The real danger was that Slavery would creep in unregarded and unobserved, while the territory was without a Constitution or any machinery of self-government—would domesticate and entwine itself with the habits and usages of the country, and come forward whenever a Constitutional Convention should assemble to plead past immunity and tolerance as creating a "vested" stitutional Convention should assemble to plead past immunity and tolerance as creating a "vested right," which could not be overruled without injustice and calamity. To say that the People of Culifornia should settle the question for themselves—settle it explicitly and promptly—was substantially saying that they should prohibit Slavery, and to favor the call of a Convention, and the framing of a State Constitution this year was to favor the exclusion of Slavery.
