What is the real cause of drunkenness?

Some people will reply: "Abuse of strong liquors;" but that removes the difficulty, only to put it one step further back. What is the cause of the abuse of strong liquors? Tectotallers will respond, "The existence of houses where drink is permitted to be sold." But to return that answer is to talk nonsense. Tectotallers are a standing refutation of their answer is to talk nonsense. Teetotal-lers are a standing refutation of their own argument. There is nothing in the law to prohibit licensed victuallers from selling drink to a teetotaller. He may purphase drink in the same way and is exposed to the same temptation as his non-teetotal fellows. Why, then, does he not get drunk? Simply because, like the child who has learnt to recognize the wrongfulness of cruelty to the lower animals, he has got mastery of his appetite. As much and even more his appetite. As much, and even more, may, of course, be predicated of the person who is temperate without being tectotal. There are, we are thankful to tectotal. There are, we are thankful to feel assured, millions of men and women who can trust themselves to drink without incurring the slightest risk of exceeding the bounds of decency. They are people of firmness and decision of character-people who can say "No" when they mean it, and when it ought to be said. Hence, it follows that drunkenness is the result, not of drinking or of the existence of facilities for obtaining drink, but of the absence of self-control on the part of the drunkard.

"When you are sitting at your deak for any appreciable length of time, sunk in profound thoughts," he says, "these thoughts, however pure and lofty, are actually poisoning your brain, decreasing its apritude for the work in hand, and you will find as time passes that you are not able to keep your atthat you are not able to keep your attention fixed, your will power has lost its grip, your memory is deteriorated, you cannot grasp an idea as before, and you cannot grasp an idea as before, and there creeps over you a certain feeling of lassitude and dulness; your temples throb, your face is flüshed, there is a sensation of fulness, your head aches. And all this because your thoughts—your mental work—has pumped into your head a quantity of blood giving the necessary fuel for these thoughts, but there has been no agent at work strong enough to remove the ashes and refuse. But rise from your table," he goes on, "take a few deep inhalations, move your arms in rhythm wi'n the respiration, walk for a quarter of an hour, and you will probably find the unpleasant symptoms gone, and yourself ready to begin anew; your attention, which was wandering, gone, and yourself ready to begin anew; your attention, which was wandering, has become fixed, your will-power is stronger, your memory its own self, your ideas from vague have become clear and your conclusions, more logical." 
