THE TENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

TORONTO MAGDALEN ASYLUM,

OR

FEMALE HOUSE OF REFUGE.

AUGUST, 1864.

In presenting our Tenth Annual Report to the public, we desire to record our heartfelt thanks to the Infinite Source of all Good, for the measure of success that has attended our efforts during the past year, and we trust the friends of the Institution will derive some satisfaction from a plain statement of results.

Before entering on an analysis of the above Table, perhaps it might be as well to give some little information as to our mode of dealing with those whom we receive into our Institution. On admission, each applicant is expected to give a promise to this effect:—That being desirous to reform, she will remain in the Institution for at least twelve months, and that during all that time she will be obedient industrious and faithful. At the end of that period, the Managers pledge themselves to procure a suitable situation for her, (generally in the country,) and send her to her place comfortably clothed. During the twelve months of protection, they are not allowed to see their former companions, are deprived of all stimulants, and are steadily employed. To submit to this is a strong test of their real desire of reformation, and will account in some measure for the number (twenty-one) who are classed as "Left of their own accord," which, in other words means,—that after a short trial, finding the restraints of the Institution irksome, feeling restored to comparative health, and thinking they can easily find employment, they desire to be again at liberty, and though reasoned with, earnestly advised and urged by the Matron and Managers to

remain in the Refuge, go out and speedily sink into their former state. These are the ones who principally bring discredit on our Institution, and leave on the minds of some the impression that there is but little real good resulting from the labours of your Committee. This impression is, as will be seen from this explanation, and more particularly from what follows, as we proceed to remark on other results, a very erroneous one, and we trust will be effectually banished from the minds of any who have entertained it.

Twenty-six have been sent to service—the largest number yet sent out during one year. And to show how very satisfactory in many cases their conduct has been, we will give some extracts from letters received from their several Mistresses. One lady says (after a year's experience), "I find A., honest, industrious, and trustworthy. I have no idea of parting with her, and believe her thoroughly reformed." Another (after seven months), "B. has been most faithful, and a most excellent nurse, during many weeks of severe illness." Another (after six months), "D. has been a good, faithful girl, so far, and we should be very sorry to part with her." Another (after five months), "R. is careful, truthful and honest, and suits me very well." The following remarks have been made after a trial of from one to three months:—"I am delighted with C., she is a splendid worker."—"K. has given me every satisfaction, and seems most desirous to do well."—"You will be happy to hear that A. is doing very well, as well as we could expect."—"B. suits me very well, indeed; is honest, cleanly, and attentive," &c., &c.

Now we do not wish to be understood to mean that we consider all these twenty-six, or even the greater part of them, "reformed women," in an absolute sense, or that they may not again fall into sinful habits; but we do say, that this Institution, and its Managers, have been the means, under Providence, of rescuing these twenty-six from degradation, misery, and perhaps death, and placing them once more in a position of usefulness for periods varying from twelve months to two years, and we hope in many cases permanently, and thus we do assert to be a *real benefit*. Who can tell the amount of suffering they have escaped, or the numbers they might have influenced for evil, had there not been a Refuge to receive them, and friends to interest themselves on their behalf? We must never forget that many girls when "out of place" have no homes to go to, and are driven, from want of funds to pay for respectable board, into wretched hovels, which are in most cases the haunts of vice. Once there, the descent to the lowest degradation is soon made, and habits of drinking formed, which are *most difficult*, we had almost said *impossible* to get rid of. But in a moral sense, as well as a physical, "while there is life there is hope," and we are only doing our duty when we try to reclaim the abandoned and raise the fallen, and may justly claim from the public the pecuniary assistance necessary to support this Institution; and not only the means do we ask, but co-operation and earnest prayer that the money given, and the means used, may be abundantly blessed.

Of the three who returned to their friends, one sent ten dollars to the Refuge,

with a letter of thanks and grateful acknowledgment for all the kind attention bestowed upon her.

Another, who left the Institution some time ago, and is now comfortably married, told one of the ladies how thankful she felt for all that had been done for her.

Another wrote:—"I take this opportunity of sending you my sincere and humble thanks for the many benefits I have received from your hands, but my endeavouring to thank you either in words spoken or in words written, come far short of my actual feelings, and I would desire to testify my gratitude by an after walk and conversation in the world, which, I am persuaded, will be far more acceptable to you than anything I can say at present. I would still seek an interest in your prayers, and still desire to be permitted to seek your counsel and advice in what may pertain to me in after life."

Another, who left fifteen months ago, writes to one of the Directresses:—

"DEAR MADAM,

"I take the liberty of writing to you; I almost feel ashamed I have neglected it so long. It is now over a year since I left, and on the 25th I shall be fourteen months in my place. The babe is living, and has got to be a bright little fellow, and looks healthy. My own health is poor * * *. I wrote to his unnatural father for some help to support his child, but he neither came nor sent, and it remains on me. The Lord help me and give me strength to keep him, and discharge my duty to him. Dear Madam, I hope you don't lose any opportunity of winning souls to Christ. He is worth labouring for night and day, for without him we can do nothing. I feel that he is very precious to my soul, in that he carried me through so many difficulties. I hope his praise shall always be on my tongue. Please tell all the Ladies that I have not forgotten their kindness, nor the lesson my foolish conduct has taught me."

The testimony of a Sub-Matron, who had only been two months with us, and then left on account of failing health, and soon afterwards died, is not without interest. As to the religious benefits of the Institution, she said,—“I am now an elderly woman, but I never thought seriously of the necessity of salvation till I heard Mr. R. preaching to the inmates. It was the beginning of a new life in me.”

The one who died had long been a trial and disgrace to her friends. She had, however, done very much better during the last two years, and returned to the Refuge very ill. After a short time she was removed to the Hospital, where she died, deeply penitent, and looking for forgiveness only for Christ's sake.

Those dismissed were for violent conduct, insubordination, and bad language, and painful though it is to the Managers to send any away who once seek their protection, still in these cases it was absolutely necessary on account of the rest of the inmates who were irritated and excited by their violence.

We would now draw attention to the large sum realized from the work of the inmates (about \$550). This is by embroidery, plain sewing, and washing.

The washing has been performed under great difficulties, from the want of proper accommodation. Our means would not permit us last year to build a washhouse and laundry. Now we hope to be able to accomplish this desirable object, and also to add a new work room and dormitory. This would be a most decided improvement and a great benefit to the Institution. We mentioned in last Annual Report that for the sum of \$400 an addition such as we then wished could be built, but now, as we desire to have also a work room and dormitory, besides repairs to the old building, the amount required will be very considerably increased. We have, however, a strong faith in the liberality of the inhabitants of Toronto, and a humble but confident trust in our Heavenly Father, who sent His only and well-beloved Son into the world to seek and save the lost, and who "will supply all our need." Let us be but earnest in our endeavours to rescue the fallen and succour the miserable. It is a good work. It is Christ-like. God will provide the means. The silver and the gold are his. He will put it in the hearts of his people to give liberally.

We have again to express our grateful thanks to Dr. Robinson, for his gratuitous medical attendance; also, to Dr. Berryman, for his kindness to those sent to the Hospital.

Our thanks are also due to those gentlemen, both clerical and lay, who so earnestly attend to the religious wants of the inmates.

The testimony of a Sub-Matron, who had only been two months with us, and then left on account of failing health, and soon afterwards died, is not without interest.
