by Councillor Tapping in the Kingston Court House with the label "Clarendon and Miller," No. 2" on it. Mr. O'Flynn asked Mr. Franklin if he had examined the material of all the boxes given out. Witness said he did not, but he would swear that the box produced was not the one given to Hawkeye.

Clark vs. Green is the last case on the docket. This is an action to set aside an agreement and conveyance made by Wm. Clark in favox of the defendant, John Green. Wm. Clark is a farmer residing in Howard and unmarried. He makes an agreement with Green in which he agrees to convey and does convey, his 50 acre farm under the condition that Green keeps him. The action is brought by an ex-friend of Clark, who alleges that Clark entered into the agreement without knowing-the effect thereof and without independant advice.

FIGHT AT PORT ARTHUR

Japanese Renew Attacks At 2 O'Clock Saturday Afternoon.

t Midnight Saturday a Desperate Struggle Was On For Possession of the Fortified Cliffs-Believed That It Will Take Two Days' Continuous Fighting Before Last of Russian Redoubts Can Be

Tokio, Dec. 5.—Fighting was re-sumed at 2 o'clock on Saturday at-termoon for the possession of the hills on the westerly side of Port Arthur The Russian batteries Shungshoo Mountain and 203-Metre Hill, and at dark Gen. Nogi's infan-

try seized the lower slopes.
Hand to hand fighting immediately began for possession of the crests and when the last bulletin was received at midnight a desperate engagement was going on for posses of the fortified cliffs that are re the northwesterly walls of the city.
Ustil these are taken the Japane
infantry cannot proceed from Pa
Mountain toward Golden Hill, ne can the trenches be continued south from Keekwan Mountain. Four bat-talions of infantry from the trenches of Shungshoo and three battalions from the crests of Metre Hill took

part in this assault. part in this assault.

It is believed here there will be at least two days of continuous fighting before the last of the Russian redoubts can be taken, but as the enemy has not more than 3,000 men able to take the field there is no doubt whatever of success in the battle now on.

Ready For Baltic Fleet.

Tokio, Dec. 5.—Most interesting news developed in the Navy Depart-ment yesterday and proves that the Russian fleet in Port Arthur harbor must be so disabled that it is no longer a menace to the Japanese cruisers lying outside the harbor. For three weeks there has not been a single Japanese battleship in the

When it became certain that the Baltic fleet was really bound for the Yellow Sea Admiral Togo silently took the battleships to Sasebo, where they went into drydock, received all necessary repairs and were reapain-ted. The news was made known Saturday afternoon, but only after the last of the first-class battleships, the Asahi, had proceeded toward the Gulf of Corea. Admiral Togo's flagship, the Mikado, sailed from Sase-bo on Thursday, and was followed by the Shikishima and Fuji. It is evidently the purpose of the Japan-ese admiral to meet the Baltic fleet where the Sea of Japan and the Yel-

low Sea meet. There the battle must take place. There the battle must take place. The Russians cannot go around Japan, as the northern sea is frozen over hundreds of miles from Valdivostock. As Port Arthur will have fallen before the Baltic fleet can arrive near Japan, the Japanese admiral will have, besides his battleships, nine armoured cruisers and 11 protected cruisers to engage the Russian fleet. sian fleet.

Russians At Jibutil.

Jibutil, French Somaliland, Dec. 5. -A Russian fleet, consisting of thir-teen warships and nine transports, in command of Rear-Admiral Voellersam, is anchored outside the harbor, coaling.

More Russian Boats.

Brest, Dec. 5.—The Russian torpedo boat destroyer Prouseitelny sailed yesterday for Tangier. The Russian cruisers Oleg and Lzumrud and the transport Okean have arrived here. The cruiser Rion and two torpedo boat destroyers have sailed for Alegiers.



Dominion Alliance Issues a Strong Manifesto.

Adepts Declaration That There Has Been a "Complete Desertion of the Ontario Government On the Temperance Question"-Liberal Convention Platform h Disappointment and All Claim For Temperance Support Thereby Forfeited.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—The Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance took action yesterday afternoon in the adoption of a declaration which has been described as representing a complete desertion of the Ontario Government on the temperance question." After detailing the various steps taken by Sir Oliver Mowat, Hon. A. S. Hardy and Hon. G. W. Ross towards the alliance platform, and stating the events of the recent Liberal convention in which the com-Liberal convention in which the com-promise resolution calling for a municipal prohibition vote in 1906 was rejected, the manifeste pro-

"This executive reports that after careful and serious consideration it is forced to the conclusion that the rejection by the convention of this resolution dispels all hope that may have been entertained that this ad-ministration would endeavor to releem the pledges quoted.

