THE BISLEY MEETING.

The service papers to hand this week give results of the second week's shooting at Bisley, and we gather from the *Volunteer Service Gazette* the following information as to Canadian prize winners.

As shown last week, five Canadians won places in the three hundred who shot in the second stage of the Queen's. Two of these failed to reach the first hundred who shot in the final stage, and retired with scores and prizes as follows:—

The lowest aggregate to get a place in the hundred was 181, this being three points less than inners. At the close of the second stage Lieut. Davidson of the 8th Royal Rifles was only three points behind the highest aggregate, taking third place with 197 whilst the two ahead of him tied at 200. In this stage Sergt. Horsey moved himself up from 208th place to 51st, and Col-Sergt. Henderson from 188th to 60th. Lieut. Davidson made steady shooting in the final, and finished fourth with the total of 264 points, only five points behind the leader. Sergt. Henderson by a brilliant effort raised himself to ninth place. He was unfortunate at 800 yards, starting with a miss and an outer but at 900 yards his 42 was the best score put together by anyone in the hundred. These were the complete scores of the three who headed Davidson, and of the Canadians in the final stage:—

It will be noticed that but for the two misses, so easy to occur at the long ranges, Lieut. Davidson would have achieved the fame of winning the Queen's prize, an honour to which no Canadian ever before came so near as he has on this occasion.

The Prince of Wales prize is shot for only by those who hold the silver medals of the N. R. A. awarded one to each affiliated association for competition at their annual prize meetings. Though the number of competitors is thus limited, it is to be presumed that they are all picked marksmen. For the fourth time the honour of first place was won by a Canadian, Capt. McMicking leading with 97 points out of 110 possible—7 shots at 200 yards and 15 at 600:—

There were 19 prizes, and two 87's were counted out. It will be noticed that the commandant of the Canadian team, Major Weston, exercised his right to shoot in this match.

The Tyro is a match restricted to those who have never won a prize from the N. R. A., and the prizes are awarded on the scores made in the first stage of the Queen's. Three Canadians came in:—

The Mackinnon Match, the new competition in volley firing, excited considerable interest. The match was between International teams, each consisting of ten men, the prizes of £20 and £10 to be awarded to the teams who, with five volleys fired at the 400 yards within one minute, succeeded in making the best score. England, Wales, Canada and Jersey competed. The match escaped the attention of the Scotch, and the Irish did not think it worth while to enter. England and Wales had only got off four volleys each when the minute expired. Canada and Jersey both fired five volleys. The English team, however, with their forty rounds made a higher score than Canada and Jersey obtained with fifty shots. Canada and Jersey protested on the ground that England, by only firing four volleys did not comply with the conditions. Soon after making the protest, Major Weston, on behalf of the Canadians, withdrew it in very handsome terms, remarking that the loss of an entire volley of the English Team was in itself a severe penalty, and that they having made the best score despite this circumstance, Canada had no desire to take a prize the Englishmen had so well won. The Jersey team, however, adhered to their protest, but the Council after hearing Colonel Burt and Quartermaster Gratwicke in reply, disallowed the objection made by Jersey (who were the lowest scorers in the shoot) and awarded the £20 to England, and £10 to Canada. This competition took the place of the *Standard*, which the English Team won last year by 171 points. Colonel Mackinnon has generously intimated that he will next year renew his prize.

For the Kolapore Match there were representatives of the Mother Country, the Dominion of Canada, Guernsey, Jersey and India. Each team consists of eight men firing at 200, 500 and 600 yards with the Martini-Henry, seven rounds at each range. This interesting competition was instituted in 1871. The real contest has generally been between the

Canadian and the Mother Country teams. In the twenty one matches which have now been shot, the Canadian team has been victorious five times. Last year the Mother Country team—a very strong one—won with 704 points, Canada coming next with 676. This years' scores given below speak for themselves and show a close call for Canada. Our team has never yet been beaten by any other than that of the Mother Country, but on this occasion Guernsey was only one point behind :--

"NOTES ON BATTALION DRILL"

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Province of Quebec Lottery.
