A GRACEFUL EULOGY

Hen. Mr. Asquith's Tribute to The Late Alfred Lyttleton

Mr. Asquith's tribute to the late Alfred Lyttleton in the House of Commons on July 8 is spoken of in the English press as perfect of its kind. The two men were life-long friends and there was a relationship by marriage between them, the present Mrs. Asquith being a sister of Mr. Lyttleton's first wife. "It would not, I think, be doing justice to the feelings which are uppermost in many of our hearts if we passed to the business of the day without taking notice of the fresh gap which has been made in our ranks by the untimely death of Mr. Alfred Lyttleton. It is a loss of which I hardly trust myself to speak for, apart from ties of relationship, there had subsisted between us for thirty-three years a close friendship and affection which no political differences were ever allowed to loosen or even to affect. He has been snatched away in what we thought was the full tide of buoyant life still full of promise and of hope. What more can we say? THE "GIFT FROM CANADA" FRAUD

Swindlers Operating in London Collect Freight Charges on Nonexisting Packages

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Aug. 12—Three years ago, when the fashion of sporting tours in Canada was at its height, the Canadian gift fraud was worked very extensively It was promptly christened the moose head fraud and was practised along the

following lines.

Soon after the return of the sportsman home, he would be called upon, and informed that a moose-head from Canada was "at the docks," consigned to him. He would be asked for the cost of carriage and cartage, and thinking, no doubt, that some friend of the hunting camp had sent him a pleasant memento of the holiday, he would pay, but never a moose-head reached him. In another dress the same fraud was practiced during the Christmas season. Then it was cases of apples which were offered as bait.

Different details surround the Canadian gift fraud of this season, but doubtless it is the same gang of men operating. It is now being used to defraud those about to marry, whose names are available from the columns of the newspapers. A little before the date of the ceremony and masquerading as an employee of the ship, a man calls at the bride's home, and, stating that he has a case from Canada, requests payment of the freight.

"There have been scores of these cases during the last month," said one of the officers detailed on this enquiry, "and is a very difficult matter to get hold of the gang. People are very foolish to pay charges on shipments before the goods are delivered, but they think that some friend or person whom they me in distant Canada has remembered them and, of course, many people are not familiar with what is done in connection with ocean shipments."
