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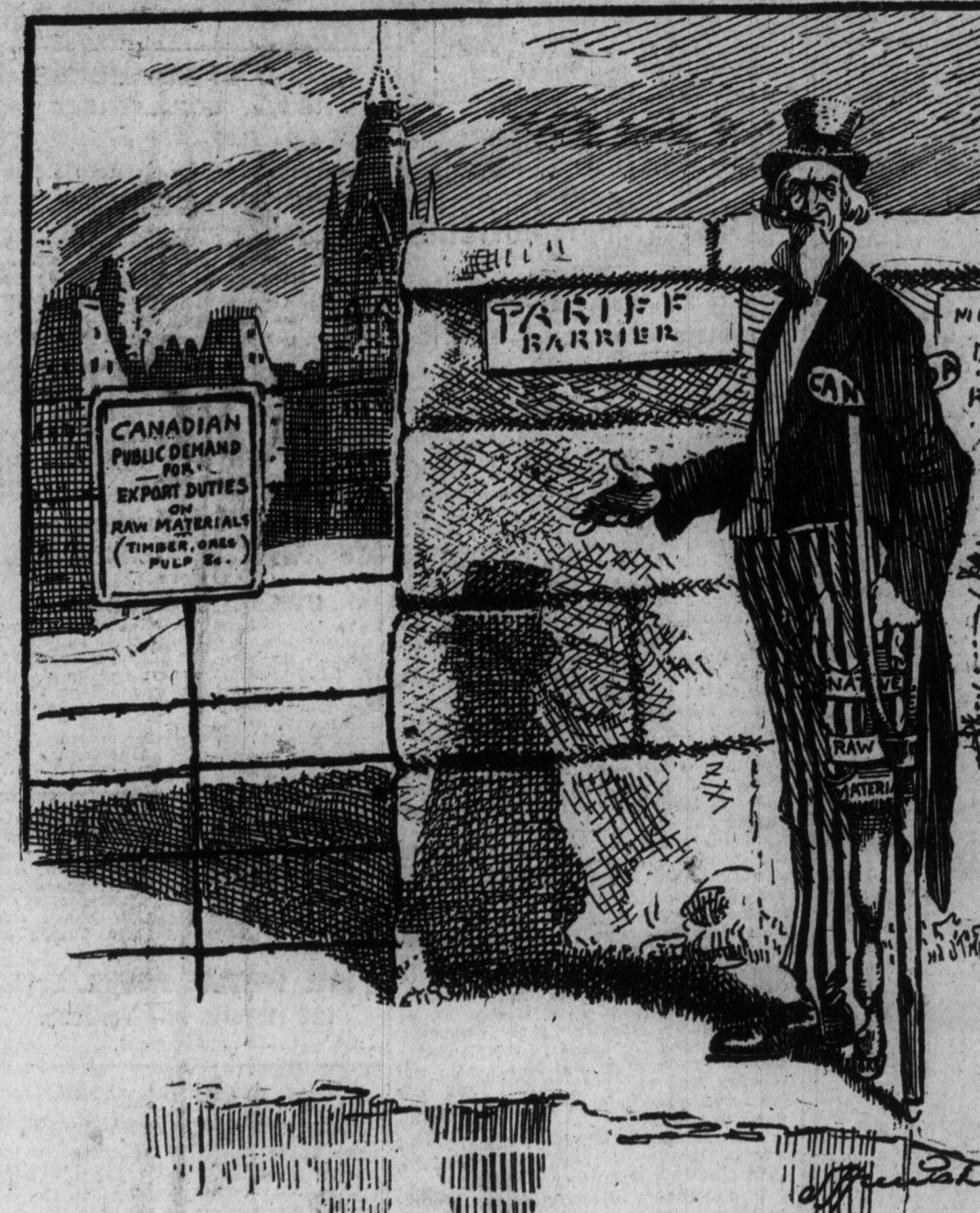

STATE CHURCH OPPOSED BY BISHOP DOWLING

Are But the Work of Men—Carpenters Wage Scale—Happenings.

