The new taxes do not come inte force before Aug. 1, so that people have been laying in stocks of tea coffee, beer, cigars, champagne, down to the common lucifer match, but these stocks cannot last long, and after Oct. 1 the new taxes will all b in operation.

Then the consumer will have to pay for his matches, for example six cents for ten boxes, which h got previously for two cents; 50 cents a pound for coffee now costing 35 cents, 40 per cent more for tea, from 20 to 25 per cent more for tobacco, from 35 to 45 per cent more for spirits and liqueurs, and-for the more for each glass of beer.






