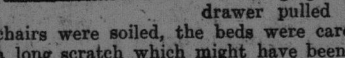

THE LEGISLATURE
Mr. Tweeddale Speaks on Budget—The House Business

Fredericton, N. B., April 1—In a three-hour speech on the budget debate this evening, Mr. Tweeddale discussed many topics of interest, dwelt upon the great importance to the country of the Valley railway, but at the same time criticized the mystery and concealment in connection with the contracts entered into and the absence of full information from the members.

He concluded by comparing the rapid increase of debt under the government, with its revenues and resources, with the slow accumulation of financial burden under the twenty-five years of rule under the old government with its small revenue.

W. B. Dickson, who preceded Mr. Tweeddale, made the usual stock speech against the old government.

J. Norton Griffiths Predicts 100,000 People Here in Five Years

Trade Will Come Even Faster Than We Can Handle it, Said Noted Contractor at Banquet in Union Club Last Night

In a few plain words last evening at the banquet given by the Board of Trade at the Union Club in his honor, J. Norton Griffiths, M. P. for Westmorland in the British parliament and head of the Courtenay Bay Trust, predicted that the Courtenay Bay Trust will convert the Courtenay Bay into one of the finest harbors in the world, and that it will be accomplished and the results that are certain to follow.

The distinguished guest predicted a most brilliant future for St. John and said that the breakwater would go farther down in the interests of the port. He donated a shield to be competed for in sports to be held if a public holiday were proclaimed on the day the work started, and planned forward to the completion of the work, intimating that a banquet would be given in the dry dock. It was a very enthusiastic gathering which listened to his words and the spirit of progress and optimism was apparent.

He frankly said that St. John would have a population of 100,000 by the time the work was done five years from now, and that its trade would be trebled. An important announcement was made by W. Burton-Stewart, managing director of the Griffiths organization in Canada, regarding the possibility of a steel plant being established in St. John. Other speakers also spoke of the necessity of new industries for St. John and in this connection looked on the naval question.

The banquet was served in tempting fashion with the tables and room prettily decorated and the large picture of Mr. Norton Griffiths and some views from his contracts hanging on the wall, draped with Union Jacks. A feature of the decorations was a graving dock in floral design.

Mr. Pugsley's Telegram. The following telegram was received from Hon. Wm. Pugsley expressing his regret that he was unable to be present: "W. E. Anderson, Secretary Board of Trade, St. John, N. B.: In his reference to the future of the port, Mr. Griffiths struck a popular note when he said: 'In the future of the port, the most important thing is to increase the population of your city and I say that I have no doubts in view of what I have seen here that you will be able to reach that figure within the allotted time.'

Mr. Griffiths' Speech. When full justice had been done to the dinner the second and more important part of the programme, the speech making, commenced. The toast to the guest of the evening, J. Norton Griffiths, M. P., president of Norton Griffiths & Co., Ltd., to whom he referred, and cheerers, as one of the great Empire builders of the present day, Mr. Griffiths as a citizen of St. John, but that it should be honored by being able to include in that category some of his associates who would be residents of the city at least during the years in which the work is being carried on.

When Mr. Griffiths rose to reply he was given an ovation of the most enthusiastic character. In addition to the singing of the time-honored hymn, "For he's a jolly good fellow," there were cries of "What's the matter with Norton Griffiths?" with the answer, "He's all right," and repeated cheers.

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Mr. Griffiths referred to the statement on the menu card showing the great increase in the population of the port in the past ten years, and predicted that when the present scheme of harbor development is completed, the increase will be three times as great. He emphasized the fact that the harbor facilities must not only be placed in the development of the trade but must keep in advance of it in order to reap the full benefit of the country's growth.

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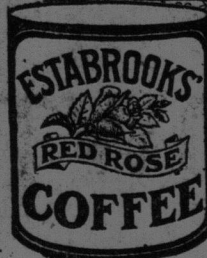