HAMILTON, May 2.—(Special.)—The Master Builders' Association had a meeting with the journeymen carpenters Saturday night as to the reduction of two cents an hour in the scale of wages. The employers point out that they are some 70 contractors outside of the association, and they told the men that if they could get an agreement with these for the old scale, the association would be willing to sign. The men will remain at work while negotiations are in progress.

MENUS FOR THE WEEK.
For Tuesday.
Breakfast—Baked prunes, corn, oatmeal, milk, creamed dried beef, flannel cakes, coffee.
Dinner—Macaroni soup, roast fowl, mashed potatoes, Spanish onions in cream, romaine salad, cheese, crackers, coffee.
Recipes For Tuesday.
—Flannel Cakes—
Two eggs, 1 pint buttermilk, 1-1/2 pints flour, 1-1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1 teaspoonful baking soda, 1 tablespoonful warm water, and 1 teaspoonful of sugar. Mix flour, salt and sugar, add eggs, water, milk and soda dissolved in the water. Mix thoroughly and bake in small round cakes on a hot, well-greased griddle. Brown on both sides.
—Macaroni Soup—
Three ounces macaroni, 1 tablespoonful butter, 2 quarts stock, salt and pepper to taste. Throw macaroni into boiling water, with pinch of salt, and boil 30 minutes. When it is tender, drain and cut into small pieces, drop it into the boiling stock and cook 20 minutes. Serve grated Parmesan cheese with it. It must be boiled quickly or the macaroni will be tough.

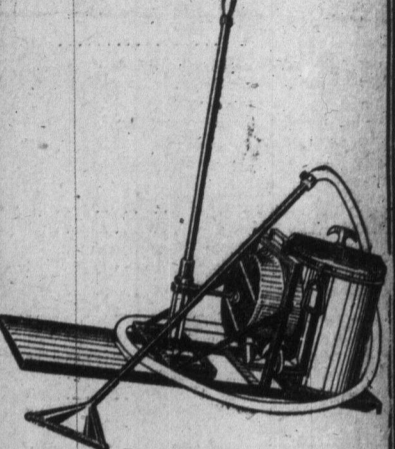

PUBLIC HALLS AND EXITS.

Nearing the end of the theatrical and concert season to be, it is by no means too late to call attention to the point raised by a correspondent regarding the exits at Massey Hall, which the management have shown to be in conformity with the city regulations. Mere conformity with the city regulations is not all that is required. If emergency exits are not in frequent and familiar use by audiences, when a time of panic or danger occurs they might as well not exist.

It is the custom in Great Britain in all places of public amusement to open the emergency doors at the close of every performance, when they are as freely used for the discharge of the audience as the ordinary exits. In this way frequenters of places of amusement are trained and accustomed to make for the nearest exit and very large audiences are dispersed in exceedingly short time. Massey Hall has put this plan in practice for some time past, with the result that the emergency entrances are freely used at every performance. The Royal Alexandra is another honorable exception to the custom of placing red lights over what are practically "dummy" exits, which no one has ever an opportunity to use.

City regulations that do not insist on the constant use of all practicable exits at every performance fall in the most important respect. The police should have instructions to report every instance in which emergency exits are not opened wide and made available at the close of every entertainment, and penalties should be inflicted for non-observance of this necessary practice. A great deal has yet to be done to render many of the public halls in the city reasonably safe. The long, steep, narrow, funnel stairs that lead to several largely used and much frequented halls would be frightful death-traps in case of fire or panic. Every thoughtful person shudders as he ascends these defiles at the vision of such a contingency.

