



Rumor Is Believed to Have Been Spread at Shanghai to Aid Rebel Cause-Revolutionists Organize Local Cabinet.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 6 .- A Chinese report that Pekin has fallen and the emperor has fled has caused a wide sensation, but a private telegram from Pekin, timed 2 o'clock this afternoon, makes no mention of such an occurrence.

It is thought here that the report is intended to assist the rebel cause locally.

LONDON, Nov. 6 .- The Reuter Telegram Company's latest despatch from Pekin direct, dated to-day, 7.28 p.m., makes no mention of the fall of the city.

Court Terror-Stricken.

LONDON, Nov. 7 .- A Pekin despatch to The Times, dated Nov. 6, says that trustworthy information from the court shows that the court is paralyzed wit fear. It will remain at Pekin, whatever happens, says the correspon-dent, but many princesses and noble ladies have sought the protection of the foreign concessions.

A despatch to The Daily Mail from Rangoon, British India, gives reports that Chinese troops in Tengyuch, in the Province of Yun-Nan, which borders on Burms, mutinied on Oct. 27. killing Gen. 



KILLEP BY UNKNOWN MAN

Corner's Jury So Finds in Case of Late J. W. Dick-Detectives Hopeful.

The inquest into the death of J. Wal-ter Dick has been brought to a close with a verdict of death on Oct. 7, as

the result of being struck by a man unknown to the jury, at the corner of Toronto and King-streets. Every clue has been followed, but without result. Several times the To-ronto police have felt sure of their man, but have not had sufficient evi-

dence on which to proceed. The provincial constabulary depart-

ment, a fortnight ago, was instructed to investigate. Every man under Chief Rogers was instructed regarding the whole affair and some were specially commissioned to follow up every pos-sible clue, whether it at first sight appeared to be well grounded or not. This merely meant that the provincial police interviewed the same people that the Toronto detectives had done. They could go no farther, and the result is that the case stands with no arrest having been made.
