

He said that the commit'ee had positively decided that if any writ of ejectment was served on any squatter who had not subscribed before the first suits commenced they would be left out in the cold so far as any support from the squatters' fund is concerned, and would have to go it alone. With refer-ence to a contribution of a dollar or ten dollars he said: "If you do not put up that amount now it may cost you ten times that amount next year, and it will serve you right."

At the close of Mr. Curtis' speech a number of men came forward and subscribed.

Thomas Gee made a motion that the squatters make a legal resistance to the cases against Beatty and Greer about to come up at Nelson. It carried unanimously.

# Engineer's Report.

Extract from a report by Harry Gager, mining engineer: "This group consisting of the Gray Copper, Copper Giant and Blue Copper, all being full claims, fifteen hundred by fifteen hundred feet, are situated on the southeast slope of Lookout Mountain, about ten miles south of Trail, four and one-half miles north of Waneta, on the Nelson & Fort Sheppard Railway, three and a half miles west of Paulton's Landing on the Columbia River and one and one half miles north of the International boundary line, in the Trail Creek mining division of West Kootenay district, British Columbia, and adjoining the Trail & Waneta Gold and Copper Mining Company's property on the south."

# Workings and Outcrop.

"The development so far consists of several open cuts along the center line on the outcrop, and a shaft on the Copper Giant six by ten feet on the surface by eight feet in depth, tapering to about five by eight feet at the bottom, in diorite, which is much broken on north and south sides and the east end. 

**Bailways in Canada.** The Canadian Magazine seems to think that Canada is building railways too fast and in proof of this cites the fact that the proportion of net revenue to capital cost of railway is in Cape Colony nearly 6 per cent; in India, 5; South Australia, 2½. In Oanada it is but 1½, Tasmania alone of all the British colonies giving a lower return. There are 16,091 miles of track in the Dominion, to assist in the construction Dominion, to assist in the construction of which the government has contributed at the rate of \$9,369 a mile. The sum total, taking into consideration the aid given by provincial governments and municipalities, amounts to \$195,000,000. It is claimed that the cost of a railway should not be more than ten times its annual traffic, and if this axiom holds good it would appear that more money has been spent in railways in Canada than the position of affairs would warrant, vestors. for while the gross receipts of the Oana-dian railroads in 1895 amounted to \$46,-785,487, the paid up capital was \$894,-660,559, the ratio of gross traffic to cost