In one of these halls there is or was recently a door near the platform labeled "emergency exit." It was locked and no one had a key. What use is such a provision? The automatic locks and bolts which are in use in some amusement places should be more general. They yield at a touch from within, but are immovable from outside. Periodically this question arises in Toronto, especially when tragedies like the Iroquois horror stir the popular imagination, but the city officials who are responsible for the prevention of some similar gruesome occurrences in Toronto should bestir themselves to put such a thing as far as may be outside of possibility.

THE BRITISH BUDGET AND AFTER. Certain sections of public opinion in Britain appear to have succumbed to as remarkable an attack of hysterics over Mr. Lloyd-George's budget as they did over the naval scare. Yet with the exception of the proposal to tax land values an admirable royalties, the budget simply extends principles already recognized in British finance. The grading of income tax and the death duties, stamp duties on stock exchange contracts and transfers, excise and customs duties on spirits and tobacco all figure now in the balance sheet. No doubt the new scales mean material increases, but to call the schedules revolutionary is to misuse the word.

The chancellor of the exchequer has evidently proceeded on the conviction that taxation should be heaviest on the classes best able to bear it. There is nothing new about that either. The principle of exempting small incomes, of granting abatements to incomes of moderate amount and distinguishing between incomes derived from property and those coming from personal exertion, has been previously sanctioned by the house of commons. It is traditional in British Liberal finance too, that the current expenditure should be met from income, the suspensions of the sinking fund have not been unknown.

The real struggle arises from the alternative policy of tariff reform, which will become the leading issue of the general election should the house of lords force the government's hand by rejecting the budget. Again the question of what the lords will do becomes the centre of public interest, for there is not much doubt the budget will pass the commons substantially as framed, with the possible exception of the increases in the spirit and tobacco impost, which Mr. Redmond is to be accepted, will be resisted strenuously by the Irish Nationalists. Should a general election be compelled, the mix-up of issues will be phenomenal and with the Irish vote hostile, the result may be surprising. But will the lords take the risk?

ALTERNATIVE CANAL ROUTES. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has intimated that financial conditions will not permit of the projected Georgian Bay Canal being commenced this year, but held on to the expectation that next year would see it under way. This delay should be utilized in subjecting the proposal to further and exhaustive examination. The canal is estimated to cost, in round figures, one hundred millions, and it will be

unlike other considerable engineering enterprises of its class if that sum is not ultimately and largely increased. Were the results in the way of time saving and the provision of better transportation facilities likely to compensate for the cost, the expenditure could be justified. But unless it can be clearly shown that sufficient advantage will ensue no other reason exists for embarking on so vast an undertaking, especially when there is an alternative which without doubt could cheapen grain transportation at much less expense to the country.

While the Georgian Bay Canal on paper shows a saving of 25 miles for points between Duluth and Fort William over the present route to Montreal, the Canadian who reported on the complete survey stated that at the best there would only be a slight saving in the time of transportation, at least if the St. Lawrence river navigation was improved. But they doubted, looking to the greater speed that can be maintained in the great lakes, whether as matter of fact any saving in time could be looked for. This report is sufficient of itself to invite further consideration of the scheme, more particularly when the Welland Canal can be enlarged and deepened at an estimated cost of twenty million dollars.

The Georgian Bay Canal again will take, in the opinion of the engineers, ten years to construct, whereas the Welland can be improved in a much shorter time. Then the master of return cargoes is of vital importance to ship owners. These can be got on the lower lakes, but cannot on the Georgian Bay route, and a steamer which it would have to return light or lose several days by a deviation to Lake Erie for a shipload of coal. Then there are other considerations, such as the difficulty of handling large steamers in a canal with such a series of locks as will be necessary on the Georgian Bay route in order to overcome the height of land. Again, the requirements of ocean grain shipments appear to be better and more cheaply met by a development of present conditions.

FOR ORDERLY PROCEDURE. It has been suggested by some of the counsel engaged in behalf of witnesses subpoenaed in the Hamilton murder case that the sitting of the coroner's inquest should be in camera, and that out of the press should be excluded. As proceedings were quashed in England by Lord Alverstone in a certain case on the ground that the court had sat in camera, the crown is not likely to accede to the suggestion.

