DEATH OF AN OLD CHILIANANALIA HERO.—The Frederick Capital of last Saturday was—Sergeant Purcell, a pensioner who came to this city from Quebec on the establishment of the Infantry School Corps, and who has since resided in the Park Barracks, where he acted as barrack sergeant, and died on Thursday morning. The old sergeant was over six feet in height, as straight as a reed, and although about 80 years of age, his step was as springy and his figure as elastic and soldierly, apparently as if he were a recruit. There were very few men now in the land of the living who saw and participated in more stirring times and open like scenes than the old soldier who during the week, answered his last roll call in the barracks off Regent street. He was a type of the old soldier who served and fought under Wellington, Napier, Raglan, Colin Campbell, and Havelock. He was only produced by the long series of wars, and which are fast disappearing from the British empire. Among the engagements in which he took an active part was the memorable battle of Chillianwala, in which Captain Stoen of this city, was killed. Sergeant Purcell, then a private being one of the fatigue party which carried that famous and gallant officer the day after the battle. The deceased was buried yesterday afternoon in the Roman Catholic cemetery, with military honors, the Royal School of Infantry furnishing the firing party and band, and all the officers N. C. O., and men of duty attending the funeral.
