WAR CLOUD AGAIN HOVERS OVER EUROPE; KAISER REJECTS FRENCH NOTE RE MOROCCO

Disclaims All Idea of Conflict, But "Mailed Fist" Is Evident.

Berlin, June 27-1:49 p.m.-The German answer to the French note on the subject of the proposed Moroccan conference was sent to Paris yesterday. A high official near Chancellor Von Buelow informs the Associated Press that the note, while perfectly amicable in form, insists upon a conference and also declines to comply with France's request that Germany outline beforehand the programme of the conference.

The chancellor takes the standpoint Germany's War Lord, Who Has Again that the Moroccan question is an international affair, and that Germany having accepted the Sultan's invitation to a conference on the subject, cannot rightly agree with any single power as to what can be discussed at the conference. Germany insists that France must agree to the conference before any arrangements are made respecting the subject matter for discussion. After France has agreed to this, Germany is willing to listen to France's wishes.



She takes Mr. Rockethe supreme type of the dominant commercial spirit of the United States. She asks why Mr. Rockefeller, reported to be the richest man in the world, continues working and scheming night and day to increase his fortune. Nobody, not even himself, knows how much Mr. Rockefeller is worth. In 1892 his dividends from his Standard Oil holdings were over \$3,000,000, in 1896 nearly \$8,000,000, in 1900, \$12,000,000. They have enormously increased since then. He has large and profitable investments besides the oil business-in real estate, railroad stock, iron mines, copper mines. "In almost every great financial maneuver in the country is felt his supple, smooth hand with its grip of steel." "What," Miss Tarbell asks, "does he want an income of \$25,000,000 and more for?"

Miss Tarbell's answer is that moneymaking has become with him a monomania. The late Senator Hanna once described Mr. Rockefeller as "moneymad." He gives large sums to education, religion and charity, but these amount to only a tithe of his income He lives simply and has no personal extravagances.
