

ADMIRAL SEYMOUR IN THE TRENCHES

Germans and Russians Suffered the Heaviest Losses in the Fighting Around Tien Tsin Against Chinese Regulars.

Gun Fire of British and American Marines Was Partly Good—British Officer Commanded the Relieving Force—Seymour's Men Fought 15 Days—On Short Rations 10 Days.

London, June 28.—(4 a.m.)—The casualties of the international force attacking Tien Tsin were the following: Americans killed 3, wounded 2; British killed 2, wounded 1; Germans killed 15, wounded 27; Russians killed 10, wounded 27.

NATIVE CHRISTIANS BUTCHERED.

London, June 28.—A telegram from Jardine, Matheson & Company, dated Shanghai, this afternoon, suggests that the Ministers are still at Peking, but admits that there is no news from the capital.

MEANS A DECLARATION OF WAR