We regret also that not only did the Premier, and Hon. Mr. Gibson take no part in supporting this resolution, but they acquiesced in its defeat, and the Premier stated to the convention that he was 'delighted with the convention's decision upon the temperance question.'

"In view of the promises made, the overwhelming mandate of the electors, and the need for effective measures to check the evils of intemper ance, this executive views the situ-ation as it now exists with the deepst regret and disappointment. Government has trifled with the great temperance question, has been unfaithful to the pledges and promises of its successive premiers, and has by its record and recent course on this, the most important in provin-cial politics, forfeited all claim to he support of electors who put temperance principle above partisanship in political affairs.
"Until temperance men determined-

but temperance men determined-ly refuse to support any party or candidate that continues to trifle with or ignore this great question," continues the manifesto, "it is mani-fest their triples or the manifesto, "it is manifest that no useful advance in tem-perance legislation can be hoped for," and recommends the nomina-tion and election of candidates who can be relied upon to secure such legislation, and who would be free from party dictation. The manifesto was prepared by a

sub-committee appointed a week ago, consisting of Rev. Drs. Carman, Goodspeed, Bates and Chown, and Messrs. G. F. Marter, Alex. Mills, J. O. McCarthy and F. S. Spence. The executive sat for two hours and a half yesterday, and though much discussion took place, the meeting. cussion took place, the meeting was fairly unanimous, and the declaration prepared was adopted practically without change.

Attempted to But Could Not Retake 203-Metre Hill.

Casr's Men Repulsed With Heavy Less Gen. Rennenkampff Reported to Have Driven Japanese Army Out of New Position Southward of Tsinhketchentured Several Jap Guns and 600 Rifles.

Tokio, Dec. 3.-It is reported here that the Russians have attempted to re-take 203-Metre Hill. They assembl-ed a strong force and assaulted the position, but were repulsed with heavy loss.

The Japanese finding sailors among the Russian dead, believe that if the men from the fleet are being employed in making sorties the com-plement of the forces must be falling short.
The fact that the Russians are for-

tifying the positions available be-tween Liaoti and Mantai Mountains, tween Liaoti and Mantai Mountains, increases the belief that they will make their last stand there.

Imperial headquarters makes the announcement that 17 officers have been killed and 64 wounded in the field, but does not mention the place. It is presumed that it was at Port Arthur.

The wounded log of Gen. Nake-

wounded leg of Gen. Nakamura has been amputated.

Drove Japa Out.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 8.—Despatches received from Mukden yesterday say that Gen. Rennenkampff's forces on Nov. 30 drove the Japanese out of a new position southward of Tsinhket-chen, near Da Pass. The fighting was short and sharp. The Japanese burn-ed their supply deposits in three viled their supply deposits in three vil-lages and retreated pursued by Cos-sacks so far as the Teitse River. The Japanese losses were about 50 killed and one hundred wounded. The Cos-sacks destroyed a Japanese telegraph line, and occupied the village of Sui-dun (gbout seven and one-half miles southeast of Tsinhketchen).

Captured Jap Guns and Rifles. St. Petersburg, Dec. 3.—A special despatch received here from Mukden. says: "It is reported that Gen. Rennenkampff has captured several Jap anese guns and a convoy with 600 rifles, but that a force of 40,000, consisting of Chinese bandits and a reserve of 8,000 Japanese has started to turn Rennenkampfi's flank.' The Black Sea Fleet,

London, Dec. 3.—A Sebastopol des-patch to The Daily Graphic asserts that Admirals Alexieff and Grand Alexander Michaelovitch (the latter the head of the Russian Mer-cantile Marine), both advocate send-ing out the Black Sea fleet.

In Constantinople, according to a despatch to The Standard, it is taken for granted that both Great Britain and Turkey would resolutely oppose the exit of the Russian Black Sea fleet.