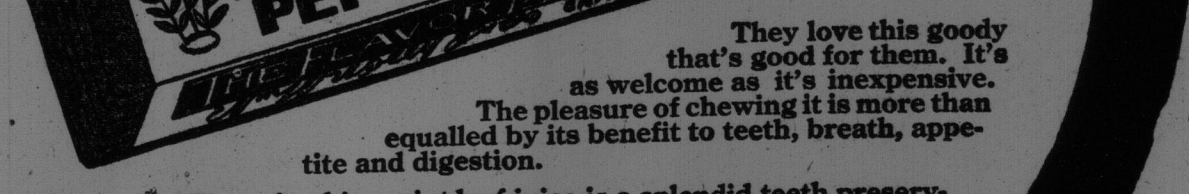

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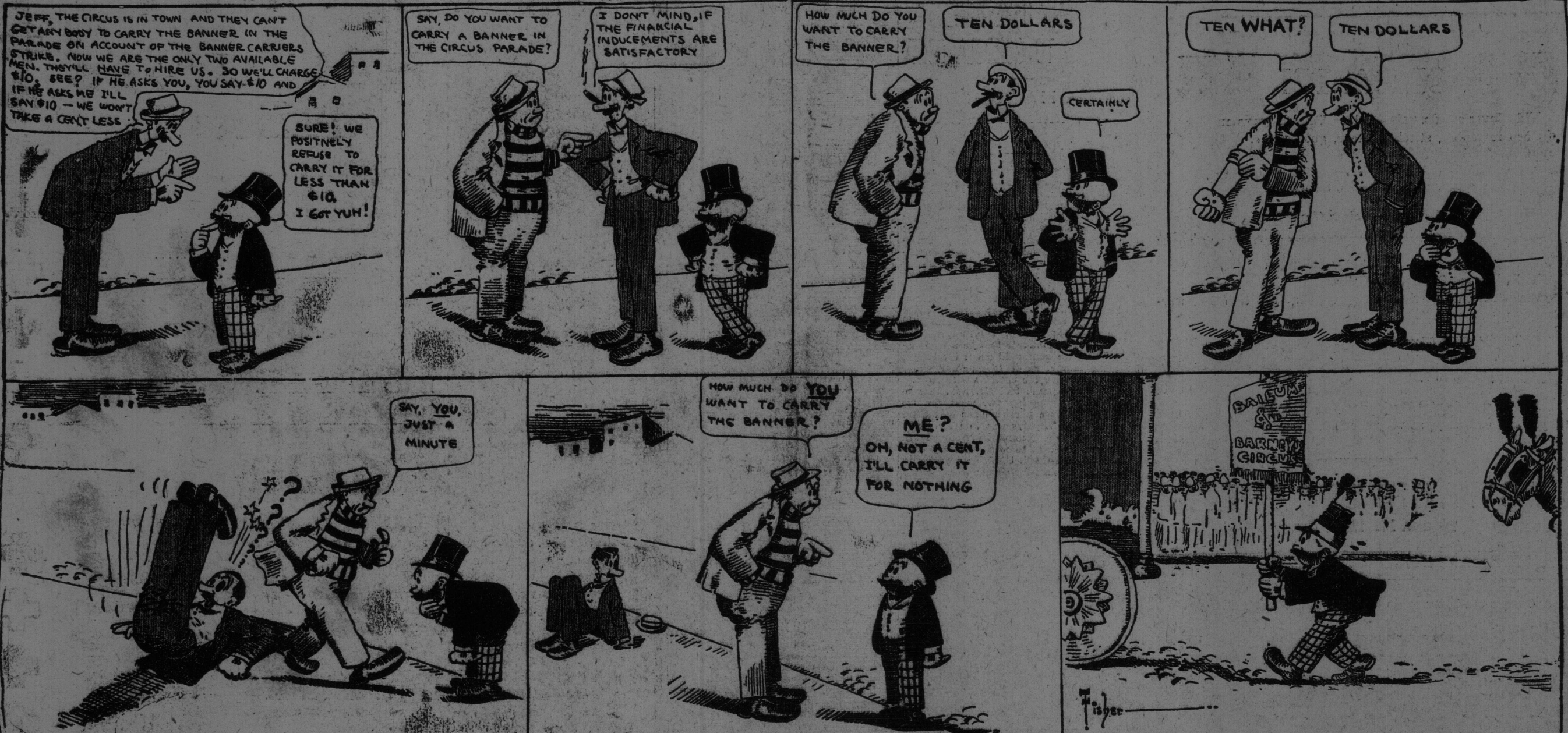

DAVID A. ROBERTS MAY HAVE GONE TO GONDOLA POINT

Has Been Missing Since Saturday—Expressed Intention of Going There

The opinion was expressed today that David A. Roberts, who has been missing from his home, 528 Main street, since Saturday last, may be at the home of his brother-in-law, Frank Roberts, at Gondola Point, as he was known to have started for there on the I. C. R. train on Saturday. Some friends saw him leave on the train and he was seen again at Rouses Bay. He told L. R. Rose, terminal agent for the I. C. R., on Friday afternoon that he intended visiting at the point and would probably return on Saturday. He intended to come back until about the middle of the month, as it is generally about that time when the checks are received. The missing man told Mr. Rose that he had been undergoing treatment for his eyes, and that a physician had said there would be an improvement in their condition and they might soon be strong enough for him to return to work. He had been engaged with the I. C. R. as a porter in the freight shed for about five years and was at work up to a month ago, when his defective sight caused him to be laid off and this was a great source of worry to him. On Saturday morning he arose early, and when his wife awoke he had left the house, without leaving any message as to his intentions. She told a Times reporter this morning that she was greatly surprised and grieved, and was at a loss to understand his action, but she thought it must have been from brooding over his non-employment. "I have three little children from two to six years old to take care of besides myself," she said, "and it is only natural that I should be greatly worried over his disappearance. The suspense is terrible and I do wish I could get some news of his whereabouts." The police have been endeavoring to get some trace of the missing man.

