#### ECLIPSES IN 1885.

In the year 1885 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, March 16, 1885, visible at St. John. Begins on the Earth generally, March 16th, 10h. 53m. M., mean time at St. John.

Central Eclipse begins generally March 16th, 0h. 15m. A., mean time at St. John.

Central Eclipse at noon March 16th, 1h. 50m. A., mean time at St. John, in Longitude 91° 27′ W. of Greenwich and Latitude 56° 17′ N.

Central Eclipse ends generally March 16th, 2h. 28m. A., mean time at St.

John.

Ends on the Earth generally March 16th, 3h. 50m. A., mean time at St. John.

This Eclipse will be only partial in St. John.

2. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon March 30th, 1885. Invisible at St. John.

First contact with Penumbra,	March 30, 9h. 26m. M.
" contact with Shadow,	" 10h. 35m. M.
Middle of Eclipse,	" 0h. 10m. A.
Last contact with the Shadow,	" 1h. 46m. A.
" Penumbra,	" 2h. 55m. A.

3. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, Sept. 8, 1885. Invisible at St. John. This Eclipse is visible in the South Pacific Ocean, Eastern Australia and Patagonia.
4. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, September 24th. Visible at St. John.

The time given for these Eclipses is mean time at St. John.

#### EXPLANATORY.

Aphelion—The point of a Planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

Apogee—That part of the Moon's orbit farthest from the Earth.

Astronomical Day is reckoned from noon to noon through the 24 hours. Thus

July 21, 9h, is 9th A of July 21, and July 21, 15h, is 3h M of July 22.

Conjunction—A Planet directly between the Earth and the Sun is said to be in Inferior Conjunction with the Sun. A Planet with the Sun directly between it and the Earth is said to be in Superior Conjunction with the Sun. Planets are said to be in conjunction with each other, or with the Moon, when they are in the same sign and degree.

Declination—The distance of a heavenly body from the Equinoctial, measured north or south, in degrees or minutes, on a Meridian.

Ecliptic—The plane of the Earth's orbit, so called because Eclipses can take place only when the Moon is on or near it.

Elongation—The distance of a Planet from the Sun as seen from the Earth.

Equinoctial—The circle in the heavens traced by the Earth's Equator.

Node—That part of the orbit of a heavenly body which intersects the Ecliptic.

If the body is passing from south to north, it is called the Ascending Node: if from north to south, Descending.

Opposition—A Planet with the Earth directly between it and the Sun is said

to be in opposition to the Sun.

Penumbra—That portion of space around the shadow of the Earth passing through which the Moon diminishes in brightness, in consequence of a part only of the Sun's rays reaching her surface.

Perigee—That part of the Moon's Orbit nearest to the Earth.

Perihelion—That part of a Planet's orbit nearest to the Sun.

Quadrature—Two heavenly bodies are said to be in Quadrature when they are
distant from each other by one-fourth of the Zodiac, or three signs apart.

The Sun's Declination and fast or slow of clock are given for apparent noon, or time of passing the Meridian of St. John.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical time for the Meridian passage at St. John; and her Declination, when on the Meridian.

The Rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the Setting, from New Moon to Full Moon.

The Tides in the Calendar are the Morning and Afternoon Tides at St. John and Charlottetown. In the Tide Table (page 13) will be found Constants for finding the time of High Water at each of the places given in the Table.

In former editions of this Almanac the Tides were only given approximately, but in this they have been corrected for the varying distance of the Moon from the Earth, and also her angular distance from the Sun. They can now be depended upon as accurate to at least the same degree as the Admiralty Tide Tables.

It will sometimes be found that when a Constant is added to the time of High Water at the Port of reference the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port on the succeeding afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Port of reference was a Morning or Afternoon Tide.

It will sometimes be found that a Constant to be subtracted is greater than the time of High Water at the Port of reference: in this case add 12 hours to the Time at the Port, subtract the Constant, and the remainder will be time of High Water at the required place for the previous Morning or Afternoon, according as the Tide at the Port of reference was an Afternoon or Morning Tide.

#### FORECASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature, and prevent those losses to the Farmer and the Sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Vennor claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather

for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area, he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

Green Head.—Fixed white lights, visible 10 miles. Sand Point.— do. do. do. Oak Point.— do. do.

Palmer's Landing.—Fixed white lights, visible 5 miles.

Musquash Island.—Washademoak Lakc. Fixed white light, visible 10 miles.

Hendry Farm.—Fixed white light, visible 10 miles. In coming down, these two lights to be kept in range until opposite N W end of Hog Island, whence a southerly course to be kept to the foot of Musquash Island. In going up, the two lights to be brought in range opposite N W end of Hog Island; and kept in range until within ½ mile of the light on Hendry Farm.

Cape Sable.—On Cape. Latitude 43° 23′ 19″. Longitude 65° 37′ 11″. Revolving white light; bright 15s, dark 25s; visible in clear weather 12 miles. Octagonal white tower; stands 53 feet above high water mark. A steam fog whistle on southern point of Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water. Sounds a blast of 10 seconds duration in each minute.

Stoddard Island.—On N. E. of Island. Latitude 43° 28′ 30″. Longitude 63° 43′ 10″. Red revolving light every minute. White Tower to guide vessels into the anchorage of Stoddard Harbor and Shag Harbor Sound.

Bon Portage Island.—On S. Point. Latitude 43° 27' 16". Longitude 65° 54' 39". Fixed white light. White octagonal tower for guiding vessels into Barrington, West Bay and Shag Harbor.

#### Havana and German Cigars.

Seal Island.—On south point, one-eighth of a mile inland. Latitude 43° 23′ 34′′; longitude 66° 0′ 52′′. A fixed white light, visible 18 miles in clear weather. A white octagonal tower, 98 feet in height above high water. The Blond Rock lies S by W 3½ miles from light house. A fog whistle near light house; sounds in each minute a blast of 5 seconds duration, and after an interval of 5 seconds another blast of 5 seconds.

Yarmouth, or Cape Forchu.—On Cape, south point. Latitude 43° 47′ 28″; longitude 66° 9′ 21″. Intermittent white light; light 1½m, dark 1½m; visible 18 miles in clear weather. Octagonal tower, vertical stripes, red and white; stands 117 feet above high water. Fog whistle on west side; sounds 10 seconds

in every minute.

Pictou.—South point of entrange to harbor. Latitude 45° 41′ 30″; longitude 62° 39′ 30″. Two vertical fixed lights, 25 feet apart; upper part white, lower part red. Visible 11 miles in clear weather. Striped red and white vertically. Octagonal wooden tower; stands 65 feet above high water; lighted when navigation is open; a small red light is seen below lantern. By keeping light W S W, vessels clear the east reefs off Pictou Island.

In Tower of Custom House, latitude 45° 49′ 10′′, longitude 62° 30′′30′′; fixed white light, visible 8 miles; stands 60 feet above high water; in range with lights at entrance to harbor; leads to the channel up to the bar.

## Bay of Fundy.

Cape Saint Mary.—East side Bay of Fundy. Latitude 44° 5′ 20″; longitude 66° 12′ 40″. Alternate red and white light every 30 seconds; visible 17 miles in clear weather; white octagonal tower; stands 103 feet above high water.

Brier Island.—N W point. Latitude 44° 14′ 57″; longitude 66° 23′ 30″; visible 13 miles; white octagonal tower; stands 92 feet above high water. Fog whistle on N W of Brier Island, south side of light house; sounds 3 blasts of 4 seconds duration, with interval of 4 seconds between them, each minute.

Boar's Head.—17 yards from edge of cliff. Latitude 44° 24′ 16″; longitude 66° 13′ 0″; alternate red and white every minute; visible 14 miles in clear weather; square white tower, 70 feet above high water. On south entrance to Petite Passage.

