

It is more this year than it has been in several years heretofore, and I am inclined to believe it will reach a still higher figure. The stock we do get is poor and unfit for killing, so we have to send to growers west, who take it to feed and fatten, to insure a profit on the original cost of purchasing. They ship it back to us, and we resell. I am of the opinion that it will take at east a year to recuperate the trade. S. A. Boges, a buyer for Williams, Ransom & Mansfield, said: "We have hipped as high as 45 cars of imported ittle at one time to a company in Indiana, and almost every train that uns in here takes one or more carloads of veal calves.
