His excellent reputation, both at home and abroad, as a manufacturer of fine work in his line warrants him in starting a branch business in our neighboring town. This, however, does not affect his business here in the least. His old-time customers may rely upon him sticking to the last, and that he will in the future, as in the past, be found ready to supply them with boots and shoes second to none in the Province.

POOR CELL.—There was a crowded house at the Osborn Hall, on Tuesday night to witness Cecil's exposure, of that great old of great humbugs, "Spiritualism." The entertainment was undoubtedly good. The tricks performed were of a character sufficiently mysterious to impress any one with the belief that supernatural agencies were at work, but when the Professor revealed the audience into the secret of the "manifestations," the idea of agencies other than mundane vanished from the mind like a flash, except perhaps in one or two instances, where spiritualistic "mediums" had left an indelible bias. The Professor promised to return to Listowel in a few days, but he will not draw a "bumper" house.

TO BE REBUILT.—At a meeting of shareholders of the Union Brick and Glass Manufacturing Company, held on Monday last, it was resolved to commence rebuilding the factory immediately. The meeting will take place on the 8th February. It was also decided at the meeting to request the Elms Council to offer a reward for the conviction of the party who set fire to the factory. Mr. Bodwell, the cheese maker, occupied a portion of the factory as a dwelling, and on Tuesday night the fire broke out in the residence of his household furniture having been completely destroyed, and uninsured. The company offers to reward the party with \$100 as a slight compensation for his loss. Mr. Bodwell, however, modestly declined to accept the proffered gift, expressing himself as desiring the management of the factory. It is intended to make the new factory considerably larger than the former one, and to have it running in a few days after the opening of the cheese season.

THE NEWBY ROBBERY.—On Friday last Robert Esoper was brought before Geo. Clime, Esq., J. P., charged with having conveyed in his late robbery of Mr. Koll's boot and shoe store at Newby Station. Esoper's connection with the robbery had been so effective in the constables and disclosed to them a portion of the stolen goods, some six or seven pairs of boots. At the magistrate's examination it was disclosed that Edmund Esoper, a brother of Robert's, and George Donaldson, were also parties to the robbery, they having traded a pair of the stolen boots to a young man named Carnegie. Since this transaction took place the latter Esoper and Donaldson have left the neighborhood. Mr. Esoper is taking what evidence was available, the case was adjourned till today (Friday) forenoon.

R. was also very much interrupted by the storm. One of the coldest days of the season followed the storm, which in turn was succeeded on Monday by a genuine thaw, accompanied with heavy snow, which has had the effect of greatly lessening the quantity of snow, which everybody in this vicinity seems to be satisfied with, as roads which had been next to impassable previous to the thaw, are now in comparatively fair condition. From present indications, a short season of open weather is probable; but it is unsafe to count much on indications of this kind.