Point Prim.—South point of entrance to Annapolis Basin; latitude 44° 41′ 34′′; longitude 65° 47′ 20′′; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; square tower, vertical red and white striped; 76 feet above high water. Fog whistle on Prim Point, sounds 8 seconds in each minute.

Port William, or Marshall Cove.—South shore. Latitude 44° 56′ 52″; longitude 65° 16′ 0″; two vertical fixed white lights, 22 feet apart, visible 10 miles; square white tower 92 and 70 feet above high water; lantern on top of dwelling, lower light in bow window, visible from WSW round N to ENE.

Margaretville.—On extremity of Point S shore. Latitude 45° 2′ 57″; longitude 65° 4′ 0″; red fixed light, visible 8 miles in clear weather; square tower, horizonal black and white striped, 30 feet above high water; visible from W S W to E N E.

Isle Haute.—On highest point. Latitude 45° 14′ 35″; longitude 65° 0′ 45″; white intermittent light, showing 40s in every minute, visible 20 miles in clear weather, white square wooden tower, dwelling attached, almost hidden by trees; 365 feet above high water.

Black Rock. -South shore. Latitude 45° 10′ 10″; longitude 64° 46′ 0″;

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Cape D'Or.—Fog whistle, on extreme point opposite side of channel from Black Rock; sounds during thick weather for 6s in every 30s; the whistle should be heard from 5 to 10 miles, according to the state of the wind and atmosphere.

Kingsport—On Oak Point Pier. Latitude 45° 9′ 30′′; longitude 64° 21′ 45″; fixed white light, visible 8 miles; upper enclosed part white, open frame brown, 20 feet above high water; visible from S W ½ W, round by E to N W by W ¾ W.

Horion.—On bluff west side of Avon River. Latitude 46° 6′ 15′′; longitude 64° 13′ 30′′; fixed white light, visible 20 miles; white square tower, 92 feet above high water; light in window.

Walton Harbor.—Basin of Minas. Latitude 45° 14′ 0′′; longitude 64° 0′ 45″. Fixed red light, visible 10 miles; white square tower, 92 feet above high water.

Burnt Coat.—Basin of Minas, N W extremity of Head S shore. Latitude 45° 18′ 40″; longitude 63° 48′ 30″; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; white square tower, with lantern on dwelling, 75 feet high above high water; visible from all points of approach.

Spencer Point.—On north shore Cobequid Bay; latitude 45° 23′ 30″; longitude 63° 37′ 0″; fixed white light, visible 6 miles; 35 ft above high water.

Advocate Harbor.—On N W entrance; latitude, N, 45° 19′ 25″; longitude, W, 64° 47′ 30″; fixed red light; 36 feet above high water; visible 7 miles;

square wood tower, painted white.

Parrsboro', or Partridge Island Light.—W side of river; latitude 45° 23′ 0″; longitude 64° 19′ 0″; fixed white light, visible 9 miles; white square tower, with lantern on dwelling, 37 feet above high water.

Apple River.—On Cape Capstow or Hetty Point, N entrance; latitude 45° 28′ 20″; longitude 64° 51′ 30″; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; white oblong tower, 64 feet above high water.

Hillsborough Wharf.—Petitcodiac River; latitude 45° 55′ 15″; longitude

64° 37′ 45′′; fixed white light, visible 5 miles; open frame.

Grindstone.—W part of Island; latitude 45° 43′ 13′′; longitude 64° 37′ 25′′; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; white octagonal tower 60 feet above high water; visible from N E by E, round by N to E by S, Cape Enrage lighthouse S W by W ½ W about 10 miles; in thick weather a trumpet sounds 4 blasts in every minute

Cape Eurage.—Pitch of Cape; latitude 45° 35′ 34″; longitude 64° 46′ 55″; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; white square tower, 120 feet above high water; visible between the bearings of N W round by S to N E; a steam fog whistle 150 feet N E from lighthouse sounds 4 seconds in each minute; will be heard from 3 to 10 miles.

Quaco.—Temporary light on the Pitch of the Cape at West Head; latitude N, 45° 19′ 20′′; longitude W, 65° 31′ 55′′; a fixed white light on pole 20 ft

high, and visible 6 miles.

Cape Spencer.—Pitch of Cape; latitude 45° 12′ 30″; longitude 64° 54′ 0″; alternate red and white light every 45 seconds, visible 20 miles; white square building with tower 207 feet above high water, visible between the bearings from ES E round by S to W N W, Partridge Island light bearing by compass N W by W ½ W northerly, distant 6½ miles.

Split Rock Automatic Buoy.—Moored in deep water about 12 miles S from

Musquash Light. From a position one half mile outside of it steer E N E for Partridge Island, about 11 miles from this buoy, Point Lepreaux bears W about 11 miles.

Partridge Island.—St. John Harbor; latitude 45° 14′ 20′′; longitude 66° 3′ 20"; fixed white light, visible 20 miles; tower vertical red and white stripes, 119 feet above high water; in foggy weather a steam whistle sounds for ten seconds every minute; a bell buoy near E side of Partridge Island reef.

Negro Point.—On end of Government Breakwater, W entrance Port of St.

John. Fixed red light, 40 feet high; visible 8 miles.

St. John Harbor.—Beacon; latitude 45° 15′ 10′′; longitude 66° 3′ 40′′; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; vertical red and white stripes, 35 feet above high water.

Musquash, east side of entrance; latitude 45° 8′ 35"; longitude 66° 14' 30"; fixed catoptric light, green to seaward, white towards harbor, visible 10 miles; white square tower, dwelling attached; 112 feet above high water.

Lepreaux, on Point; latitude 45° 3′ 40″; longitude 66° 27′ 39″; lights

one above the other 27 feet apart; fixed white lights, visible 15 miles, striped horizontally red and white octagonal; 81 and 53 feet high; visible between the bearings of W N W around by S to E by N; fog whistle gives two blasts of 5 seconds duration, with an interval of 5 seconds.

Drew's Head, on west side of Beaver Harbor; latitude 45° 3′ 45′′; longitude 66° 44′ 0′′; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; white square tower 45 ft above high water, seen at all points between eastern and western head of harbor.

Pea Point, east side of entrance to L'Etang harbor; latitude 45° 2′ 20′′; longitude 66° 48′ 40′′; fixed green light, visible 10 miles; white square tower, dwelling attached, 51 feet above high water, visible from E round by S to N.

Bliss Island, west end of Island, south side of western entrance to Bliss harbor; latitude 45° 1′ 15′′; longitude 66° 51′ 0′′; fixed red light, visible 12 niles; white square tower 45 feet above high water; leave on starboard hand oing in a deep water harbor and very plain, follow the starboard hand shore o the inner harbor.

L'Tete Passage on Mascabon Point; latitude 45° 2′ 20′′; longitude 66° 53′ 30"; a fog trumpet sounds blasts of 7 seconds, with an interval of 30 seconds

between each. Leave on starboard hand going in.

Midjic Bluff—Passamaquoddy Bay; latitude 45° 6′ 53″; longitude 66° 54′
0″; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; white square tower 130 feet above high water; a Bar extends E N E from lighthouse, and vessels require to eep off a distance of 260 yards to clear it at low water.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy of the largest class is placed near Old

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Anthony Shoal, on which is 18 feet at low tide. In making this buoy in thick weather and wishing to enter Portland, pass 1 of a mile inside of it and run N by E ½ E 4½ miles, when Portland Head will bear about N N W, when

Wood Island Light; latitude 48° 27m 23s N; longitude 70° 19m 45s W; white tower; red flash light, visible 13 miles, flashing once a minute; near entrance to Saco River, and guide to Winter Harbor and Biddeford Pool, by leaving it on port hand. Also, a bell struck by machinery, two blows in rapid succession, followed by an interval of 25 seconds, then one blow. To enter the north-eastern channel in day time run in to north-eastward of the light until the church steeple in the Pool settlement bears S W by S 1 S, and run for it, leaving Negro Island on the left and Stage Island on the right and anchor as soon as in past Negro Island. There is another channel to the westward of the light, but more dangerous.

