CHRIST THE GOOD SHEPHERD.

David, in that wonderful 23rd Psalm, had sung of the Lord as his shepherd, and Ezekiel, in the eloquent 34th chapter of his propnecy, had denounced the hireling shepherds that fed themselves instead of their flocks. In the discourse recorded in the tenth chapter of John, which is made our lesson for to-day, both these uses of the figure are employed by Christ. There is a double parable here—the first extending from verse one to ten, Christ. There is a double parable nerethe first extending from verse one to ten,
the second from verse eleven to eighteen.
The difference between the two is unfortunately obscured by what seems to me
clearly a mistranslation, both in the old
and new versions, of the second verse.
Christ does not say, "He that entereth in
by the door is THE, but a shepherd of the

by the door is THE, but A snepherd of the sheep."

Throughout this parable Christ is contrasting the true shepherd and the robber who enters the fold in the guise of a shepherd, but only for selfish purposes. In the second parable he points to himself as the type and model and example for all shepherds of his flock. As he is the light of the world and we are lights in the world, as he is the only begotten Son of God and we are sons of God, as he is the Prince of Peace and the great High Priest, and we are kings and priests unto God, so he is the Shepherd, and we, under his tuition and leadership, are also shepherds of his flock.

Christ is the one door by which we enter into his fold and become members of his flock. There is but one recognized gate of

Not only is every Christian appointed to be a shepherd of Christ's sheep, but to every Christian is allotted some member or members of the flook. He heard his voice and followed him, and will not follow the voice of a stranger. Experience at once confirms and illustrates this declaration. The congregation that receives spiritual impulse from Mr. Spurgeon would go hungry away from the sermons of Canon Liddon; the men who are nourished by Maurice could not be fed by Spurgeon. In almost every church there are laymen who have greater influence with some members of the flook than the preacher can obtain. In almost every school there are some pupils who win a leadership over certain of their fellows, which no teacher, however faithful, can win. The father and the mother are equally appointed to shepherd their own lambs, yet it not infrequently happens that certain of the children will not hear the voice of the father, but will heed that of the mother; and, on the other hand, the states of the children vestored.

There is nothing wrong in this fact; nothing wrong in the existence of undershepherds, whom the various proportions of the deals recognized follows provided shepherds, whom the various provided shepherd and flock alike recognize the truth that these under-shepherds are not the Shepherd, these brethren are not the Master; provided both leader and follower are followers of Christ, and the human shepherd perpetually says to his disciples what Paul said to his: "Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ." He, however, who puts himself before Christ, who stops faith from going beyond him to the Lord, who is covern to receive the follow-

Lord, who is cortent to receive the follow-ing and reverence which belongs alone to Christ, this man is a robber; and if his followers, in spite of him, endeavor to make him occupy this position, they do what in them lies to perpetrate robbery by aid of his name and influence. Sectarianism comes to steal, and to kill, and to destroy; it shuts men up to the use of a single ritual, or binds their minds within the limits of a narrow creed, or forbids their free development by the requirements of obedience to a hierarchy. Some-

ments of obedience to a hierarchy. Some-times it forbids them free and joyous life in the world; sometimes free investigation into all realms of truth; sometimes free ex-pression of spiritual experience, or the free use of whatever service best helps to develop the spiritual life.

use of whatever service best helps to develop the spiritual life.
Christianity comes to give life—larger, truer, better life, life in every department of being, physical, intellectual, social, spiritual. It comes to perfect virtues, not to mar them; to enlarge the soul, not to dwarf it; it is the reverse of sectarianism, because it bida its disciples: Use the world as not opposing it; prove all things, and hold fast that which is good; sing unto the Lord a new song; and, worship the Lord, without regard to place or form of service, in spirit and in truth.

"Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief." He may—indeed, if he be a true shepherd he mist—lay down his life for the sheep. But he has no authority to lay it down and take it again. He surrenders it into the keeping of his Father, and the measure, the degree, the quality, the nature, the extent of his self-denial is determined for him by decrees which lie beyond his control, and in which he has no other part than that of a cheerful acquiescence. No other shepherd can say: "As the Father knoweth me, even so know I the Father." Like Paul, we must confess we see through a glass, darkly; we know in part.

But, though he cannot be the peer of the Good Shepherd, he can be his follower; like him, no hireling; like him, laying down his life for others; like him, also, having a true knowledge of the Father, because the Father dweileth in him and he in the Father; like him, lowing the flock of God and serving it in love. The hireling, whatever ecclesiastical ordination he may have received, is still but a hireling, not a true shepherd; while he that entereth in by the door, to whom the Holy Spirit openeth, who calls his own by name and they follow him, who lays down his life for them, who in all his service of love follows the Master who lived for and loved them both—he is a true shepherd of the sheep, whatever he may lack of theological instruction or ecclesiastical appointments.

