It Makes Bequests of Twenty Million Dollar Estate

\$515,000 Goes to Charities-Sons Receive Bulk in Trust for Their Children; \$100,000 in Art to Chicago Institute; Legacies to Servants

Chicago, May 21-The will of the late Mrs. Potter Palmer, affecting the dis-posal of an estate valued at more than mrs. Potter Palmer, arrecting the disposal of an estate valued at more than \$20,000,000, has been filed for probate. The bulk of the estate is handed down in trust to the two sons, Honore Palmer and Potter Palmer, Jr.; the sum of \$515,000 is bequeathed to various charitable organizations, and Mrs. Palmer's collection of paintings, to the value of \$100,000, is given to the Art Institute. Mrs. Palmer's personal estate is estimated to be worth \$1,000,000. The balance, amounting to about \$20,000,000, was held in trust by Mrs. Palmer from her husband's estate. When Potter Palmer died sixteen years ago his estate was estimated at \$8,000,000, so that in the intervening time, under his widow's management, it has more than doubled in value.

The two sons during their lifetime are to enjoy the income from the vast estate, and upon their deaths the income is to go to their children, until the eldest son shall reach the age of twenty-one years. Then the whole Palmer fortune is to be divided among the Palmer grandchildren, of whom there are seven. Honore and Potter Palmer, Jr., are directed by their mother to expend \$400,000 for the aid of such philanthropic or educational institutions as they may select.

A report compiled by the Local Government Board based on information from German sources, shows a fall in the birth rate in Germany during the three years 1915-'17, inclusive, equivalent to the loss of 2,000,000 infants. Forty per cent fewer births occurred in 1916 than in 1913. These figures are compared with a decrease of 10 per cent in the birth rate in England and Wales.

The infantile death rate in Germany has been kept well down, but, nevertheless, the report shows is 50 per cent higher than in England and Wales. This fact has led to a large extension of infant welfare work in Germany, in which voluntary societies have played an active part, but the movement is becoming one increasingly in the control of the municipalities.

cipalities.

The infant mortality rate in Germany in 1913, it is shown, was 151 in a thousand, as compared with 108 in England and Wales. The rates in 1914 for Prussia, Saxony, and Bavaria were, respectively, 164, 173 and 193 in a thousand. An abnormal increase in infant mortality during the first months of the war is shown by the fact that in Prussia, in the third quarter of 1914, the rate rose from 128 to 148; in Saxony from 140 to 242, and in Bavaria from 170 to 239.

## Million and Half U.S. Troops Over Seas by January

America Has Promised Tnat Number, Says Clemenceau's Paper

Washington Hopes For it, But is Loath to Make Definite Assertions Thus Early-Baker s Estim te Recalled

Paris, May 20—It is announced in Premier Clemenceau's newspaper, L'Homme Libre, that the United States had promised to have 1,500,000 fighting men in France by the end of 1918.

These troops, it added, must have their own organization and services, which would mean at least 2,000,000 specialists, workers, men in the Quartermaster's department, and others.

The newspaper went on to say that certain misunderstandings which had existed had been cleared up, and that under no circumstances would allied workers or soldiers displace French workers in factories.

The presence of American workers on

The presence of American workers on French soil would be in direct consequence of the presence of American fighters on the front.

Washington Properul But Cautious. Washington Riopeful But Cautious.

Washington, May 20—With more than 500,000 men now in France, army officials are more than ever hopeful that a powerful American force will be co-operating with the Allies there by the end of the year. Unhappy experience with over sanguine estimates of what can be accomplished make them slow, however, to put their hopes into definite predictions, and it was not possible tonight to obtain specific confirmation of the report from Paris that a promise had been made to have 1,500,000 fighting men in France before January 1.

The statement in Clemenceau's news-

The statement in Clemenceau's newspaper that such a promise had been made was not believed by army officers generally to mean that the American government definitely pledged itself to generally to mean that the American deliver a specific number of men within a time limit. Many factors are involved in making such a calculation months in advance.

advance.

Secretary Baker would make no comment on the statement. Many weeks ago he told the Senate Military Committee that the government then had hopes of getting 1,500,000 to the front during the year. Since then his estimate that 500,000 men would reach France carly in the year has been fulfilled, and since then, also, the German drive has changed the course of events, and had brought about a speeding up of American preparations which has already shown results.

Whether the result indicated by Clemenceau's newspaper can be attained depends on the shipping situation. The men and the essential equipment for them can be made ready. men and the essential equipment for them can be made ready.

May Have 4,000,000 in Arms in 1919.

Under the authority sought by President Wilson to organize as large an army as it is found possible to train, equip, and transport, officials expect at least 3,000,000 men to be under arms in the next twelve months. Many believe that even a larger force can be handled and that a total of 4,000,000 men during the year will be nearer the mark.







Sweden is Pro-German.

In fact, Sweden's attitude has been such that the day is likely to come when the Entente will demand a reckoning with her. Any word of English spoken in a public place in Sweden is almost an incitement to a riot, and English-speaking people have been subjected to insult and abuse in cafes and theatres and on the street. The newspapers have been particularly virulent in their attacks upon the allies, especially Great Britain and the United States. Of late there has been considerable improvement in this respect, for the Radical leader, Breitung, has been impressing upon the people the truth that their hardships are due to the pro-German policy of their government rather than to any animosity toward Sweden on the part of the Entente powers. The government, however, and the royal family are pro-German, and only dread of the British navy has prevented them from carrying the country into war.