Goat Island; latitude 43° 21m 27s N; longitude 70° 25m 31s W; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; (harbor of refuge) on the north side of entrance to Cape Porpoise harbor (near Kennebunk); leave on star-

board hand going in.

Boon Island; latitude 43° 7m 16s N; longitude 70° 28m 36s W; grey granite tower, 133 feet above high water; fixed white light, visible 18 miles; off York. Bearings—Cape Elizabeth lights bear N E by N, 30 miles; Matinicus lights bear E by N, 80 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S by W \(^3\_4\) W, 30 miles; Isle Shoals light bears S W \(^1\_4\) S 12 miles.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy is placed just off Boon Island ledge; it is painted red and black in horizontal stripes, with "B I L" painted in white on the middle black band. Is often heard 6 miles. It bears E by S 3½ miles from Boon Island Light. The ledge is awash at low water.

Cape Neddock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 15 miles. Also, a bell striking one blow every 30 seconds. Two dangerous ledges, York Ledge and the Triangle, lie S by W and S S W, respectively, from this light about 4 miles distant. York Ledge is marked with an Iron Spindle.

The Triangle simply with a common can buoy.

Isle of Shoals; latitude 42° 58m 0s N; longitude 70° 37m 25s W; white tower; light, flashing, red and white, visible 15 miles, flashing every 20 sees; on White Island, the most south western of the Isle of Shoals cluster, off Portsmouth, N. H. Bearings-Boon Island light bears N E 1 N, 12 miles; Whale's Back light bears N N W, 7 miles; Newburyport Bar bears S W by W 13 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S, 17 miles.

Whale's Back Light; latitude 43° 3m 30s N; longitude 70° 41m 48s W; old tower white, new tower natural granite color; fixed white light, varied by flashes, visible 13 miles; fiashes once in 1½ minutes. Fog trumpet giving blasts at intervals of 30 seconds. Also, a bell, struck by hand, both located in the old tower; all to be left on starboard hand going into Portsmouth.

Portsmouth Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; on left side of inner entrance to Portsmouth harbor. To enter Portsmouth harbor get Ponsmouth light to bear N & W, and run for it until Whale's Back light bears S E by E and you are abreast the southern end of Wood

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Island, then steer N½ E until past Fort Point, and Portsmouth lighthouse bears W by S½ S, then steer N W until the light bears S by E, and anchor; or, when Portsmouth light bears S by E, steer S W¾ S, and anchor close in shore in the cove to the westward of Fort Constitution in from 2½ to 6 fathoms. Strangers in entering Portsmouth harbor should take a pilot if possible.

Newburyport Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Also, a beacon, range of light, 336 feet in front of main light; black and white tower; fixed white light, visible 8 miles. These lights, in range, guide across the bar, in best water; bar constantly changes; outer bar buoy is in range with inner bar buoy and both lights; the beacon is moved as the channel changes. This station is on the north end of Plum Island, and on the south side of entrance to the Merrimac River, Mass. (Strangers should not attempt to enter.)

Newburyport Upper Harbor; two lights (beacons); outer beacon, black tower, fixed red light, visible 10 mls.; inner beacon, red tower, fixed green light, visible 12 mls.; both on Bailey's wharf, and to be left on port side passing up the barbor.

Ipswich Lights; on Castle Neck, south side of entrance to Ipswich River; a main light, with a range light in front; main light fixed, white, varied by flashes, visible 11 miles, flashing once in 1½ minutes, shown from a white tower; range light, fixed, white, visible 8 miles, shown from a black tower; the lights are 625 feet apart, N E ½ E and S W ½ W; in range, they guide to entrance of channel across Ipswich Bar in the best water, which at present is but 6 feet at low water.

Annisquam Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; a harbor of refuge for small vessels; on Wigwam Point, east side of entrance to Annisquam harbor; 6 feet of water on Squam Bar at low tide. To cross the bar, bring the light to bear south and run for it, leaving it on the port side; then run for the Lobster Rock Beacon, and leave it on the port side also.

Straitmouth Island; on south side of Sandy Bay, entrance to Rockport harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to be left on port hand in going to Rockport. Bad ledges lie off this light. Strangers should keep the north shore of Sandy Bay best aboard on entering Rockport; shelter only for a few small vessels.

Cape Ann Lights; latitude 42° 38m 15s; longitude 70° 34m 30s W; two grey granite towers, 165 feet above sea level; fixed white light, visible 20 miles; the lights are 900 feet apart, in range at SSW and NNE; located on Thatcher's Island off Cape Ann, and the northern limit of Massachusetts Bay; to be left on the starboard hand in going towards Boston. Bearings—Isle of Shoals bears N, 17 miles; Boon Island NNE, 30 miles; Gloncester Light SW by W; 4W, 6 miles; Long Island Light SW by W, 24 miles; Cape Cod Highland Light S by E; 4E, 43 miles; Londoner Ledge SE by E, 2mile; Salvage Ledge NNE, 2 miles. Also, a 10 inch steam whistle, giving ach minute a blast of 8 seconds and a blast of 4 seconds, with alternate intervals of 4 and 44 seconds.

Gloucester Light, on Eastern Point; on east side of entrance to Gloucester harbor; white tower; a revolving red light, showing once every 5 seconds, isible 9 miles. When coming from the Eastward, bound into Gloucester arbor, give the light a good berth to clear Eastern Point Ledge (spar buoy); hen, when the light bears N E \( \frac{3}{4} \) N, run N W \( \frac{1}{2} \) N until the upper harbor ight bears N E by N \( \frac{1}{2} \) N, then run for it, and anchor \( \frac{1}{2} \) mile S by W from he light. Gloucester Harbor Light, on Ten Pound Island, east side of entrance to inner harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to enter harbor, bring this light to bear N E by N 1/2 N, and run for it until Eastern Point Light bears S S E, and anchor in channel way or continue until Eastern Point light bears S, then steer E N E until Ten Pound Island light bears N, and anchor in S E harbor, in from 4 to 6 fathoms—hard mud; or, from this point steer about N W by N between Ten Pound Island Ledge buoy and Ten Pound Island, (giving the point of the Island a good berth) until the light bears E, then steer N ½ E until the light bears S by E, and anchor in western harbor.

Automatic Buoy: a whistling buoy is moored three fourths of a mile, S by W from Eastern Point Light, which is removed from May 15th to October

15th of each year.

Baker's Island Lights; latitude 42° 32m 10s N; longitude 70° 47m 10s W; two white towers, ranging S E and N W; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; located on the north end of Baker's Island, south side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbors. In coming from the southward vessels bound to Salem keep the lowest light open to the east of the high light, and run for it; this guides to the eastward of the South-east Breakers and Searl's Rock. Give Baker's Island a berth of not less than half a mile, leaving it on the port hand, then run for Hospital Point Light, bearing about W by N ½ N, until Derby Wharf light is in range with Fort Pickering light, when Salem harbor will be to the WS W of you, and Beverly harbor W by N 1/2 N. Also, on Baker's Island a bell which strikes two quick blows each half minute. For better information, a lens panel has been placed in "Hospital Point" Light, which makes a more brilliant light in the line of the ships' channel from Baker's Island than on either side, and serves to keep vessels from danger on either side.

Hospital Point; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Hospital

Point, north side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbor.

