

How to Lay Shingles.

Not one half the persons who lay shingles when making a roof on a building have any correct ideas in regard to making a roof that will be absolutely rain-tight during a driving storm of rain. We have frequently seen men shingling, who, when they would meet with a worthless shingle, say once in laying two or three courses, or more, would lay this poor shingle among the good ones, saying: "It is only one poor shingle, one shingle cannot make a poor roof." But one poor shingle will make a leaky one. If first rate shingles are employed, and one poor one is worked in among every 100, that roof might about as well have been without any shingles. If any poor shingles are to be used, let them all be laid together near the upper part of the roof. The best of shingles will not make a tight roof if they are not properly laid, while the same shingles would make an excellent roof if laid as shingles should be laid.

MR. JAMES LICK.

Mr. James Lick, the California millionaire, through whose munificence the construction of the million dollar telescope was some time ago provided for, died in San Francisco a short time ago. Mr. Lick was born in Frederickburg, Pa., in 1796, and was taught the cabinet maker's trade. About twenty-four years of his life were spent in South America, working as a mechanic at piano and furniture manufacture. He was an excellent workman and fortune favored him, that he amassed some \$40,000. With this capital he went to California before the acquisition of that State by the United States, and, foreseeing the rise in the value of real estate which followed the settlement of the country, invested his money in land. Meanwhile he started a flour mill, where it is stated he made the best flour offered in the California markets, and which always commanded a dollar or so a barrel above ruling rates. During his successful milling business, however, he never lost sight of his land investments, and he was constantly on the alert to buy up government titles given to soldiers and other tenures of property which the owners never believed would ever become very valuable. In this way he acquired the ground on which the Lick House in San Francisco now stands for \$40. That building Mr. Lick had built under his personal supervision, his mechanical knowledge standing him in good stead in constructing the elegant fittings of rare wood which embellish the halls or parlors. He likewise erected other large buildings on his land, most of which is in the heart of San Francisco, the city having grown round and upon it.

Not long ago, as we explained at the time, Mr. Lick set aside some \$5,000,000 from his immense fortune for various charitable purposes, and for the construction of an immense telescope, vesting the funds in trustees. Subsequently he reconsidered his project, and sought to change the conditions of certain portions of the gift, and in this way became involved in discussions with his trustees which gave rise to the report that he had abandoned the project. It is hoped that no legal controversy may arise to prevent a construction of the magnificent telescope, to cost one million dollars, as provided for originally by the deceased. Mr. Lick leaves one son only, a man about 50 years of age, who was attending the Centennial Exhibition when his father died. —Scientific American.

A summary of the agricultural returns of Great Britain has just been issued. From this it appears that the number of acres under wheat cultivation is 2,994,953; under oats, 2,789,583; and under barley, 2,533,106. Potatoes are planted on 504,913 acres; hops are returned as 69,989 acres. The total number of live stock in Great Britain upon June 29th, 1876, was 5,848,214, cattle, 28,178,950 sheep, and 2,293,712 pigs. These figures, as compared with 1875, show a decrease of 2.7 per cent. in cattle, a decrease of 3.4 per cent. in sheep, and an increase of 2.9 per cent. in pigs. In all the cereal departments, too, there was a decrease.

DEATH OF REV. A. R. CRAWLEY.—The Rev. A. R. Crawley, died in London on the 9th inst. He was the only surviving child of H. W. Crawley, Esq., of Sydney, C. B., and at the time of his death was returning to Nova Scotia from India, which has been his field of christian work for the past twenty-five years. —Mr. Crawley was a native of Sydney, C. B., and was educated at Acadia College.

[The deceased clergyman was a cousin of the Rev. Mr. Crawley of St. Andrews.]

Cattle Show and Fair.

The Annual Cattle Show and Fair, was held at the Society's grounds, Bay Side, on Friday last. The day was very fine, and a large number of visitors from town and country was present.

The show of cattle was fair, but not such as we expected to see after the outlay for improved breeds—indeed a competent judge of cattle remarked, "that there were but few traces of pure bred animals. Mr. Densmore's Jersey Bull and Dr. Tupper's Durham, (he said) were the finest cattle on the grounds." The horses were good of their kind, but not superior. Several sheep and lambs were of choice breeds. A large lamb (Leicester), owned by Mr. Upton of St. Stephen, was a superior animal, only six months old and weighs upwards of 140 lbs.

