

A Week Ago the Signs That Ross Might Be Beaten: To-Day the Certainty is That Whitney Will Sweep the Province

HEAVY GAMBLE OF 150 MEN IN A FLASH MINERS ENTRAPPED BY AN EXPLOSION

Coal Creek Mines of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company Visited by the Worst Disaster in the History of British Columbia—Heroic Work of Rescuing Parties—Cause Only Guessed At

Fernie, B.C., May 23.—One of the worst coal mining disasters in the history of British Columbia occurred at the Coal Creek mines at 7 o'clock last night, when from 125 to 150 men met almost instant death in mines Nos. 2 and 3. The explosion occurred in the depths of No. 2, and not a man of over 100 employed in that mine escaped to tell the tale. From No. 3 workings, which are connected with No. 2, about 21 men escaped. The first intimation of the disaster which those on the outside received was a rush of coal dust and fire to a height of over 1000 feet above the fans. Word was immediately sent to Fernie, five miles from the mines, and inside of 12 minutes from the time the accident occurred relief parties were at work.

The Dead Recovered.
The dead who were recovered are: Steve Morgan, Joe Sangala, Willie Robertson, Victor Johnson, John Leadbeater, Frank Salter, John McLeod, F. Parnell, Thomas Johnson, and an Italian whose name is unknown. The mine is free from fire, and the bodies will be removed as fast as the afterdamp is cleared from the mine. The rescue parties are working in four-hour shifts, and the company are doing all in their power to assist in the work.

Town Horror-Stricken.
The town is horror-stricken, and heart-rending scenes meet the eye on every side. All day the trains to the mine have been crowded with anxious friends and relatives of the imprisoned men, hurrying to the scene of the disaster. A meeting of the Board of Trade has been called for tonight to organize a relief fund for the sufferers. The cause of the accident is unknown, but the opinion of many is that a blow at national property, or a shot from one of the machines, is the cause of the disaster. The mine is six miles from Fernie, the mining town in the centre of the rich coal fields, and No. 2 shaft is the driest, gasiest of tunnels. As the provincial mineralogist told in a recent report, the management took risks a year ago in the working of the mine in order to hurry the supply, for the demand exceeded the development, and in order to get the coal, the workings were carried off in a cork-screw-like driver, instead of the usual square driver, and other risks were taken.

Since then, however, the conditions were improved, and the report received by the government from its inspector on May 8 states that the mine was then in a safe condition, the ventilation being good, the fans furnishing air about 40 per cent. in excess of the requirements. The report was most favorable, and compared most advantageously with last year's report, which severely criticized the mine. At one time efforts were to have been started to have the mine closed if the full letter of the Mining Act was not obeyed.

Inspector's Warning.
Nos. 2 and 3 mines, in which the explosion occurred, are connected, and the inspector of mines has pointed out in his reports that an explosion in one would be apt to affect the other. No. 2 mine was the mine in which the explosion occurred, and from which most apprehension has therefore always been felt. This mine also gave off gas when the mine was at work, although No. 3 was wet, and an explosion in No. 2 was therefore likely to affect No. 3.

Cause Guessed At.
In one of his reports, Mr. Dick refers to the fact that there were a great many resignations in the mine, and that they were supplied with safety lamps some of them seemed to disregard the fact that a safety lamp was not to be used in a safe lamp at all. The cause of the accident may be found in this fact, but, of course, up to the present time is pure conjecture.

MILITARISM ONLY A BOGEY SIR WILFRID IS ITS AUTHOR

High Ministerial Authorities in London Surprised at Canadian Premier's Denseness—Col. Denison Still Touring the Country for Imperial Protection.

London, May 23.—High ministerial authorities express surprise at the misapprehension that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other Canadians have fallen into regarding the proposals that the British ministry contemplates submitting to the coronation conference in the matter of defence. They say that no British ministry would dream of attempting to impose upon Canada what Sir Wilfrid Laurier has called a system of militarism.