EVIDENCE GIVEN IN TWO CASES IN THE POLICE COURT

Garnett Remanded for Sentence and Further Testimony in Pidgeon Robbery Heard

George Garnett, arrested on suspicion of having stolen several wrenches and some habbit metal from the blacksmith shop of the F. E. Sayre Co., on the Long Wharf, was found guilty in the police court this morning and was remanded for sentence. J. Walter Holly, vice president of the company, told of being informed of the robbery and of communicating with Detective Killen. He recognized goods produced in court as being similar to the ones which are used in the blacksmith shop. The blacksmith told him that he suspected Garnett, as he had been seen around the shop on the day of the robbery. William Jacobson, a junk dealer in Pond street, recognized the prisoner as a man who called at his shop on Thursday last, and sold him a wrench and some wrench and sixteen cents for the metal. The prisoner had written his name in a book, but the witness could not make it out. Garnett then told him his name was McConnell. The prisoner then took the stand. He said that he had been drinking on the day the robbery was committed and for several days before. He did not remember stealing the goods or of selling them. He did not think the writing on the junk dealer's book was his. He had gone to the Long Wharf on the morning of the day of the robbery at half-past seven and was around there for several hours. The prisoner was then remanded to jail for sentence. The case against Frank Guvermont and Harry Akery, two young boys arrested on suspicion of having broken into C. B. Pidgeon's store last week and stealing goods valued at more than \$100, was also taken up this morning. Mr. Pidgeon, manager of the store, told of going there on Sunday, March 24, and of finding goods scattered all about. Entry had been made through the cellar. Two pairs of old boots and two old suits of clothes were found in the shop. He identified the clothing on the prisoner as the goods that had been found in the store. He knew Akery, he having worked in the store at one time. Akery had been arrested before for entering the store. Some of the goods found on the prisoners when arrested were also identified by the witness. Percy Williams, a clerk in Mr. Pidgeon's store, identified some of the goods. James W. Morrison, clerk in the Ottawa Hotel, said that on Monday morning, March 25, the two prisoners called at the hotel. Each one carried a suit case. Both were well dressed, and wore new raincoats. Akery applied for a position of porter, but the witness told him he would have to see Mr. Green, the proprietor. Both boys went out. Akery returned soon after and said that he was going to see Mr. Green at ten o'clock and asked to leave his suit case there. Guvermont also returned with his suit case and asked permission to leave it there, saying he intended to return and register. Later in the day he had Detective Killen and Policeman McCollom arrest the two boys, and consequently handed the keys over to the detective. The prisoners were further remanded. W. Colwell, reported for allowing a pile of lumber to fall in Hazen street on the nights of March 28 and 29 without having a light, pleaded guilty and was fined \$2.

EDWARD TERRY, ACTOR, IS DEAD

London, April 2.—Edward Terry, the actor, who has been suffering for some time with neuritis, died this morning at Barnes, Surrey, at the age of sixty-eight years. Edward O'Connor Terry was one of the most popular actors on the British stage, on which he has appeared almost continuously for nearly a century. He was a writer of distinction and had travelled extensively in India, Australia, South Africa, and America. Mr. Terry played in St. John last year.

HALIFAX IS GRATEFUL

Aids Cartier Fund in Recognition of Contributions to the Halifax Tower

Halifax, N. S., April 2.—(Special)—The Canadian Club of Halifax yesterday voted \$100 for the Cartier monument in Montreal. The club was very much pleased to do this particularly in view of the way in which Canadian clubs and cities and provinces helped in the Halifax tower fund, which is now complete and amounts to \$24,000. This tower is built and will be dedicated by the Duke of Connaught on August 15. The Halifax tower is in honor of the establishment of representative government in Nova Scotia, more than 150 years ago.

NO SIGN OF STEAMER OVERDUE WITH 51 PEOPLE ON BOARD

St. John's, Nfld., April 2.—With but 4,000 seals, one-tenth of her capacity, aboard, the steamer Bonaventure returned to port yesterday. She was obliged to give up sealing because of broken propeller blades. The Bonaventure brought in the crew of the schooner Corona, abandoned amid the ice floes. The sealer reported no trace of the steamer Erna, long overdue from Glasgow with fifty-one persons aboard.

BUFFALO AGAIN TAKING WATER FROM GREAT LAKES

Buffalo, N. Y., April 2.—A protest against further diversion of water from the Great Lakes for the Chicago drainage canal has been forwarded to the secretary of war by the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce. The level of Lake Erie, it is said, is one foot five inches lower in 1911 than in 1908, and the resultant lowered loading capacity of the lake freighters already has been reflected in increased rates.
