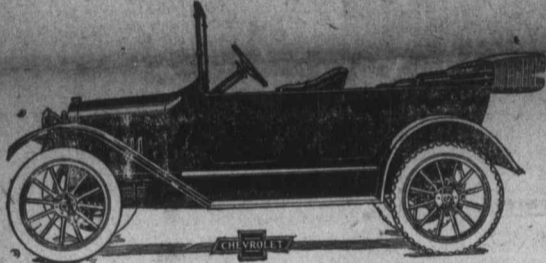

BILLY SUNDAY.

(By Dr. Frank Crane, Copyright, 1917, by Frank Crane and republished from the Morning Chronicle.)

I have been asked to give my estimate of Billy Sunday, the Evangelist who is now conducting a series of meetings in New York City.

I never saw Billy Sunday. What opinion I have is formed from published accounts in the press and from people who have heard him.

This evangelist is the latest exponent of that movement of popular preaching which was begun in the eighteenth century by the Wesleys in England.

The net result of Sunday's work, as of the whole revivalistic method, is good. The main drive is usually at the essentials and aimed to induce men to be devout and conscientious which is the purpose of all religion.

Of course preachers are human and subject to the inevitable limitations. Sunday is especially human, and hence provokes much criticism.

His slang, his antics, his coarseness of language are the very qualities that endear him to the multitude.

His theology is not necessary to speak. Many strongly object to it. Perhaps it is wrong. And perhaps not.

In the main this strenuous apostle sets men thinking, gets them to cease doing evil and to begin doing right.

To condemn him because we do not agree with his theology, because he employs unusual language, because his movement is shrewdly organized, because he uses all the arts of swaying crowds, or because he has money, seems to me to be unjust.

As to liking or disliking him, Lincoln's remark is applicable: "I should think that for people that like that sort of thing that is about the sort of thing they would like."

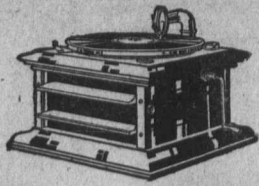

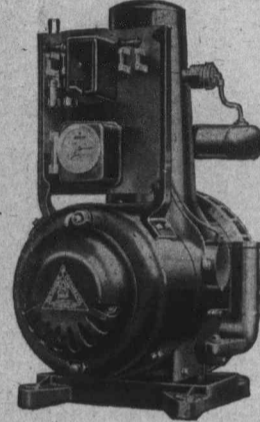