The poultry showed choice breeds and were very fine.

The show of roots and vegetables was by far the best in quality, variety, and size ever exhibited, and would have done credit to any country, and it is difficult to believe they could be excelled. The excellent quality, variety and size of the potatoes was the subject of most favorable comment; and the carrots, parsnips, turnips, onions and beets were superior.

The grain was likewise, very good, the weight being above the average, as will be seen on reference to the premium list, for which we are indebted to Mr. Magee, the Secretary of the Society. The samples of native flour were pronounced of excellent quality; and the domestic manufactures, viz., butter, homespun, socks and mitts, yarn, quilts, &c., were highly commended. Some of the unenumerated articles, the handiwork of the women, displayed much taste and skill. The fruits were also fair.

While the Judges were making up their awards, many of the visitors partook of an excellent and substantial dinner, at Mr. Curry's, where there was an abundance of edibles, well cooked, and the waiters were

attentive, and not tired serving the tables, which were filled again and again. Notwithstanding the great demand the supply was not exhausted, and all who partook of the dinner expressed themselves in complimentary terms. GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA.
Friday, 1 day of May, 1876.
PRESENT
HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is provided by the 56th Section of the Act 31 Victoria, Chapter 6, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," that the importer of any cattle or swine may slaughter and cure and pack the same in bond, under such Regulations and restrictions as the Governor in Council may from time to time make for this purpose.

And whereas it has been found expedient to give effect to the said Section 56, in so far as regards the importation of swine, and to alter the terms of the Regulations for this purpose, adopted by Order in Council of 22nd of May, 1869:—
His Excellency, on the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Customs and under the provisions of the said Act, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the 22nd day of May, 1869, and the Regulations thereby established be and the same are hereby repealed, and that the following Regulations be and are hereby adopted and established in lieu thereof—that is to say,
1. Upon the importation of swine for the purpose of slaughter, the Importer shall enter the same for Warehouse, upon the usual form of such entries, stating upon its face, the number and value of the herd, and also the quantity of pork locon, hams and lard, which the Importer intend will produce when slaughtered and dressed at 113 pounds weight for each live hog so imported, and the amount of duty to which such produce is or may be liable under the rate prescribed by the tariff in force at the time being as the proper duty on meat of that kind. Such Importer shall then execute a bond to the Queen, in double the amount of such duty, the condition of which bond shall be, that upon the due exportation within one year of the said products of the swine so imported and converted into pork, bacon, hams and lard, or payment of the duty secured by the said bond, then the said bond shall be and become null and void, otherwise shall remain in full force and virtue.

2. Upon the reception into the Bonding Warehouse, the swine shall be regarded only as meat, and it shall not be lawful to remove any of them from such Warehouse alive; nor shall any part of the produce of such swine be removed therefrom, for any purpose, without a permit from the Collector, or proper Officer of Customs, as in the case of all other bonded goods.

3. Swine imported in the carcasses to be cured and packed in bond may be entered in the usual way for Warehouse, and be placed in the premises established as a Warehouse for this class for the special purpose of curing and packing. The weight of such carcasses to be duly ascertained by the proper Officer of Customs, and the Importer shall give bond to the Queen in double the amount of duties accruing thereupon under the tariff then in force, conditioned for the due exportation of the same, or payment of duty within two years from the date of first entry.

4. The killing pen, curing and packing house, and all cellars, stores or other apartments included in such Warehouse, shall be accessible at all times between sunrise and sunset to the inspection and survey of the Collector or Inspector of Customs, or any officer of Customs to whom the duty of such inspection may be assigned by them or either of them.

5. The produce of swine imported alive and slaughtered for slaughter, at the said rate of 113 pounds for each hog, and the meat of the swine imported for curing and packing, at the actual ascertained weight at first entry, shall be subject while in bond to all changes in the tariff rate of duty, and with a entered out of bond for any consumption, shall pay the rate of duty once at the date of such entry.
