The Manor House, one of the oldest landmarks in the vicinity of this city, was destroyed by fire about noon today. John Jackson, the present owner, who lives alone in the building, and who operates it as an inn, was in the city purchasing supplies at the time the fire was seen between 12 and 1 o'clock by Walter Pederson, a neighbor. Mr. Pederson and some of the other neighbors hurried to the scene, but the fire had made such great headway that it was useless to attempt to save the building. Breaking in some of the doors and windows, however, they managed to salvage a portion of the furniture, china and glassware and silver. Before an hour the entire interior of the house was a charred mass of embers. At 2 o'clock the ruins were still smouldering. The walls, which were of stone, were standing.

The Manor House was built between 100 and 125 years ago by the Cudlip family, who occupied it for lome time. It then passed into the hands of the Gilberts and was in their possession until about nine or ten years ago when it was purchased by Hon. Wm. Pugsley.

ABSORPTION CIRCUIT

A form of antenna consisting of two horizontal metallic plates placed a few feet apart, the upper plate being attached to the usual antenna terminal and the lower plate to the ground terminal of the receiving circuit. The material of the plates may be two sections of copper netting each approximately ten feet square and located parallel to each other. It has lower conductor resistance than the usual form of outdoor antenna and owing to increased capacity a small inductance of low resistance is used in series thus giving a low value of resistance to the circuit. In comparison with the coil antenna, the "condenser antenna" gives satisfactory results in the reception of short wave lengths.

A standard electrical unit which denotes the amount of current flow. It is the amount of current produced in a conductor having a resistance of one ohm when an electromotive force of one volut is steadily applied. When the rate of flow in a conductor is one coulomb per second, the value of the current is

Proper tuning of a radio circuit consists in varying the inductance or the capacity, or both, so that the circuit is adjusted to a state of resonance with an external circuit containing similar elements. When the product of the inductance and capacity in a radio receiving circuit is equal to that of a transmitting circuit the strength of received signal is at a maximum and the circuits are said to be in resonance.



beginning of next week work will be furnished to 120 men for two days per week.

The Council considered the relief question at a special meeting, but took no definite action. Members of a deputation, headed by Frank Stapleford of the Neighborhood Workers' Association, outlined the scope of the social service work being carried on by the city and by privately supported community service organisations and stressed the advantages to be secured from systematic supervision of all relief, whether routine or emergency.

Plan of Employment.

Present plans call for the continuous employment of two gangs of 20 men each on grading work on Eglinton avenue. In order to spread the employment as far as possible the personnel of these two gangs will be changed every two days, thus providing 120 men with two days' work a week.

Although no definite figures are available it is the general opinion of officials that the unemployment situation in the township is very little better than it was at this time last year. During December the Township Relief office provided fuel and food to 170 families. To date this month aid has been given to 191 families. During the winter of 1921-22 the monthly average was in the neighborhood of 250.



J. Carlson, Head of the Department of
Physiology in the University of Chicago, announces that during the last
two years Assistant Professor L. R.
Dragstedt and Associate Professor A.
B. Luckhardt of the University have
made fundamental contributions to the
causes and control of tetany and allied
metabolic and nervous disorders. Tetany is a disease somewhat resembling
lockjaw, but affecting the muscles of
the extremities. Dr. Dragstedt has
shown that parathyroid tetany is due
to a poison developed in the intestinal
tract by the action of the intestinal
tract by the action of the intestinal
tract by the action food (meat), and
that the disease can be prevented or
controlled by suitable diets. Dr. Luckhardt has shown that the tetany can
be prevented or controlled by diuresis
and by lime salts.

By preventing or controlling the acute tetany for five or six weeks following the extirpation of the parathryoids in dogs, a chronic state is developed in these animals that appears to be identical with ideopatic epitepsy and allied disorders in man, such as spasmophilia and convulsion in children, tetany of pregnancy, etc. We have then for the first time these diseases developed in the experimental animal, which permits a more complete analysis of these disorders than has hitherto been possible in the human being. The research is being pursued especially with reference to the influence of the tetany toxins on the kidneys, the liver, the eyes, and the nervous system.

The methods of control of the tetany diseases found effective in dogs are being applied to allied diseases in man. This work has opened up an important field in physiological and medical research.