Preparing For the Inevitable.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 3.—With the confirmation of the news that the Japanese have occupied 203 Metre Hill, and the repert that the Rus-sians unsuccessfully attempted its re-capture, officials at the War Office are beginning to prepare themselves for the inevitable. Golden Hill and for the inevitable. Golden Hill and Liaon Hill are higher and dominate 203 Metre Hill, but the officials say that if the Japanese succeed in mounting heavy guns upon the latter mounting neary guins upon the acception it will probably be only a question of days or weeks before the fortress falls. Still there is not the slightest idea among Gem. Stoessel's friends that he will surrender, even if he should be ordered to do so

Died From Old Knife Wound.

Brantford, Dec. 3.-Edward Dunne, a youth of 20 years, succumbed yesterday in the hospital in this city to injuries received one Sunday fast September. On that day Lorne Walley, also of this city, in a fit of indignation, threw an open knife at indignation, threw an open knife at Dunne. The blade penetrated his back. The wound was not considered serious at the time. Walley admits throwing the knife. He was arrested some days ago, when the victim's condition was known to be serious. The charge was that of felonously wounding, but it now may be changed to manslaughter. Dunne is a son of ex-Ald. Dunne of this city, while Walley comes of a most respectable family.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—The man John Steen, who is charged with being implicated in the Dentonia Park robbery, pleaded not guilty before the county magistrate vesterday and was remanded for a week. Steen denies that he had anything to de with the burglary. He claims that he had anything to de with the burglary. He claims that the private detective who gave the information against him is an ex-convict whom he met in the Central Prisen, when they were both doing time.

No Salary, Me Resigns

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Edward W. Tatum, for five years president of the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders, has resigned. Mr. Tatum said he was compelled to vacate because no salary was paid him.

Robert Glockling, Secretary of the Provincial Labor Bureau, Toronto, the vice-president, assumes the office of president.

Exit of the Oldest Actress.

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Mrs. George Henry Gilbert, the oldest actress on the American stage, died in her rooms at the Sherman House yesterday shortly after she had suffered a stroke of apoplexy. Mrs. Gilbert was born in England 83 years ago and came to this country with her husband, who was a dancer, in 1849.

The minister of foreign affairs has £8,800, and finance comes next with a thousand lower. The lowest salary is that of the minister of mines, though it is rather higher than that of the premier of England. The sum is £5,500.—London Globe.

The value of the United States property, real and personal in 1900 was \$94,000,000,000 as compared with \$59,000,000,000 for Great Brit ain and Ireland, \$48,000,000,000 for France, \$45,000,000,000 for Germany, \$32,000,000,000 for Russia, \$22,000,000,000 for Austria-Hungary, \$15,000,000. 000 for Italy and \$12,000,000,000 for Spain. Moreover, the United States' Spain. lead is increasing faster than is her preponderance over them all (except Russia and China) in population

clipnings to the pure teachings of Jesus.



Rev. Mr. Cobbledick Withdraws his Statements Regarding the Lacrosse Clubs.

As a preface to his sermon last evening, kev. Mr. Cobbledick made the following statement 'concerning his reference to the Tecumseh Lacrosse

In the course of my sermon last Sunday evening on the subject, "The Prodigal Dead Broke," I referred to sports as one of the things which bring men to being dead broke financially, and referred by way of illustration to the tendency fo run athletics into professional sports, and cited the Lacrosse Club as a case in point. I deprecated the professional izing of this kind of athletics and incidentally voiced the impression which seemed to be pretty general at the time and which I received from several, as I believed, reliable sources concerning some of the team.

I have been very glad to be personally assured since by those in close

I have been very glad to be personally assured since by those in close touch with the men through the season, that I was misinformedd in two particulars, viz., that none of them ever gambled and that the reason some of them were not available for the final game was that they were the final game was that they were

sick.

I regret having, though unintentionally, done any man an injustice, and in the same spirit of candor in which I made the statement I wish to correct in those particulars and to say that I have learned the management were careful to secure only to correct in those particulars and (to say that I have learned the management were careful to secure only clean men for the team. Now that the personal element has been eliminated. I may be permitted to make plain what I aimed to call attention to in the first place, viz., the prefessionalizing of athletics. We all know something of the length to which this has been carried in the United States, in baseball, and the evils inseparably connected with it. Lacrosse, in Canada, is becoming almost as professional a game as baseball is across the line.