A GUATEMALAN TOWN WIPED OUT IN THREE-QUARTERS OF A MINUTE

Quezaltenango, With a Population of 25,000, Visited by an Annihilating Earthquake—News Travels Across the Atlantic and Back Again.

Hamburg, May 23.—A special despatch to the Hamburg Doersenhalle from Guatemala says that the town of Quezaltenango has been wholly destroyed by an earthquake, which lasted only three-quarters of a minute, and entirely annihilated the town, which had a population of 25,000 people. The town was struck by lightning, which tore about 12 feet off the top of the forest, but inflicted no further damage. A pile of metal checks in the time-keeper's office were scattered about the room by the shock.

BOILER TOOK WINGS. Went Up Forty Feet, But Came Down on a Bed.

Ottawa, May 23.—The boiler of a steam driven work in connection with sewer extension work on Louisa-street blew up yesterday afternoon. The force of the explosion lifted the boiler forty feet in the air, and it crashed down through the roof of George Cairns' house. It landed on top of a bed in a room in the northeast corner, which was smashed to pieces. At the time of the accident John Masson, an unskilled engineer, was in charge of the engine. He was trying to get up 75 or 80 pounds of steam when the boiler flew off on its voyage of discovery. It is said that the boiler was a second-hand one and that the steam pressure put on was more than it could stand. Masson was badly scalded by steam, and a couple of youngsters who were looking on, suffered in the same way.

LIGHTNING BRINGS DEATH.

A Farmer Near Boston, Ont., Struck Down While in His Stable.

TWO RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS.

Wind Blew a Shed Down on Eight Men and Eight Horses Near Windsor.

Waterford, May 23.—During the heavy thunderstorm which swept over this section yesterday afternoon and evening, a sad fatality occurred at Boston, at the home of Mr. William Johnson. Mr. Johnson was in the stable while the storm was raging with wind and rain, and his younger brother, Ralph Johnson, and his father-in-law, Mr. J. Ames Caughy, as well as his wife, were in the stable with him.

TWO RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS.

Windsor, May 23.—Eight men and as many teams of horses were unconscious under a shed on the Walker farm yesterday afternoon when the storm came up. The wind blew the shed down, and the men and horses were all knocked to the ground. Two horses were killed. Archie Hawkins was driven through the air by the wind and was rendered unconscious by the shock. They recovered.

AGREEMENT RATIFIED.

Changes Are More Favorable to the Steel Co. It is Said.

Montreal, Que., May 23.—The directors of the Dominion Steel and Coal Co. met to-day and ratified the agreement between the two companies. The changes are more favorable to the Steel Co. for instance the royalty, which was to have been paid at the rate of 15 cents a ton, has been reduced to 12-1/2, and while the Steel Company assumes the liabilities of the Coal Company it gets all the assets. These changes appear to place the Steel Co. in a better position than formerly.

FIRE AT JARVIS.

Jarvis, Ont., May 23.—A fire occurred to-night in a building owned by Dr. W. W. Howell and occupied as a residence by W. E. Morrow. The building was completely destroyed and only part of the contents were saved and in a damaged condition. There is understood to be a fair insurance, both on building and contents.

AN ARRANGEMENT OF PEACE DEPENDS ON BOER CHIEFS

It Has Been Practically Secured, But Some of the Burghers Are Loth to Acquiesce in the Terms, Which Will Be Found Exceptionally Liberal.

London, May 23.—The Associated Press has every reason to believe that peace in South Africa is practically assured. How soon it will be announced is apparently more upon the convenience of the Boer leaders than upon the inclination of the British government. The private and official agents to-night in London from South Africa all point to the same conclusion. The delay is technical, and to end the long war seems to be the desire of both British and Boer leaders. The latter, however, are unable to convince all their followers of the wisdom of acquiescing in the terms of peace.

Mock Ultimatum Sent.
Information as to what transpired at the day's meeting of the cabinet is closely guarded, but it is not likely that the cabinet transactions were of vital importance. The surest news is that the peace agreement of critically minor importance.