Fort Pickering Light; red tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Winter Island, north side of entrance to Salem harbor. On entering Salem harbor from near Hospital Point, get Derby Wharf light in range with Fort Pickering light to clear the Haste Shoal; good anchorage half a mile S W by S from this light, with Derby Wharf light bearing W by S.

Derby Wharf Light; on the end of Derby Wharf, Salem upper harbor; red

tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles.

Marblehead Light, on Marblehead Neck, south side of entrance to Marblehead, and to Salem South Channel; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; good anchorage half a mile W by S from this light. To enter harbor, bring the light to bear N W, and run for it until within two miles of it, then bring it to bear W N W, and run for it, leaving Marblehead Rock (a high rocky Islet with beacon at top) 150 yards on your port hand, and when it bears S W run N W 3 N until the light bears S by W, then run S W 3 W into the harbor, and anchor between the light and the town.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; guide to Swampscot anchorage and to Broad Sound. Leave it 11 miles on the starboard

hand on entering Broad Sound.

Minot's Ledge Light; latitude 42° 16m 9s N; longitude 70° 45m 34s W;

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entrance to Boston Bay; granite tower, natural color, 100 feet high; fixed white light, visible 17 miles. Davis' Ledge Buoy bears E by S; Boston light bears N W 1 W, 7 miles. This course must be kept good, northerly, to pass Bell Boat, off the north side of the Hardings Ledge (about 43 miles from Minot's Ledge Light). A good mark to clear the Hardings Bell Boat, after passing Minot's light, is to keep Long Island Head light (fixed white) just

open to the north of the Narrows light, which is a red light.

Boston Light: latitude 24° 19m 39s N; longitude 70° 53m 25s W; on Little Brewster Island, north side of entrance to main ship channel to Boston; white tower; white flash light, flashing once every half minute, visible 17 miles. Also, an air trumpet, giving blasts of 7 seconds, followed by interval of 43 From Cape Cod highlands the course for Boston Light is N W by W 1 W, which well clears Minots Ledge and the Hardings; then, when well past Minots, bring Boston light to bear W by N 1 N and run for it until within 3 of a mile of it or until the Beacon light bears about W by N, then run W 1 S until the Beacon light bears W N W, then run W by N leaving the Beacon light 100 yards on your starboard hand, then steer N W 1 W (keeping the middle of the channel) for the Narrows between Galloups and Lovell's Islands, then about N W 3 N for the bell buoy of Nix's Mate, which leave on port hand, then run W by N 1 N for Fort Independence, leaving the ower middle buoy, red can, No. 6, a good berth on your starboard, and State Ledge buoy, red, Nun, No. 8 close aboard on your starboard; then run about N W 1 N for the upper middle buoy, black, Nun, No. 9, which, leave on your port, then the course to Long Wharf or to good anchorage is about N W W. It making Boston ship channel from Cape Ann, get Thatcher's Island light to bear N N W from 2 to 3 miles, then steer S W 1 W until Boston light bears W by N 1 N. Then proceed as before given.

Narrows Light; brown house; fixed red light, on the right hand side of

Narrows, in ship channel entrance to Boston harbor.

Long Island Light; on the NE end of Long Island and southern side of attrance to Boston inner harbor: white tower; fixed white light, visible 16 niles. In coming up ship channel, and after leaving Nix Mate buoy on the ort hand, and Long Island Light bears W by S 1/2 S, run W by N 1/4 N for the outh end of the Castle until the Castle North Wharf bears N W by W 3 W, r abreast of the State Ledge Buoy (red, No. 8), then N W 1 N to the Upper Aiddle Buoy (black, No. 9), which leave on port hand, then the course to Long Wharf is N W 1 W. But if approaching Boston from Cape Ann, via Broad ound, bring Long Island Light to bear S W by W, and run for it until Deer leave Point Popper Land N W 1 N N by W, and run for it until Deer sland Point Beacon bears N W by N 1 N, three-eighths of a mile distant, hen W by N 1 N up the harbor. Strangers should bear in mind that in the hiddle of Broad Sound there is but 8 feet of water at low tide; but by keeping n the southern side of the Sound, leaving the Graves Automatic Buoy half a nile on the port hand and the Devil's Limb Buoy (black can No. 1) to nile on port hand, and running straight to Ram's Head Buoy (black can buoy 10. 5) about W S W, passing Aldrich's Ledge Buoy (black can No. 3 1 mile port), then leaving Ram's Head Buoy 50 yards distant on port, and run bout W & S to clear Deer Island Point Beacon, you can carry 12 feet safely. rom the Beacon you will steer W 1 N for lower middle buoy, then W by 1 N for State Ledge buoy, when proceed as before given.

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

This difference of 12 minutes in the decrease of morning and afternoon is caused by the Sun's being 6 minutes slower than the clock on the 1st. and agreeing with it at the end of the month.

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

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County Courts.

The Courts were established by 30th Victoria, cap. 10, passed June 17, 1867. The Act authorizes the appointment of one County Court Judge for the counties of Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska; one County Court Judge for the counties of York, Sunbury and Queens; one County Court Judge for the counties of Westmorland and Kent; one County Court Judge for the counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche; one County Court Judge for the County of the city and county of St John; and one County Court Judge for the counties of Kings and Albert; previded always that said Court for the city and county of St. John shall not have or exercise any jurisdiction in any cause in which the City Court of St. John, or the City of Portland have jurisdiction.

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The Act also authorizes the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who shall be an Attorney. The sittings of the respective Courts shall be held at

or near the County Court House in the chire town.

The County Courts have not cognizances of any action—1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or

2nd. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed,

except as hereinafter mentioned; or

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt, or damages do not exceed the sum of four hundred dollars; and in all actions of tort, when the damages claimed do not exceed two hundred dollars; and in actions on bonds given to a Sheriff or otherwise in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

#### Sittings of the County Court.

The Courts hold Terms every year in each County, which Terms annually commence as follows:—

Charlotte County—On the second Tuesday in the month of June; on the fourth Tuesday in February and October.

Carleton County — On the second Tuesday in March and December, and the second Tuesday in July.

Victoria County—On the Tuesday after the fourth Wednesday in March, the fourth Wednesday in June, and the third Wednesday in November; and on the first Tuesday in December for return of executions only.

York County — On the second Tuesday in January, third Tuesday in March and first Tuesday in June and October.

Sanbury County—On the third Tuesday in the months of January and June, and on the Wednesday next after the second Tuesday in October.

Queen's County - On the fourth Tuesday in January and June, and on the third Tuesday in October.

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King's County—On the first Tuesday in January, April, July and October. St. John County—On the fourth Tuesday in the months of January, April, July and October.

Albert County - On the third Tuesday in June, and on the second Tuesday in November.

Westmorland County -- On the first Tuesday in June, and the second Tuesday in September and December, and on the first Tuesday in March; the September Term only for return of executions.

Kent County—On the third Tuesday in January, on the last Tuesday in April, and on the first Tuesday in July and fourth Tuesday in October.

Northumberland County — On the fourth Tuesday in January, the first Tuesday in April, the fourth Tuesday in July, and the third Tuesday in October.

Gloucester County — On the third Tuesday in March, and second Tuesday in July, and the first Tuesday in November.

Restigouche County — On the fourth Tuesday in March, the third Tuesday in July, and the second Tuesday in November.

Madawaska County—On the fourth Wednesday in March, the Tuesday after the fourth Wednesday in June, and the Tuesday after the third Wednesday in November.






