

POLICEUNABLETO STAY MURDER

Feared That a Fresh Massacre of the Jews Is About to Take Place at Warsaw.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 29.-"Who will be the next to fall?" That's the question interesting all Russia. That the succession of assassinations

has created profound impression is certain. The bureaucracy is at present too badly stunned to make plans for either protection or revenge. They are looking to their own safety more than to anything else. Trepoff is anxiously sought by the terrorists and may be the next victim of bullet or bomb. It is now known that the men caught in the grounds of the Czar's palace at Peterhof were really in search of Trepoff. Their purpose was "The doctors have finally agreed upon to explode a bomb outside the palace in hopes of attracting their quarry, when confederates were preparing to

> To Trepoff's credit it can be said that he appears less concerned than almost any high official. Officers who wear beards in the Trepoff style are patronizing the barbers, and high officials go abroad now without heavy guards.

Gen. Rennankampf, who commanded a cavalry corps in the war with Japan, and Gov. Karloff, of Minsk, have been marked for assassination. Hotelkeepers in St. Petersburg have been warned against entertaining these officers, under penalty of having their establishments the scene of bomb throwing.

The police seem to be unable to get any clew to what is regarded as a gigantic plot to murder. The prisoners taken refuse to make any statements and it looks as if the boasts of the terrorists that they will kill who and when they please is well founded. It is feared there will be a Jewish massacre at Warsaw. The assassination of Gen. von Liarliarski is attributed to the Jews, and as he was popular with his soldiers they are threatening to have revenge by killing the Jews. The assassin has not been captured and little hope is felt that he will be. Many Jews are leaving the city in anticipation of trouble.



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