Were the Boers a Thoroughly Disciplined Force, Dependent upon the Action of their General Officers, Peace would probably be proclaimed to-night, but Botha, Dewet and other generals seem themselves unable positively to guarantee the delegates which their example will follow. Delegates at Vereeniging according to information in possession of the War Office, are fairly evenly divided between extreme precautions are exercised both in London and Pretoria to prevent any premature action or report which might adversely influence the burghers.

PRETORIA CHEERFUL.

Pretoria, May 23.—The feeling here, which has been decidedly pessimistic for several days, is now more cheerful, the no real news of the conference between Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner and the Boer delegates has been allowed to leak out. It is known, however, that the delegates came to Pretoria as the result of a complete deadlock at Vereeniging, where the Free States held out for independence, and the majority of the Transvaalers, and the anxious for peace, refused to abandon their allies. This is the cause of the Boer delegation being now here. It was at first thought that the delegates would merely report a refusal to accept the British terms. Everybody expected them to depart immediately, and that hostilities would actively recommence. To the general surprise, however, the delegates are still here, and the hopefulness of to-day is the outcome of the general conviction that some arrangement is pending, which may solve the difficulty at Vereeniging.

FORMERLY OF BRAMPTON.

Winnipeg, Man., May 23.—G. W. Boyd, registrar of the land titles office at Portage la Prairie, died this morning of pneumonia, aged 45. He came from Brampton, Ont., a graduate of Toronto University.



HELD THEIR ANNUAL MEETING

Progress in Sunday School and Epworth League Work.

The annual meeting of the General Sunday School and Epworth League Board of the Methodist Church was held yesterday afternoon.

Representatives from the Toronto, London, Hamilton, Bay of Quinte and Montreal conferences were present.

Rev. Dr. Carman occupied the chair.

The general secretary, Rev. A. C. Crews, presented the quadrennial report of the board, which is to be laid before the General Conference next September.

This report called attention to a decrease in Sunday school scholars and teachers during the past four years, which has been experienced by Methodists in common with all other denominations throughout the world.

Special reference was made to the importance of Sabbath desecration and Sunday amusements toward lessening interest in the Sunday school.

The home department of the school showed a very satisfactory increase. There are now 11,814 members in that department.

The contributions of the schools to missions have increased each year. The total amounted to about \$70,000 for the past four years.

Last year nearly 12,000 scholars from the Sunday schools joined the church.

The Epworth League, in a most satisfactory condition, notwithstanding some falling off in membership. The forward movement in Bible study and evangelistic work has been eminently successful, and will be continued.

Oct. 12 has been appointed as Young People's Day, when the 13th anniversary of the Epworth League will be celebrated.

The contributions for missions from the leagues have increased rapidly during recent years. Last year the handsome sum of \$21,075 was raised.

The reading course continues to be a marked feature of the Epworth League organization. During the past seven years 45,580 volumes have been circulated.

The general secretary announced that the next International Epworth League convention would be held in the city of Detroit in July, 1902.

The following members of the board were appointed as members of the Program Committee for the convention: N. W. Rowell, J. R. Le Starr, Dr. W. E. Willmott, Rev. W. J. Smith and Rev. A. C. Crews.

A number of memorials and suggestions concerning changes in the Epworth League constitution were considered by the board and sent on to the General Conference. A resolution of thanks to the general secretary, Rev. A. C. Crews, was passed.

FROM OUR NEW EMPIRE.

Mr. Stewart Lyon Returns From an Extended Trip Thru the West.

After a two months' trip thru the Canadian Northwest, Mr. Stewart Lyon, editor of the Globe, returned home yesterday.

During his visit he had opportunities of studying the country that are denied to the ordinary traveler, and consequently, his views are of unusual interest.

Mr. Lyon is very enthusiastic over the country. He thinks it is the duty of every journalist in Canada to draw attention to its immense possibilities.

On every hand there are indications of a marvelous growth, and the large influx of settlers has already commenced in earnest.

It is but a fore-runner of what may be expected from now on.

Alberta, Assiniboia and Saskatchewan are particularly favored, and Manitoba, too, is prospering, altho not to the same rapid extent as the Territories.