#### HACKNEY CARRIAGES.—Rates of Fare.

The prices or rates of fare to be taken and recovered by and paid to the bwner, driver, or other person having charge of any licensed Hackney Cariage shall be as follows; that is to say: for conveying one passenger from any public stand to any other part of the City, or from any one part of the City o any other part thereof, the sum of thirty cents, and for every additional passenger of the same household, each twenty cents; other passengers, not of he same household, each thirty cents. When detained at any place by any passenger, there shall be an additional fare of fifty cents every half hour deention. When agreement for hire is made by the hour, the fare shall be the um of one dollar for each hour, and in that proportion for each division by he quarter of the hour. In case any driver shall be required to cross the erry of the harbor to or from Carleton, he shall, in addition to the above fare, eceive twenty cents additional rate for one passenger, or more than one of the ame household; but if not of the same household, then twenty cents such dditional fare for each passenger; and also in addition to the fare, he shall eceive the ferriage charge for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and eturning. Every owner, driver or person having charge of any Hackney Carriage shall when requested so to do, carry with each passenger one trunk and also an additional valise, carpet-bag, portmanteau, bundle, basket, or ther article used in travelling, without charge or compensation therefor; and or every additional trank or other article more then hereinbefore provided, e shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of five cents.

And twenty-five cents additional for every 50 tons such vessels may measure over 400 tons.

All Steamers, not otherwise exempted by the Pilotage Acts, shall pay the following rates of pilotage for entering and leaving the port of St John, N. B: Inward.—First district, from Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing

N w, per foot draft of water, \$1.25.

Second district, from Musquash Head to Point Lepreaux, per foot draft of water, \$1.60.

And thirty cents additional for every 50 tons such steamer shall measure over 400 tons.

It being understood if a steamer drop two anchors in the harbor on arrival,

she is considered moored, and any removal is a transportation.

A Chronometer keeping correct Greenwich time should then show 5h 24m 15s, and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock when the Ball drops, represents 5h 24m 15s at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained, no matter where the ship is lying Masters of vessels arriving at Saint John should compare their Chronometer by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. 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

#### AGRICULTURAL.

#### Keep the Weeds Down.

Set the cultivator to work early. Do not wait for the corn and potatoes to get large and strong, but as soon as the rows can be seen the cultivator should be set at work. Delay at this gives the weeds time to get a strong stand and a deep rooting, when it will be much more difficult to destroy them. The time to hoe is just before the weeds make an appearance. This applies to the field and garden alike. Then there are no weeds to trouble, and all that is called for is to simply stir the surface of the ground. This is an easy and simple operation compared with the tearing out and destroying a matted growth of deep-rooted weeds. The modern practice of substituting the horse and implement for the former hand work is based on this early attention to the fields. If the fields were deeply stirred and properly fixed before the planting, no deep working is called for in the hoeing. A stirring of the surface only, done early and often, is all that is called for. No neglect or delays are admissible at this time. The farmer must be prompt and active if he would keep ahead of his work and ahead of the weeds. This will be found much the cheaper crurse in the end. Less work is required, the land will be cleaner, and crops will be heavier.—Maine Farmer.

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#### Spinach.

This is one of the easiest things to grow in the whole garden list of vegetables, and yet how many gardens there are among our farmers in which it never makes its appearance. There is nothing in the range of what we call "greens" to be compared to spinach, which will grow at all seasons of the year, and a bed may be sound in October, and as hard frost comes on can be lightly covered up, and be ready for cutting earlier in the Spring than any other crop, except perhaps rhubarb. It is a common sight to see women and children in the Spring hunting the edges of woods and stirring up the leaves of old hedges along fences, etc., for the young "poke" plant to be used as greens. This consumes much time and frequently ends after hours of labour in obtaining only half enough for a meal. Spinach seed is very cheap, and leaving a small portion of a bed run to seed, enough can always be had on hand for sowing, and this sowing can go on throughout the season, affording a supply at times.—Germantown Telegraph.

#### Watch the Potato Vines.

The Colorado potato beetle is an enemy which is very apt to come on the grower unexpectedly. After looking for signs of his approach in vain for days and often weeks, the first thing the grower knows the vines are alive with larvæ and much damage has been already done. Whenever the weather is extra hot and dry the eggs hatch out in a single day by myriads, while in a cold or wet time many of the eggs will not hatch and the larvæ perish before they can begin to eat.

#### Drawing Damp Grain to Barns.

It is better to wait until grain has thoroughly dried out before drawing to stacks or barns. A little dampness will often spoil it before threshing, or be still worse if the ercip is threshed immediately and then put in bins. Last year the season at harvest was so damp that millers would not take new wheat

in large quantities unless they had old wheat to mix with it. In the farmers' granaries there is little chance that such precautions will be taken. Hence wheat should be left in the field until dry enough so that it can be taken to the barn without danger of injury.—Exchange.

#### Pruning Tomatoes.

Pruning tomatoes is a profitable practice in most cases. The process, when judiciously pursued, is not laborious or expensive. A pair of stout shears will answer the purpose admirably. A heavy pruning is not to be desired. The plant needs its leaves, and fruit ripened on plants which have been too heavily pruned is less palatable than that grown on vines which have not been pruned at all. On rich soils tomatoes tend to run to vines. This rampant growth should be checked by cutting off the ends of the shoots. Leaves should be left on the branches beyond the fruit. The pruning should be done early, just as soon as the fruit begins to form, or even while the flowers are still on. In some soils and in some situations pruning is not necessary.—American Cultivator.

Cultivation Develops Fertility.

The lack of manure for hoed crops may be partially remedied in moderately rich soil by thorough cultivation to develop fertility already in the soil. It is certainly a wasteful practice to manure heavily and then let the fertility be wasted on weeds. Better do some extra cultivation, more than is necessary to destroy weeds, especially if the soil be moist enough to work readily, that is, just enough, so that it will not compact after stirring. At this time cultivation does the most good in stimulating plant growth.

#### Water Supply for Orchards.

As the country grows older, the vegetable matter found in virgin soil is washed out or otherwise lost in frequent cultivation. This makes it less absorptive of water, and in dry summers orchards cannot get enough water to make needed growth and form fruit buds for the coming year. This is oftener the cause of failure in all kinds of fruits than is generally supposed. One good effect of underdraining is to make the soil more porous, and thus enable it to retain water until time of need.

#### Phosphate for Beets.

Where farmers use phosphate for grain they soon get into the habit of applying it to other crops. The latest is beets. The grain drill was run through the field distributing phosphate through the two outside and middle tubes or in rows twenty-eight inches apart. Then the garden drill was used to put in the beet seed following these rows. In one place the beet seed was drilled seven inches outside the line for a few feet, and there the beets a month after planting were searcely above the surface, while on the phosphated lines the beets were at least three times as large a month after planting. Phosphate is known to be excellent for turnips of all kinds, and the success of this experiment shows the advantage of giving it a trial on other roots and crops as well.

#### Keep the Ground Covered.

Says an American Exchange:—To prevent loss from washing, leaching, or evaporation, something should be growing on the land at all seasons when growth is possible. In corn and potato crops the cultivation during the

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summer develops more plant food than the crops can use. If winter wheat can be sown after these hoed crops, it will save what would otherwise be wasted. If it cannot, winter rye should be sown to plough under in the spring. Rye is better than wheat for this purpose, as it will grow at lower temperatures, is hardier in winter and makes a large growth early for plowing under.

Wet Places in Fields.

Some of the greatest advantages of underdraining are found in putting tiles in fields that in most places are dry enough already. In a wet time, ploughing, cultivating, or other work on the entire field is suspended until these places get into condition to work. The loss from this is most noticeable in hoed crops, as corn or potatoes, where weeds get the advantage and double or treble the labor after cultivation. With a field dry in parts this evil may be avoided.

Curing Cloddy Soil.

