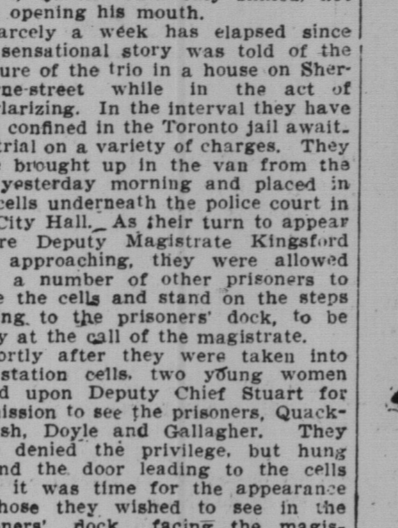

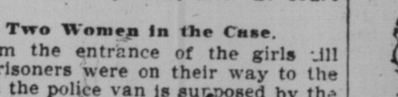

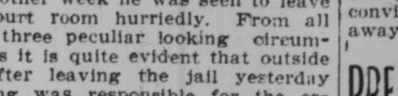

MAKE NATIONAL OWNERSHIP AN ISSUE. There is now hope of a real issue in Canadian politics—something to fight for besides office, something that will make a political career a worthy object of ambition.

It has now lost several opportunities of extending the principle of government ownership of railways. It threw away the chance of a national railway thru the Crow's Nest Pass, of a national railway from Winnipeg to the lakes, of a national railway from the Georgian Bay to Montreal.

EDITORIAL: I see your reporter in his account of what took place at the Railway Committee of the House of Commons, when the Toronto and Hamilton bills were under discussion last Thursday reports as follows: "That in answer to a question by Mr. Maclean if Mr. Evans was willing that control of highways should be taken out of the hands of the municipalities and given to the railway commission, the latter promptly replied that it was a matter of supreme indifference to him what power governed so long as the railway was built."

NO TRACE OF ALLEN. Boston, Aug. 18.—The police have nothing definite to report as to the whereabouts of the missing treasurer, William S. Allen of the New England Preachers' Aid Society, Inspector Morley of Boston, who was hurried to Montreal soon after the disappearance of the steaming and the escape of Allen, had returned to Toronto, Syracuse, N. Y., and Chicago, and a search of small places along the St. Lawrence Valley and the Canadian border, but found no trace of Allen.

Ontario's Crop Forecasts From Official Returns

Summary From Reports of 2000 Correspondents Indicates Prosperity for Farmers.

The following report concerning the crops of the province was issued yesterday by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, and deals with conditions as described by regular correspondents of the Bureau of Industries under date of the 1st of August. It is the summation of the contents of many hundred communications.

Table with columns: Crop, Year, Acreage, Bushels per Acre. Rows include Fall Wheat, Spring Wheat, Barley, Oats, Rye, Peas, Beans, Hay-Clover.

The fall wheat plowed up was 5496 acres, against 8086 in 1902 and 75473 in 1901. The following table gives the area and estimated yields of the principal crops in Ontario, as reported by 2000 special correspondents:

Wheat. The following table gives the area and estimated yields of the principal crops in Ontario, as reported by 2000 special correspondents:

Barley. A large acreage and a big yield fairly describes this crop. Cutting began about the 20th July, and was expected to run a week into August. While some barley had lodged and was discolored by rain, the bulk of the crop is of the highest quality, both in color and weight, while the average yield is one of the most generous yet reported in Ontario.

Oats. While a few correspondents writing on the 1st of August reported the cutting of oats, most of the crop had not yet ripened, and harvest was not yet started. The yield will be large, and the quality of the grain good.

Peas. It is difficult to sum up the exact situation regarding peas, owing to the fact that for the past two or three years the crop has been largely substituted for the common pound field pea, on account of the depression of the pea market.

Hay and Clover. April was too cold and dry for clover, and the present season, which prevailed in May, gave the crop a very poor start.

MURDER AND VIOLENCE IN TORONTO

Horrible Child Murder in Detroit—Negro Runs Amuck and Kills Three.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 18.—The mutilated body of four-year-old Alphonse Weimes, whose father lives on St. Aubin-avenue, was found to-day in a lot at the rear of the Michigan Stove Works. The hands were tied behind with wire, and a red handkerchief had been stuffed down the little fellow's throat for a gag. The body was partly stripped of clothing.