Mr. Lyon was much impressed with the quickness with which the farmers there got their land under cultivation, and to one from the east it seemed almost impossible that a man could take up his land, erect fences, break the ground and take out a crop all within a year.

He sees in the west Canada's new empire, and brings back word that thousands of Americans are taking up land for settlement.

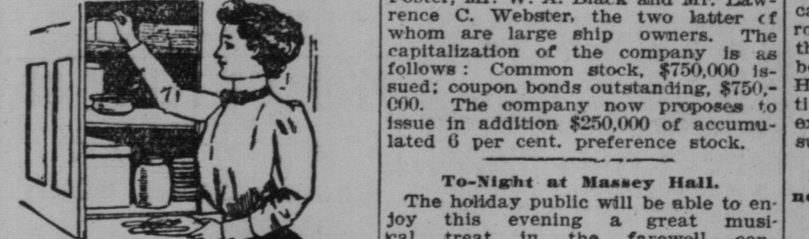

Paris, May 23.—A despatch received here from the Governor of Martinique, M. ALD. CRANE MAKES THREATS

Row in Committee of Works Over the Application of Mr. Gillies for Salary

WHILE HE WAS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Controller Crane Says Gillies is an Unnecessary Officer Holding a Job Thru Influence.

Without mincing matters much Ald. Crane expressed a strong opinion yesterday that the city was paying good salaries for holding positions that were created for them because they had some "influence." He did not define the influence, but he told the Works Committee that something was going to drop soon.

When the committee meeting was over the controller and the City Engineer had a little love talk in the corridor on the lower floor, and it was apparent from the pitch of the controller's voice that opinions differ.

It was in the Works Committee that Ald. Crane warmed up. After Ald. Graham and Ald. Woods had indulged in a few personalities regarding the use of cash by the city to inspect public works, the trouble arose, and it was all over the Bore war.

Ald. Crane spoke with considerable bitterness when the matter of paying Mr. Gillies' salary for the time he was in South Africa came up. "What does Gillies do?" asked the alderman. "He is a former blacksmith," replied Ald. Crane. "I think he is a super-numerary man living on the Bore as a lot of them. He was not in the fighting line. We have refused to pay the money before, but he is persistent, and it keeps coming up, and again," continued the alderman, who was in an emphatic mood. He claimed that Mr. Gillies' position was not filled when he was away in South Africa, which proved that it was an unnecessary position.

Fish and Powl.

Ald. Fleming said that other men in the employ of the city had been paid for the time they were in South Africa, and it was unfair to make fish of one and fowl of the other.

Ald. Hubbard agreed that one man should not be singled out. He presented Ald. Crane had some foundation for his remark regarding the fish and fowl. "I have," said Ald. Crane, "I say it is a fact that Gillies occupies an unnecessary position. What is the former man of a few blacksmiths? He is simply kept there thru influence!"

Ald. Crane's Promise.

Ald. Hubbard thought the Board of Control should take notice of the charges made by Ald. Crane.

"We will take it up," related the controller, "and we will take up something else that is past. Mr. Rust knows about it. He had an investigation once."

Ald. Fleming moved that the amount be paid, and he was supported by Ald. Hall, Hubbard and Woods, while Ald. Crane and Graham voted against it. Some few words from Ald. Crane can be expected when he makes good his threats in the Board of Control.

Favorite Asphalt Plant.

The report of the City Engineer in regard to the purchase of an asphalt plant was taken up, and the committee recommended that Mr. Rust be granted \$75 expenses of a visit to New York to ascertain how the city could obtain a supply of asphalt. The idea of installing a civic plant was favored.

A Sensible Prophecy.

Action was deferred concerning the recommendation for an asphalt pavement on Simcoe-street between King and Front-streets. The Ontario government has neglected to care about its share of the cost. Ald. Hubbard predicted that there would be a new government before the next meeting of a committee, and Ald. Graham said he had been "hearing that ever since he was 10 years old."

Some Minor Matters.

In order to do away with "half numbers" on Walmer-road the houses on that thoroughfare will be re-numbered.