A great deal is said about pulverizing the clods which turn up in the most heavy land after ploughing. Prevention is the best cure. If the field is well drained and not ploughed when wet there will be no clods. It will, however, take two or three seasons to thoroughly fine the soil that has been injured by previous mismanagement. Fall ploughing, turning the land in ridges and leaving it as rough as possible, so us to expose the moist surface to the frost, will do the work. But unless there are underdrains to carry off the water the ploughing will do as much harm as good.

#### Swamp Lands.

After thorough draining has been tried, and the swamp still remains wet, consider whether there is not on your farm a sand hill from which you may cart sand. It makes most excellent grass soil when mixed with the soft soil of the swamp. Of course the work should be done in the winter. Sand works very easily then. But it is in the summer, when the farmer is over his grounds, and when he sees everyday necessities, that his mind most sensitively takes in the weak situations, and he may have remedies suggested to him. With fertilizers this sand and swamp land can be made to bear good grass. Such land, with its natural moisture, would make magnificent pasture ground during a drouth. The grass would be very succulent. He who reclaims an acre of swamp has made the price of that acre by his work.

#### Horse Stabling.

Stable accommodation is very imperfect in many farms. The only rule by which the length of a stable can be regulated is the number of stalls required, and these should never be less than from five feet six inches to six feet wide. It is desirable that the width of a stable for farm horses be at least eighteen feet, in order that ample space may be available behind them. It has for some time been, and still ought to be a desideratum in the construction of the stable to have the walls built high—it may be higher than any other portion of the farm-steading—and the apex of the roof "open." When the building is high and "open" horses thrive much better than in stables which are small and close. Small stables are very objectionable, being generally badly ventilated and injurious to the equine constitution. The temperature in the stable should be about fifty-degrees in winter, and from fifty-five to sixty degrees in the summer. Purity of atmosphere is essential to the strong,

healthy, and muscular development of all animals, and especially horses. The partitions between the horses should never be shorter than about nine feet, two feet of which is required for the manger.

#### Cracked Heels, Mud Fever, and Grease.

No more annoying diseases exist in the list of maladies to which animals are liable than cracked or chapped heels, mud fever, and that peculiar affection of the skin of the heels and fetlock joints which, from the greasy nature of the discharge which issues from the surface, is commonly designated "grease."

Cracked heels arise from exposure to wet and cold, and it may be concluded that the mechanical effects of dirt and grit are contributory to the general

result

Mud fever may be looked upon as an extension of the state of irritation,

which, in its more limited form, is the beginning of chapped heels.

Grease, at least in its early stage, is the outcome of the influence of the causes referred to. In the more advanced condition the disease assumes a malignant character, which defies the skill of the experienced veterinarian.

In the early stages of "grease," an antiseptic and astringent lotion may be used with advantage, and the well-known preparation, Sir William Burnett's Disinfecting Fluid, (cloride of zine) is very useful for this purpose; and indeed in all cases of slight abrasions of the skin, sore shoulders, wrung withers, and also in all instances of wounds accompanied with fetid discharge. A lotion of convenient strength for general use is made by adding 1 pint of the fluid to 50 parts of water. In the undiluted form, the disinfecting fluid is a caustic and poison; care must therefore be taken to keep it in a secure place.

The several diseases of the skin of the legs above named may be to a great extent prevented by the adoption of a plan of management which is perfectly simple, and at the same time effectual, as the experience of many years has shown. Ordinarily, horses on returning from work have their legs, and probably a portion of their bodies, scraped and washed. The subsequent process of drying, if attempted at all, is imperfectly performed, and the surface of the skin is left moist and cold, until the natural heat of the body causes the evaporation of the moisture at the cost of a large expenditure of heat. Considerable disturbance of the function of the skin may be traced to the effects of the evaporation. The occurrence of mud fever, and the different forms of disease which have been mentioned, is thus explained.

A happy inspiration induced some one to adopt the expedient of leaving the wet mud on the legs of the horse returned from work, to form a protective covering while the drying process is proceeding. On the following morning the dried mud was brushed off without difficulty, and forthwith "chapped heels," "mud fever," and "grease" ceased to appear in the stables where this

plan was adopted.

Further experience has shown that if mud can be washed off at once by driving the animal into a pond, and then continuing the journey home, no harm results. The mischief is done by the washing, especially if warm water is used, when the animal has arrived home, and is to remain stationary for the night in the stable.

In the case of hunters it is considered advisable to wrap the muddy legs in flannel bandages; hay bands will form an effective substitute in the case of the farm horse, but the essential thing is to refrain from any washing or attempt

to remove the mud until it is dry enough to be brushed off.

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When cracked heels or mud fever have actually occurred, a very useful application for the relief of irritation will be found in a vixture of vaseline, 8 parts, with trisnitrate of bismuth, or white lead, or o ide of zinc, 1 part, which may be kept ready for use, and applied once or twice a day.—Prof. C. T. Brown.

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Fighting Insects.

Bulletin No. 9, of the Massachusetts Experiment Station, gives the following as the best means of destroying the many insects that make havoc among the crops of the farm and garden:—

Cabbage Flea.—The first insect of importance that appears is the small black flea or jumping beetle that attacks the cabbage, radish, turnip, etc. Dusting with Paris Green mixed with 100 times its weight of plaster has proved an effectual remedy. Apply when the plants are wet and after every rain.

The Cut Worm of which there are several species, including the army worm, works only during the night, and may be destroyed by the same remedy as above. We advise a trial of Pyrethrum Powder mixed with five times its bulk of plaster as being more safe, although we have no positive proof that it will be effectual.

The Striped Squash Bug which has been so abundant for the past two seasons, is best kept in check by pluster and Paris Green. For the family garden the safest and most satisfactory way is to make bottomless boxes, 12 inches square, and 6 or 8 inches deep, and covered with mosquito netting; one of these placed over each hill until the plants have become tough and hard, is a sure protection.

The Potato Beetle.—Paris Green extended with plaster, flour, or water, is the only cheap and easily applied remedy known at present, but great care must be exercised in its use, and especially in the place where the package is kept, that it may not get upon the food of animals.

The Cabbage Worm, the larva of the common white butterfly, may be easily destroyed. Hand picking, if begun before the first brood has passed into the perfect state, is effectual. Pyrethrum Powder mixed with five times its bulk of plaster and dusted into the centre of the leaves with sulphur bellows is certain destruction to every one of them. The application of insecticides in liquids to the cabbage has not been satisfactory on account of the peculiar structure of the leaf surface which allows the water to roll off in drops and not adhere to any part of it. Paris Green is unsafe to use after the leaves have become over four inches in diameter.

The Currant Worm should be destroyed, while small, with the dust of hellebore or pyrethrum. The latter being perfectly harmless is to be more highly recommended.

Apple and Peach Borer.—For the destruction of these two insects no sure remedy has been found except the knife. It is probable that covering the trunk of the tree near the ground with the ink or tar used to catch canker worm moths, or wrapping around the trunk bands of tarred paper, would assist in keeping them away.

The Rose Bug has thus far been the most difficult to overcome of the whole tribe of injurious insects, and we can recommend no remedy with a great degree of confidence, but would advise the trial of the fumes of gas tar held under the vines a short time every evening while the grapes are forming. It is certainly offensive to them, and if used carefully need not injure the plant.

Rose Slugs are easily destroyed by spraying with water and pyrethrum at the rate of one tablespoonful of the latter to a pailful of the former.

#### Hints for Young Horsemen.

Never, says a writer in the American Culticator, pass behind a horse in the stable nor place your hand upon him in the stall, without first speaking to him. You may save life or limb by bearing this in mind. Be kind in word and manner to all horses. Do not whip even a "contrary" or baulky horse, make him forget his ill or stubborn intent in some way, such as putting a little dry dirt in his mouth, or wrapping a mitten of newspaper about one or both ears; in studying to know what it means he soon forgets his notion of stopping, and at the prompt, decided, but not angry voice of his master, he moves along. In case of any accident, do not shout and appear frightened; your excitement will at once be communicated to the horse. Instead, you should pacify and reassure him with firm, kind tones.

