WONDROUS RAINBOW THAT IS SEEN RARELY

ST. ANDREWS, N. News in Brief

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A tornado, followed by heavy hail, swept over Nanton district, Alberta, south of Calgary, on July 14, wrecking farm buildings and tearing down the school house. Nobody was injured. The hail did extensive damage to the crops.

Thomas Cantley was elected president of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company at a meeting of the shareholders held at Halifax on July 16. He succeeds R. E. Harris, who has been appointed to the supreme court bench of Nova Scotia and will retain the general management of the company.

Two negroes, suspected of having aided Peter Jackson, lynched yesterday for the murder of three white men near Cochrane, Ga., Tuesday night. They were lynched Wednesday night near Hawkinsville by a posse of citizens. One was Jackson's brother.

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The ball is to ensure his presence at future proceedings as the state appealed.

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The *Times*, London, says that Mrs. Mary Mitchell, of Old Brompton, Chertsey, on June 26 celebrated her birthday. She is a widow and is the grand-daughter of a centenarian who died at the age of 103. Mrs. Mitchell is a Wesleyan Methodist community, she was the first Bible woman in the parish of the Royal Marines as long ago as 1832.

The Berwick planning mill, Berwick N. S., owned by J. W. Hutchinson, were destroyed by fire on July 15. The plant, valued at \$100,000. Valuable lumber was also destroyed. There was no insurance. The adjoining building, a saw mill, owned by the same firm, was also burned, the loss being estimated at \$1,500.

The British police attached much importance to the arrest, in London on July 15, of an American who was wearing the uniform of a Princess Patricia's Light Infantry soldier. The man's name had not been made public. He was brought in on a charge of carrying a revolver and was arrested for further investigation. The arrest was made in Gravesend.

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THE THIRD CANADIAN UNIVERSITIES COMPANY

There are many men in Canada who are anxious to go and play their part in the Great War, who are willing to go to officers, but from want of adequate military training, or for other reasons, are unable to obtain commissions. There are other men who would prefer to join the ranks simply because they realize the enormous responsibility the wastage of life which results from the bad leadership of an improperly trained officer.

Some of these men hesitate to go in the ranks, merely because they are uncertain of finding the congenial companionship of men of similar training and tastes.

Now, there is an organization in Canada exactly suited to the requirements of such men, and its existence should be brought clearly to the notice of every young man in Canada.

The Universities of Canada are working loyally together to raise a company to reinforce as units that famous regiment, the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

These companies are composed of men from the Universities of Canada, the friends of such men, and broadly speaking, the youth of the Dominion, who are in military life to the full. The existence of such a force was known throughout the length and breadth of Canada, there would be no difficulty in recruiting a full company within a week.

The Third Universities Company, under the command of an excellent leader, Captain Gregor Barclay, has been for some time in England. An eminent military authority has declared this to be the finest company which has ever sailed from Canada.

The Second University Company was composed of men of a splendid type and was embarked recently at Montreal.

The Third Universities Company (and note that the plural is deliberate) is recruiting with fair rapidity, and there is every hope that it will reach the high mark of success attained by the first two companies.

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BRILLIANT EXPLOIT IN EAST AFRICA

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DOMINION TRUST COMPANY

Vancouver, B. C., July 15.—The entire body of claims of depositors in the Dominion Trust Company, numbering over 4,000, have been paid to the amount of millions of dollars, have been thrown out by a liquidator Andrew Stewart, who is now in charge of the former Dominion Trust headquarters in this city. Mr. Stewart has segregated the depositors into three groups and objects to paying any of them.

He declines, on the advice of his counsel, to admit that any of them rank as creditors of the company in any sense, and to prove otherwise, the depositors' case will have to be taken to the courts.

For this purpose, E. P. Davis, K. C., who was retained some months ago by the provincial government in the matter, will at once appeal to the supreme court. Test cases, for the purpose of determining the rights of depositors, will probably be carried to the provincial court. Many of the depositors are penniless, and the government will foot the bill for litigation.

The total amount of depositors' claims in British Columbia is \$675,000. The balance is chiefly owing to persons in eastern Canada. The liquidator, in refusing the claims, relies on the Birckbeck Bank case in London, whereby for so many years a creditor, which finally went to the wall, received deposits without any legal right to do so. During the last year the company's existence deposits in Dominion Trust were taken by a pass book system, which stated that the money were held "in trust for investment." More than half the total amount of deposits is represented in this class. The depositors will argue before the court that they were not ordinary depositors, but investors, and therefore have a right to be considered rank with the general creditors.

Persons in close touch with the liquidator are authority for the assertion that the loss will be even more staggering than at first thought, and it is doubtful if what will be finally realized, even after careful handling for the next four or five years, will more than pay the legal expenses and actual costs incident to the liquidation.

PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[July 13 to July 19]

DERIVATIVES during the whole course of the war in no way has scintillated more than in the week under review, and to summarize events with such meagre data is not easy, or even possible.

In the western theatre no change of any importance was reported to have been made, especially in the vicinity of Verdun, where the German Crown Prince's forces made a number of unsuccessful attacks in force on the French positions. Doubtless they were more transpired than was made public, and the reticence of the official news bureau is significant, if not ominous.

From the eastern arena the news supplied has been somewhat fuller, but of a less consolatory kind from the point of view of the Russians and their Allies. At the close of the previous week hope was entertained that the Russians had retained their position in the Dardanelles, but the leader in the Globe, which we give above, makes it clear that the situation is not so bright as it appears.

Notwithstanding the number of recruits already enlisted from the Province of New Brunswick, it is beyond the possibility of truthful contradiction that the number is not what it should be. What can be said or done to urge more young men to enlist? This is the question that is being asked here.