Ald. Fleming was told by the City Engineer that the Toronto Railway Company was favorably considering the extension of the Gerrard-street car tracks to Leslie-street.

The old question of granting residents of the county the use of city trucks came up again, and the committee decided to allow the trucks to be supplied to Mr. Hopland's premises north of East Queen-street and outside the city limits.

Ald. Hall fought hard to have a watchman placed at the Dufferin-street railway crossing, but was unsuccessful. The Engineer informed Ald. Sheppard that the coal strike has made no difference in the price of coal consumed by the city, and he would see that it did not affect the supply to the city if it could possibly be helped.

Victoria Day at Hanlan's.

NO FOOD BUT CORNMEAL

Spring Fishing Off Newfoundland Has Been a Failure.

Sydney, C.B., May 23.—Destitution prevails in several outposts in Newfoundland, according to recent advices, people having no food but cornmeal. The spring fishing has been a failure, which is largely due to the fact that fishermen could not secure adequate pay for their services. As a result of emigration, Canada, Britain and the United States. Hundreds of vessels were laid up for lack of crews to man them. Since the first of January last over 2500 men have arrived at North Sydney from Newfoundland, and 50 or 100 come over on each trip of the steamer Bruce, which is proving a serious drain on the scanty population of the island, and the problem of maintaining her population is bound to form a serious one in the politics of the place. It may hasten confederation, however.

Bullock of the Industrial Financial Corp. The new company is capitalized at \$100,000, and will employ between 30 and 40 hands to manufacture electrical appliances. Operations will be commenced almost immediately.

A UNIQUE VOLCANO. Mont Pelee Believed to Be an Explosive One By Scientists.

Port de France, Martinique, May 23.—Scientists here are of the opinion that Mont Pelee is an explosive volcano, no real lava or moya rock material having been poured out, only mud and steam. The scientists compare the mountain's outflow to the steam of boiling water with the pressure rises to bursting point, and they think it possible that a more violent outbreak may occur. The scientists remark that the explosions have occurred at progressively longer intervals, and that they have also been progressively more violent, thus there had been three great eruptions of the kind, but they also know that after an interval of twelve days, the last treatment of the volcano occurred. A new period of rest is now on, and one of two things may happen. The pressure may be still longer, and then explode with still greater violence, spreading destruction over the entire island. The scientists remain quiescent for another half century. These explosions were unique in the history of the island. They were, in fact, choking, poisonous, blazing gases, hurled forth with fearful velocity and force.

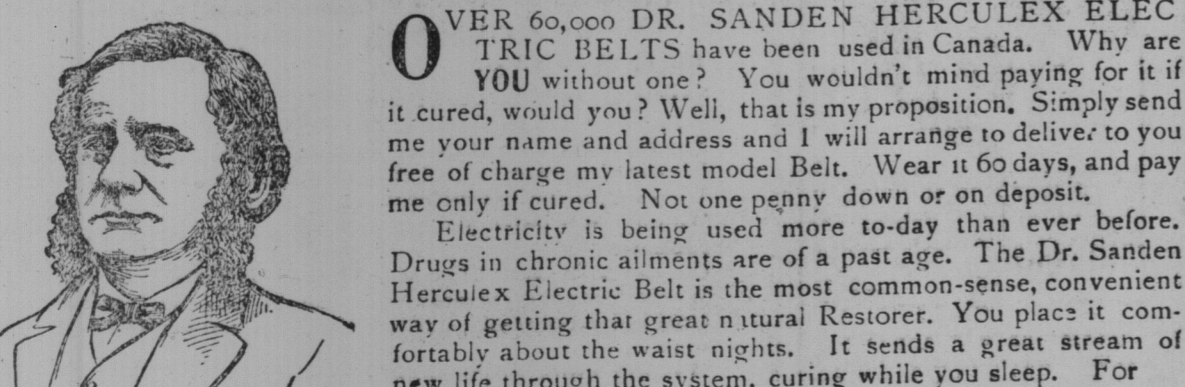

OBSERVANCE OF EMPIRE DAY

Patriotic Exercises in the Normal and Model Schools Joined in By the Scholars

FLOWER PLANTING ON THE 30TH

On That Day 14,500 Flowers Will Be Set Out in the Schoolyards and Windows.

