Confidence was expressed by the operators that there will be no general coal famine, large supplies of fuel having been secured in anticipation of the walk-out.

Rev. Father Berube Tells of his Plans to Found French Canadian Colony On West-

Montreal, March 31.—Rev. Father Berube, the much-discussed parish priest of Vonda, Saskatchewan, who has been the subject of much criticism amongst French-Canadians for his defence of the school system of the province of Saskatchewan, while in this city recently proclaimed the complete success of his efforts to induce his compatriots to settle in the West. He went even further. "I will succeed," he stated, "in planting a little province of Quebec in Saskatchewan and others will do the same thing in Alberta; yet we will not tread on other people's toes for we all live happily and harmoniously together on the western plains." Abbe Berube, whose writings have been criticized in the columns of L'Action Sociale was a former member of the teaching staff of the Seminary of Rimouski, and was a vicar at the cathedral of that episcopal town. He admitted that he had travelled much since those days, and had changed—his opinions in certain matters, although he never sacrificed a principle in matters of religion or nationality. He had come to look upon the province of Saskatchewan as the finest country in the world, and for four years he had striven to attract his fellow countrymen towards the West, with the result that five parishes had been created containing a population of from two to three thousand and all were well satisfied with the outlook. On Wednesday he would direct one hundred families to the western land and on April 8th from four to five hundred additional families will follow the parish priest of Vonda to the promised land of Saskatchewan.

Finally the chief engineer of the Transcontinental Railway itself has resigned on the ground that these frauds are going on and that he was not able to stop them. Here is a third fact: The Hodgins' inquiry by a committee of the House of Commons in 1908 was brought to an end by the refusal of the Liberal majority to take evidence on the facts of over-classifications. They voted down a motion of the Conservative members to call in evidence the engineers and inspectors who had been summoned and were in attendance for that purpose. When appeal was made to the House of Commons, the government majority supported the refusal so that the inquiry was blocked. At this time it was declared that the matter would be referred to arbitrators between the Transcontinental commission and the Grand Trunk Pacific, as if the Canadian taxpayers had no interest in the matters. That arbitration has made several starts but has not as yet accomplished or determined anything. Lastly a third inquiry was instituted this year on the Lumsden charges, and the majority at once began the process of whitewashing, so that the Conservative members refused to be parties to the scandal and retired from the committee. The Liberal members have since been playing with the matter and are evidently determined at the support the commission.

THE END OF THE INTERMEDIATE TARIFF.

Mr. Knox, the United States Secretary of State, has fissued a statement concerning the tariff arrangement. He makes special mention of the whole graup of unenumerated articles, "conceded in its entirety." There is no doubt that the concession is important.

But Canadians will think less of the importance of the detailed concessions than of the surrender involved. This transaction is an acknowledgement that the United states, which has the highest tariff of all countries against leanadian products, is entitled to most facored nation terms from us. Whatever tariff concessions we sell to ther foreign countries we must give for nothing to the Jalied States. The intermediate tariff which Mr. Fielding brought down three years ago as an instrument to use in securing a market from other countries thus goes to pleces at the first test. Should the government negotiate further treaties with this instrument, the same weapon would be used with the same result.

He would have postponed the ratification had this humiliation been expected. Never again will the intermediate tariff be set to work as an instrument for obtaining markets. President Taft has put it out of business, and at the same time made it contribute an improved Canadian market for forty staple products of his own country.