The limited space in the court ought to be considered however, in the issue of tickets, if that method of discrimination is to be adopted. There is barely room for the representatives of the press, the court officials, and those having business in the court room. The court room is crowded with young men who happen to know the policeman on the door or have some other "pull." A conflict of authority between the coroner and the chief of police over the issue of tickets has also led to much inconvenience. The attorney-general's department might make some suggestions to remedy the disorder about which crown counsel complained so bitterly.

E. S. TARIFF MANOEUVRES. Tariff revision in the United States is just as likely—or more likely—to be upwards as downwards. According to an official comparison between the Payne tariff bill, as framed, and the Dingley schedules, made by the assistant clerk of the ways and means committee, the average ad valorem rate under the Dingley law is placed at 44.16 per cent., while that of the Payne bill is 45.72 per cent., or 1.56 per cent. greater. Now that the finance committee's bill is under way in the senate all talk of scientific revision has vanished. Log-rolling is in full swing and what the final issue may be no one can tell. Few senators give evidence that they genuinely favor the revision President Taft desires.

The new tariff, when it is at last adjusted at a conference between representatives of the two houses, will probably be the first test of President Taft's calibre. He, at least, there is every reason to believe, heartily desires to see the pledges given during the Republican campaign made good. During this period of individual bargaining for special support he has maintained silence, and has not attempted to influence the senatorial deliberations. The situation is not relieved by the fact that the Democratic party in the senate is itself divided, not a few having openly repudiated the party program. Were the Democrats solid for genuine revision, there might be more prospect of securing it. President Taft did not give any encouragement to the deputations which recently waited upon him to urge reciprocity with Canada, realising possibly that the United States situation must first be cleared. But Canada can afford to view the struggle with equanimity.

The speaker declared it was a false and superficial reading of history to say that Britain had been unfaithful in her dealings with other people, had sought to crush weaker nations and to remove obstructions in the way of the god of warfare.

The obstructions removed were in the way of higher liberty, and what was taken from a weaker people was restored fourfold.

"Peace we all believe in, but surely we must protest when men declare that Britain is more pagan than Christ, because of her military strength, and that a military protection is worship of the god of warfare. We have not yet entered that ideal state where every man is become a law unto himself and every nation has learned to respect the rights of other nations."

Under these conditions the problem remains of what we do. I believe we have the solution in strong men, well armed. Keeping their homes, home and loved ones in security."

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RADICAL BUDGET

He purposely exaggerated the deficit in order to strengthen his appeal for new taxes. It is not a greedy budget; it is a manifesto, a proclamation in trumpet tones to all the world that England has now definitely abandoned her precedents and has made the condition of the people the first question of the day.

Intended to Create Surplus. I. N. Ford, in The New York Tribune: There is no lack of political England, but everything turns upon the budget. The session will be filled with controversy and strife, and there may be a conflict between the houses in the final stage. The Unionists describe it as a socialistic dissolution budget, but there is prima facie evidence that the government is bent upon holding office throughout the year and dissolving parliament in the summer or early autumn of 1910.

The deficiency revenues, instead of being minimized, have been artificially increased, and the chancellor is deliberately budgeting for a considerable surplus next year. This is shown by gross underestimates of the production from the increased duty on spirits. Everything indicates an astute policy of creating a large surplus by the end of the year.

The policy after the taxes on tobacco and tea have been remitted for the benefit of the masses.

An interesting question relating to this extraordinary political budget is the veto power of the lords. The Liberals contend that the lords cannot interfere with the budget, otherwise a breach of the exclusive privilege of the lower house over taxation. Unionist politicians, however, are gravely dissatisfied whether the lords cannot amend or throw out the sections dealing with the land tax, and when these are restored, either by a ruling of the Speaker or by a majority vote in the commons, reject the budget altogether.

