for construction of a sewage pumping plant. Plans by Willis Chipman, C. E., Toronto.

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and offices.—Tenders will be invited immediately for laying granolithic sidewalks.—Plans are being prepared by J. Stinson for a business block to be built on Victoria avenue for William Western.

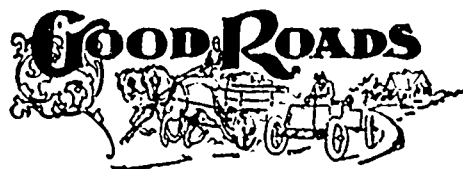