The celebration of Empire Day was participated in yesterday by the pupils of the Model and Normal schools, the celebration in the Public schools being set for May 30, when it will be observed jointly with Arbor Day. On that day 14,500 flowers will be distributed among the pupils for plantation, and patriotic exercises will be held. In the afternoon there will be a parade to Queen's Park, where the monuments will be decorated.

In the Normal and Model schools yesterday morning, the history, extent and resources of the British Empire were reviewed by the teachers, and in the afternoon the scholars were addressed in the assembly hall by Rev. Dr. Croft and Rev. Armstrong Black. Principal Scott explained that the day was set aside to illustrate to the children the growth and importance of the empire. The flowers to be planted next week in the school yards will consist of 14,500 of geraniums. In cases where the school yards are planked, the flowers will be arranged in the school windows.

NO LONGER STAMMERS.

(From The News-Record, Berlin, Ont.)

The editor of The News-Record met Mr. J. S. Hoffman yesterday and was asked if he recalled the stammerer of the florist. Receiving an affirmative reply Mr. Hoffman continued: "You remember how badly he stammered? Well, he has been completely cured and now speaks as easily as you or I."

We interviewed Mr. Ewing, and Mr. Hoffman's statements were fully confirmed. After a four weeks' course of treatment, he has now recovered of a life-long impediment in his speech and is a new man, so to say. He can now participate in any social conversation on any subject. He can pronounce "chrysanthemum" without a quiver.

Investigating the matter further, The News-Record learned that Dr. Arnott has presented a class of four who are being treated for stammering. One of these is John Lane of Chatham, another K. Smith of Sudbury, and another came from Winnipeg to get relief from his sore affliction.

Mr. Lane, on his arrival at Berlin, went to the opera house to buy a ticket. He stammered so badly that the ticket seller did not understand him. He wished to buy the house or was an actor looking for a job. He was even worse than usual on that day. He speaks fluently and easily.

Mr. Ewing's case will come home to every one who knows him here, because he is a Berlin citizen, and many are the congratulations offered him. He informed us that he had tried to get relief at various institutions at Toronto and elsewhere, but at best it was only temporary relief, and he soon relapsed.

Dr. Arnott has been treating stammerers for some years, and has met with pronounced success. The reason of it is that he has made a study of the cause and how to remove it. At stammering institutes they treat the habit instead of the thing that causes the stammering habit. Their system teaches mechanical speech; a sing-song, one word or one syllable artificially accompanied by hand movement. Should the person drop the cumbersome movement, he stammers as badly as ever. Ninety per cent of every twenty so treated go back. The method is physiologically wrong.

He requires no mechanical movement to assist the stammerer. After treatment they speak as easily as if they had never been afflicted with stammering.

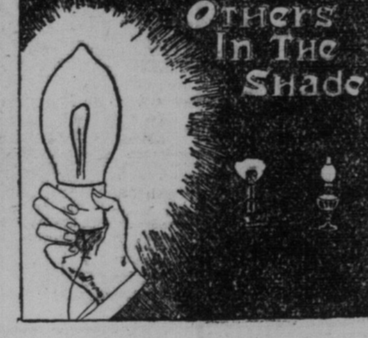

AN UPRIVAL IN THE FUTURE.

Chicago, May 23.—Speaking as a representative man of the colored race in Chicago, Ferdinand Barnett, one of the assistant States attorneys, declared last night that the time is not far distant when the 10th Congress of the United States will forcibly revert against Lynch law.

Mr. Barnett attacked the "Lynch law" as an indignation meeting of colored people, held at Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church, to protest against the recent lynching of Louis F. Wright of Chicago, at New Madrid, Mo. Wright was 22 years old, and resented an attack on the street. He was arrested, and later was hanged. Funds were collected last night to prosecute those who took an active part in the lynching.