This is the lesson of Christ's parable of the shepherd. Its

Life being short and newspaper space comparatively slim in these days of Parliamentary in quirles, conventions and annual exhibitions, and being anxious to find room for as many views on the subject as possible, the preachers were merely asked for a brief sumnary of their views-the heads, as it were. It is really wonderful how much interesting matter a man can put into short space when he is compelled to cut down. Then we have had some clergymen who think they have been discriminated against because they were passed over. No offense was meant. Any ember of the cloth is welcome to use our columns to state his views on this all-important topic, subject always to limitation of space. "In the multitude of counselors there is wisdom," it has been written; and "The Advertiser" is an organ of news if ever there was a time when the moral and religious leaders of the people should speak out it is now. The Halifax (N. S.) Chronicle copies from

The reform effected has been a most substantial one, and the Conservative party, since its return to power, has not ventured to disturb a measure that so manifestly commended itself to the good judgment of the people.

"There is room, however, for an extension of this reform. If a parliamentary committee cannot be trusted to decide whether

ornot a member-elect is entitled to his seat in Parliament it is equally incompetent to try members of the Government, deputy ministers and subordinate officials in the ministers and subordinate officials in the civil service, who are accused of malfeasance of office. This fact has been very patent during the recent investigations. Ministers of the Crown and their supporters in Parliament have been found seeking to block, in every possible way, evidence which might have the effect of damaging their party interests. The divisions that have taken place have been made on party lines, pure and simple, and with no regard

There is much force in our contempor ary's argument. The unprejudiced reade has but to note the conduct of the six Ministers of the Crown who for weeks attended the meetings of the Public Accounts Committee and placed every possible obstacle in the way of investigating expenditures that in any way compromise them, to reach the conclusion that trial by parliamentary committee, unless conducted by men of undeviating integrity, is far from being an ideal method of getting at the truth and arriving at a just verdict. The evil would be vastly modified if the Ottawa rulers had nothing to conceal, if their skirts were clean and their associations above reproach. The system may be bad, but it is not responsible for the men.



The Dominion Alliance in Annual Consultation.

Recommendations in Regard to Poltical Action.

Canada's Big Bill for Drink-Officers

TORONTO, Sept. 17 .- The Dominion Prohi-Toronto, Sept. 17.—The Dominion Prohibition Alliance opened its annual meeting in Richmond Hall yesterday. A letter was read from Hon. Mr. Vidal regretting that his duties as a Senator detained him at Ottawa and debarred him from the pleasure of meeting his fellow-workers in the cause of temperance and prohibition. He requested that the alliance should elect another president, who would carry on the work with renewed vigor and determination.

work with renewed vigor and testion.

A letter from Lieutenant-Governor Schultz, of Manitoba, stated that it had been his constant alm to keep liquor out of territories, and his strong determination on this point had made enemies of many who would do a profitable business if the liquor traffic were sanctioned. He felt the administration of this law to be a very great moral responsibility, and a firm hand should be stretched out to protect the Indian population of that territority from this degrading influence. The Indian could not resist the temptation to indulge in strong drink, and the only hope lay in keeping it away altogether.

The report was adopted after a short discussion.

5. Royal Commission—That while we believe the men chosen for this important work should be persons of the highest character and ability; while we would be rejoiced to see appointed men who possess the confidence of temperance workers and the public generally, and while we believe that all friends of the temperance cause should do all in their power, if oppor-tunity is given, we think that the Alliance should hold itself absolutely free in reference to the personnel and findings of the com-mission.

The proposed Government commission (referred to in clause 6) was the subject of considerable discussion. Mr. F. S. Spence said there was no use trying to get away from the fact that the commission was a mere dodge or trick. It would have no influence in determining the votes of members of Parliament, nor would it reveal anything new as to the need of remedial legislation. He quoted extensively from Hon. Mr. Foster's speeches to show his equivocal position on this question. Other delegates proposed that the Alliance recommend four names to the Government as members of the mes to the Government as members of the

Hon. G. W. Ross spoke in favor of not taking action on the question. They had not been consulted, and had not asked for such a commission. The Government had acted upon its own responsibility in appointing a commission, and they were not actuated by the best of motives. If the commission was going to do honest work that would soon be made manifest. They would be able to judge from the calibre of the men appointed. If three hotel men and one temperance man were appointed of course it would be absurd, but if high-minded, independent and capable men were commissioned there was no reason to doubt but that the results would be sati-factory. He recommended that the Alliance should maintain an independent attitude. The report was adopted.

TEACHERS-IN-TRAINING.

Embrye Tutors in Simooc Street School
Principal Graham and His Assistants Are Busy-Interesting
Notes from the Model

There are at present 25 pupils in the model school which is now held in Simcoo street school. The course covers a period of thirteen weeks. During the early portion of this time the teachers-in-training receive lectures in school management, school law, hygiene and methods of teaching the various subjects on the school programme. Lessons are taught by the principal, and the student teachers observe and teach Lessons are taught by the principal, and the student-teachers observe and teach similar lessons. After all the subjects have been presented in their relation to practical application and mental discipline the student-teachers spend a portion of their time in observing the assistant teachers teach. The student-teachers then commence actual teaching themselves.