This course is advocated on the ground that the government is preparing a new system of obtaining revenue from land, and one which will become the basis of local rating throughout the kingdom, and that the electors ought to be allowed to decide whether they will have a new or prefer the alternate system of tariff reform.

Whether the lords will have the nerve to make a determined stand against the taxation of land values cannot be known until July. Much will depend upon Mr. Baldwin's advice to Lord Lansdowne, for the lords will check upon their own shoulders the responsibility of holding up the business of administration and forcing an appeal to the country.

The Lords' attitude is not surprising, as they are delighted with the fresh turn in the political situation, but the Moderate Liberals are badly shaken up.

The London correspondent of the New York Herald declares: The general impression made of David Lloyd-George's intricate and portentous budget is that as a net result the business man is more heavily taxed in Great Britain than in any other country in the world.

As The Times remarks, "we shall be surprised if, both by what it does and by what it suggests, it does not increase the uneasiness of those who have property to be taxed and tend still further to that depression of trade which it should be the business of the chancellor of the exchequer to alleviate."

The budget is so large and amorphous that it is hardly surprising that in the lobby of the house of commons the men of the right wing parties is that Mr. Lloyd-George has overbudgetted."

On one point everyone is united. Mr. Lloyd-George cannot be accused of any lack of courage in his convictions.

When Mr. Lloyd-George exclaims rather theatrically, "Mr. Emmott, this is a war budget," he does not intend, he talks about waging war against poverty, and, as The Times again remarks, "his own history on what we are accustomed to recently a strenuous government organ—that is never really waged by unjust exactions from those whose customs and ways of carrying on business we know and whose brains and capital count for at least as much as thews and sinews."

Unless men exempt from the income tax pay a single penny toward making up the deficit, mainly due to the old age pension scheme, of which they reap the benefit.

Mining Markets Were Active Outlook Appears Brighter

The Gymnastic Display That Started the Week Subsides—Steady Market at Close.

World Office, Saturday Evening, May 1. The local mining markets for the past week have shown considerable activity and some fluctuations. At one time it seemed as tho the up and down movements engineered by those close to the market would be the means of thoroughly frightening away the public. However, towards the end of the week a staid, the still active market took the place of the gymnastic display and brokers reported a decided increase in outside orders. The most active stocks of the week were Beaver, Peterson Lake and Temiskaming. The rise in Beaver is believed to be due to a concerted movement on the part of those who regard the company's prospects as immensely improved by the recent financing and by the report of a recent strike on the property. Peterson Lake was in good demand by insiders, who were trying to replace their stock, which they lost in the effort to depress this issue. The view of the annual meeting, Temiskaming was simply the sport of traders themselves in efforts to scalp profits from fellow investors and this was thoroughly unsuccessful. The mine is reported to be in better shape than ever before. Green-Meehan had somewhat of a sensational rise on the news of a good strike, but lost half of its gain thru selling by speculative holders. Silver Bar showed an advance of some nine points from last Saturday's close, on a small demand. This stock seems somewhat scarce. The higher priced issues were comparatively neglected on the smaller exchange, tho La Rose, Nipissing and Trethewey were steady to strong on the Toronto Exchange. La Rose reached a new high record on the New York Curb, selling at 7 1/2 during the week. The Silver Queen meeting was held during the week. The company is passing thru a very lean body of ore, and the statement shows enough reserves in hand to carry on operations for some time. The directors' report was not encouraging and unless active development work is done some rich ore found, the prospects of the company do not look particularly promising. The remainder of the list was steady around last week's closing. Of the unlisted stocks, Hargrave was firm, the rest steady. Shipments for last week were 540 tons by seven mines. The market for the "white metal" is in a very satisfactory condition. Reports show that the demand has exhibited considerable increase. The market closes the week with an increase in public interest and brokers look for a more active interest from outside from now on.
