FACULTES OF ME AND WOMEN EQUAL &

Ambassador Bryce Talks on Education of Women-Would Not Talk of Political Life.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6.-James Bryce, the British ambassador, was the orator to-day at the commencement exercises of Bryn Mawr College, taking for his subject: "Has the Education of Women Distinctive Aims?" Women Distinctive Aims?"

He said that the faculties of men and women are practically equal, and held therefore that the intellectual training fit for the one is fit for the other.