Form a habit of glancing all over your horse and harness before starting from the door. It may save life. In the winter be sure and have the bits covered with cloth or leather. On the road you may go pretty fast down hill and on level ground, if you are a good driver, but don't hurry up hill; never do so with a load; short pulls and rests by "trigging the wheels" will prolong the service of your horse.

Never feed a horse on musty hay; it may do for cows and oxen, but often brings fatal lung diseases upon horses. Hay that is dusty from ordinary road dust blown over it in a dry time should be well shaken and sprinkled before being fed to horses.

Do not feed a horse when his blood is heated; give him a moderate drink of water and let him cool off gradually, and then do not overfeed. Many a horse has been killed by not observing this injunction. Feed well when your horse is working hard, but give more grain than hay. If he is having a vacation of several days or weeks, cut his feed down from a quarter to one-half. Rake up plenty of oak leaves for bedding, if you have not straw; give your horse a good bed, but do not have sticks, pebbles, or frozen manure among it; lying down on such, the horse rises and "paws" away his bedding, and thus learns a bad trick.

Never run after a horse in the pasture. If he does not like to be eaught, feed him a little grain in a pail, but never deceive him with an empty dish. You can soon teach the wildest horse to come to you; when he does come, let him eat a little while before you lead him off. When you "turn the horse out to pasture," do not give him a slap with the bridle; he will remember it to your regret if you do. Make a pet and a friend of your horse; it will improve him and make a better person of you. If you can't afford to feed high, give good air to your horse. Nature has provided enough of this for both of you, and transports it free; do not rob him of his share, for it "will not enrich you, but make him poor indeed." Therefore keep open a window where heaven may send a fresh supply to him!

#### Preparing Produce for Market.

To be successful in market gardening requires not only a practical knowledge of how to produce crops to the best advantage, but it also requires a knowledge of how to select and prepare the produce for the maket. While in a provision store the other day, we examined some asparagus, which appeared to be very good in quality, except a half dozen small stocks placed nearly in the middle, but the tying up was very poor, being very loosely tied, so that with the small stalks it made a very poor appearance. The half dozen small

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stalks did not add to the size of the bunch, because they fitted in between the large ones, but on inquiry we found that this asparagus was purchased 25 cents a dozen less than the price of asparagus well put up; thus the grower, by selecting his asparagus with a miserly hand, has lost at least 20 cents per dozen bunches; the loss by proper selection would not exceed 5 cents per dozen bunches, and it would not have cost anything more to have tied it up as it should be. Estimating 300 dozen bunches as the product of an acre, the loss by bad tying, and improper selection, would amount to \$60 an acre each year, which would be a good profit.

What is true of asparagus, is true of nearly all other crops; by leaving in a few beets or turnips of an inferior quality, the whole product is injured and must be sold at grently reduced prices. As a rule a poor quality of produce is not worth sending to market; when it is, it should be sent separate from the good, and sold for what it is worth; for when mixed with first quality it reduces the price of the whole so much, that it would be much better to throw it away.

To be successful in marketing one needs first to build up a reputation for careful selection and honest packing, so that the dealer may rely on what you send him as being as good in the middle of the package as it is on the outside. When such a reputation is once built up there will be no difficulty in always having a ready sale for whatever may be grown, and at prices that will give a fair profit, when he who relects with a miserly aim, sells at cost. The buyer is quick to detect little stocks of asparagus, or wormy apples, though one be put in the middle of the bunch, and the other in the middle of the barrel.—Massachusetts Plonghman.

#### An Inexpensive Incubator.

The American Agriculturist gives the following plan for a simple and cheap incubator: "The incubator is made of three boxes six inches deep. first, or bottom box, has no top, and the floor is perforated with ten or twelve half-inch holes, in which are inserted ten tubes to admit air. This is called The second box, the egg drawer, has no top or bottom, but a piece running lengthwise on the bottom, on which the eggs are placed. The third box has a zinc bottom, the top and sides being of wood. This is called the heater. At the rear of this box is a tin elbow, not bending into it, but extending downwards outside. The three boxes being placed one on the other, first the ventilator, second the egg drawer, and last the heater, have now an incubator with three divisions, the top one being heated with a lamp inserted in the elbow. The draught from the lamp is caused by two or three tubes extending from within half an inch of the zine upwards through the top of the incubator, and at the opposite end of the lamp. The whole is covered with a large box, eight inches larger in every direction. Top, bottom and sides filled with sawdust. The heat, smoke and impurities enter the heater, warm the zinc, and pass out at top of the tubes. The eggs in the drawer underneath are kept at a temperature of 102 degrees."

#### The Digestibility of Bran.

Prof. G. Kuehn has reported to the Agricultural Department at Moeckern, Germany, the results of the extensive experiments he has made as to the increase of the digestibility for cattle of bran moistened and soaked in cold or boiling water, and mixed as soup with other food, as hay. The results, principally negative, were as follows:—Moistening bran with cold water, up to 30 per

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cent., immediately before feeding, gave no appreciable increase in the albuminoids or protein digested. Soaking for twenty-four hours in cold water was also negative in results on mixed food, or its components, as long as the soak water did not reduce the water drank to less than 50 per cent. of the ordinary amount as observed. But when the water drank fell below 25 per cent. as above, a decrease of the protein digested resulted. Scalding bran with boiling water, and soaking it for twenty-fours in the same, decreased the normal digestion of the protein; while the higher the temperature of the water, and the longer its application, the less the amount of protein digested. This is attributed to the fact that heat injures the albuminoids for digestion, as in the case of hard-boiled eggs in the human stomach. The separate feeding of bran soup did not change the results.—American Miller.

#### Pruning.

Barry, of the Mount Hope Nurseries, contended several years ago that where the buds of any shoot or branch do not develop before the age of two years, they can only be forced into activity by a very close pruning, and in some cases this even will fail. There never was a better authority in such matters than Mr. Barry. This last principle shows the importance of pruning the main branches of espaliers particularly, so as to ensure the development of the buds of their successive sections and to preserve well the side shoots thus produced, for without this the interior of the tree will become naked and unproductive, and a remedy will be very difficult.

#### Food and Drink.

Try to remember, says Fanny Field, that fowls need less food in summer than in winter. Over feeding is a fruitful source of disease in hot weather. When on free range, and insects are numerous, fowls will pick up a good share of their living; with the addition of plenty of sour milk and a scant ration of oats or wheat daily, they will keep in better health, and in better laying trim, than fowls fed liberally with corn and cornmeal. I am not prepared to say that ordinarily impure or dirty water will actually cause disease, but it is well enough to keep on the safe side, by supplying pure, fresh water, and milk, of course, when you can get it.

#### Mulching Young Trees.

A great point with newly planted trees is to keep the roots moist and cool during the summer heat. This is best attained, not by profuse watering, but by mulching the surface around the tree with leaves, coarse manure, spent tan, er even hay. Near terminal stations of railroads, the mingled sawdust and droppings from stock-cars answer admirably. Such a mulch prevents evaporation, keeps the ground cool, and promotes the growth of the small roots upon which the life of the tree depends. In winter it protects the roots from sudden freezing and thawing, though care must be taken not to furnish a harbour for mice. With evergreen trees such treatment is almost indispensable. Many trees that have been planted for years, quinces especially, are benefitted by mulching.

Roots in Drain Tiles.

A German paper states that the penetration of roots in drain tile, which sometimes occasions much trouble, may be prevented by covering the joints in the vicinity of trees and shrubs and red clover with earth in which a little coal tar has been distributed.

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#### The Narrow Dock.

This weed is occasionally used for greens by old-fashioned housewives, but there are many better plants for this purpose. It often becomes a great pest on rich deep soil, where the roots penetrate to a great depth. When the stem has become tough enough to allow pulling, the plant should be removed, root and all. Just after a heavy rain is the best time for this. The roots should be hung up in some dry place until they become dry enough, and then burned. If any part of the root touches the ground it will grow as soon as rain comes.

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#### Garden Slugs.

Garden slugs, says an exchange, when they become a nuisance, may easily and safely be abated. Distribute pretty liberally over the garden flat pieces of stone or bits of slate or zinc. At nightfall put a little bran on each iragment, and soon the slugs will come out from among the plants and shrubs to feed upon the bran. When it is dark go out with a lantern and a pail containing some strong brine, and remove the slugs from the bran-baited surfaces and place them in the pail, where the salt and water will soon dispose of the pests.

#### Potatoes in Hills.

With hills three feet apart each way one bushel of merchantable potatoes should give a yield of 162 bushels per acre. This is much more than the average yield in the country, by which we may see how unnecessarily large is the area on which this important crop is grown. Good potatoes, well cared for, should yield a bushel to twelve hills. We have in single hills grown at the rate of a bushel to every six hills, or more than 800 bushels per acre.

#### Salt for Beans.

Beans are one of the crops for which it would be thought salt was not needed. But an old farmer informs us that a little sprinkled on the rows of beans just as the plants are coming up makes them more vigorous and greatly increases the profusion of pods. The salt probably acts on the soil, releasing plant food that would otherwise remain inert.—Exchange.

#### Consumption in Cows.

The sanitary police are about to take a census of the 2,400 cow stables in the city of New York, says the N. Y. Herald. When the census is completed the inspectors will examine the cows to ascertain whether any are suffering from tubercular consumption. All so afflicted will be killed. The inspectors have the co-operation of the United States authorities in this work, and a united effort is to be made everywhere to stamp out consumption in cows. Physicians say that a consumptive cow can communicate tuberculosis in her milk to human beings. How contagious consumption is considered by the city physicians is shown by the fact that the consumptives in the Charity Hospital are now separated from the other patients.

#### Turpentine and Insects.

Turpentine has so strong an odor that it will prevent depredations of most insects, and on a small scale is one of the best applications that can be made. A corn-cob dipped in turpentine will keep cucumber and squash bugs from the hill to which it is applied. If hung in plum trees it will prevent attacks of the curculio.

#### Cleanliness in Milk Cellars.

One cause of much of the bad butter in market is the unclean condition of many farmers' cellars. Decaying vegetables taint the air, and their odors are absorbed by the milk, to reappear in whatever is made from it. If the meat barrel becomes at all tainted, it should be at once removed. In fact, wherever milk and cream are kept in cellars they should be kept in different rooms from the pork barrel.

Working in Beans.

Whatever is done in cultivating beans needs to be done quickly. The beans very soon get into the blossoming stage, and stirring the soil at this time will cause rust and blight, especially if heavy rains follow to soil the leaves. As this work comes at the very busiest season in the Summer, the bean crop is more apt to be neglected than any other, and to be very weedy at harvest.

#### Hilling Potatoes Early.

While some earth should be drawn around potato plants to prevent the tubers from becoming sunburned, this work should not be done too early. It is the last job done to the crop before harvesting, and if completed very early the soil fills with weeds, to the injury of the crop. Just as the tubers are about to form is the proper time for hilling up.

#### Water for Hogs.

No matter how sloppy the food given to pigs, they should have daily a good supply of clean, fresh water. This is especially needed in summer for pigs kept in pens and with little green food. But there is scarcely a place where pigs can be kept where more or less green food cannot be had as part of their daily ration. Weeds from the garden are excellent, especially the pigweed and purslane, both of which are very nutritious.

#### Red Root in Clover Fields.

Where wheat is long grown on the same land it will require careful hand weeding to prevent the spread of red root. One unsuspected cause of its increase is its growth in clover fields in the years succeeding the wheat crop; in fact, this is the chief trouble, as in the wheat the practice usually is to pull the red root out by hand, which is seldom or never done in clover fields. If there are many of any kind of weeds in clover the better way is to plough the clover under before the weeds go to seed. This is much better than carrying the weed seeds in the hay to the barn, to be thence distributed over the farm.

#### Wind-Breaks.

Some protection from high winds is almost a necessity to successful fruit growing, and especially to apple growing. While it is a matter of doubt if wind-breaks do much good as a Winter protection, there can be no doubt that much fruit and much injury to trees are saved by a protecting belt of trees. When apples are two-thirds or more grown high winds whip them off, and always the most in those orchards most exposed. In such orchards crotches are apt to be split and branches broken. A heavy wind in the Winter after an ice storm often does grent damage. It is, therefore, desirable that the wind-break be wide enough to check the force of the winds after leaves are fallen, or that it be composed of evergreens.

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
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




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#### Grafting-How to do it.

Every farmer's boy should learn how to graft. Few occupations give more pleasure or a greater reward. To convert a wild and thorny tree into one bearing large and delicious fruit is a wonderful and fascinating process. The kind of grafting most likely to be practised on the farm is that known as cleft grafting. Saw off the limb to be grafted where it is an inch or less in diameter; trim the edges of the "stub," smooth and split it with a large knife or a cleaver made for the purpose. The cleft should not be more than four inches deep at the most. A wedge is now inserted in the centre of the cleft, and a cion is set on each side of the cleft. The cions are made of twigs of last year's growth. They should be cut before the trees show any signs of starting in the spring. When the cion is prepared ready for setting it should contain about three buds. The lower end is cut wedge shaped by slicing off each side of the cion. On one side of this wedge-shaped portion, and midway between its top and bottom, should be left one of the buds. When the cion is set this bud will be deep down in the side of the cleft in the stub, and will be covered with wax; but, being nearer the source of nourishment, it will be the most apt of any buds to grow, and it will readily push through the wax. The cion is set into the cleft by exercising great care that the inner surface of the bark on the cion exactly matches the inner surface of the bark on the stub. A line between the bark and the wood may be observed. This line on the cion, in other words, should match the line on the stub. Wax the whole over carefully and thoroughly. Do not leave any crack exposed. Grafting wax is made as follows: - Melt together rosin, beeswax, and tallow in equal parts and spread on cotton cloth. Tear into slips and wrap round graft.

#### Weeds in Clover.

There are some kinds of weeds whose presence in clover fields is presumptive evidence of bad management. Sorrel is one of these. The fields that are red with this pest now have probably been heavily pastured the previous season, or were so sterile in places that the clover seed either did not grow or the plant had too little vigor to maintain its supremacy against weeds. On rich, well-cultivated soil clover will usually keep all weeds under, at least so far that what scattering weeds remain may be destroyed by hand-pulling.

The best guard against the coddling moths is for every farmer who has an orchard, to keep sheep or swine running in it all the season through. These will eat up every infected apple and thus destroy the larvæ which, if left unmolested, will bring forth a crop of pests for next year's crop. If every one would do this, it is safe to assume that the ravages of these pests would be materially decreased

The most satisfactory remedy for cabbage worms tried in the New Jersey experiment station was a mixture of half a pound each of hard soap and kerosene, in three gallons of water. It was applied near the end of August, and destroyed in a few hours nearly all the worms on the cabbages to which it was applied. Other remedies which were not successful were pepper, saltpetre, etc.

A correspondent of the Country Gentleman says that for orchards the healthiest of all soils is a sandy soil, growing the healthiest wood and fruit, and adding to the soundness and flavor of the latter, secured no doubt by the more ready admission of fresh rain water and air. В.

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
