

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CHARLESTON LAKE.
 The lake, though somewhat out of the beaten track of tourist travel, is quite easy of access. A traveller leaving Brockville would take the afternoon train on the B. & W. and reach Athens about 5 o'clock after a ride of an hour and a quarter through a fine agricultural section. Here he would be met by a comfortable bus and driven rapidly to the lake, four miles distant. Approaching the lake, there is nothing to suggest its presence until the traveller gets quite near his destination, when from the top of a high elevation the lake comes full in view, stretching away to left and right, so many islands dotting its surface that the lake appears to consist of narrow water-ways between them. A dash down the long, steep hill and the shore of the lake is reached.


Death of Henry Lee.
 Died at Lyn, July 27th, 1892. Henry Lee, in the sixty-fifth year of his age.
 This above will be recognized by almost any of our readers, as Mr. Lee was one of the most widely known and respected residents of these counties.
 One of a large family, consisting of thirteen sons and one daughter, on the death of his father, Gordon Lee, he started out at 15 years of age in the battle of life with little health, energy and integrity. Gradually he purchased piece by piece from other heirs until at his death he was owner of the homestead upon which he was born.
 In addition to carrying on his farm, he, in former years, did a large business in horses and other stock, principally for the American market. The writer has heard him remark that he had been over every road and pointed nearly every farm house in the county. Being of a genial, social disposition, his companionship was highly prized, and a party on a hunting or fishing excursion was not quite complete unless he was one of the number.
 Being a successful farmer, he took great interest in the annual exhibition of the agricultural society, and had been a member of the board of directors almost continuously since the establishment of the fair at Unionville.
 When it became known on Monday last that he was dangerously ill (he had been unwell for a few days), much anxiety was visible, and his death on Wednesday cast a gloom over the village.
 Owing to the nature of the disease, it was found impossible to delay the funeral, which took place on Thursday at 2:30 and was largely attended, although owing to shortness of time a large number of friends could not be notified.
 He leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters, besides three orphan grand-children, to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father.

His Faring Address.
 Rev. George Burnfield, once pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Brockville, but lately living in Toronto, has just resigned his charge of the Scottish Presbyterian Church of that city. He preached his farewell sermon on Sunday and created quite a sensation by some of his remarks.
 There was a fair turnout and a number of Orangemen in regalia were sprinkled among the audience.
 His discourse was based on the words, "The Kingdom of God is within." He said the Kingdom of God was free as the atmosphere surrounding the globe and open to all creeds. "As far as I am concerned," added the preacher, "I shall never preach the doctrine that anyone is excluded from Heaven. I sometimes think that one of the greatest surprises to me will be to find myself there." Then, leaning over the desk and pointing his finger towards his congregation, he, in measured tones, said, "but a still greater wonder to me when I get to Heaven will be to find some of you there." (Sensation.)
 "I believe that some people in this house are offended because I did not tell them where I was going. Still you know I am a Scotchman, and a Scotchman is allowed to keep to himself three times as much as anybody else. (Laughter.) But let me say right here that it is nobody's business where I go. A congregation has no right to ask for details from its pastor. I tell you this not for my own sake, but for the advantage of him who may follow me, so that you may know what to expect from him when he leaves you." (Laughter.)
 Addressing himself to the Orangemen he earned loud and repeated applause when he thanked them for the kindness they had shown him, and pledged himself fealty to the principles of the order. "Some of the members of this congregation don't like me because I am an Orangeman," was almost his concluding sentence, delivered amid hand-clapping and foot-stamping.—Ex.



CHARLESTON LAKE.


Book-Bound Remains—The Fisheries Beauty of Many Strata.

Long before Leeds County had a name, the waters of the Charleston Lake fishing ground were a large section of country, and the Indians and early pioneers were wont to supply their larder from its crystal depths. Then, too, on its wooded shores the red deer roamed in numbers, so that it must have been to use a somewhat hackneyed phrase, a veritable "sportsman's paradise." But as settlement increased the deer were either slaughtered or driven back until now scarcely a trace remains of that noble game, save were occasionally a few bleached and weather-worn antlers that have withstood the test of time, or when the fact of their past existence is pleasantly impressed upon a visitor while listening to the stories of Charleston's "oldest inhabitant," "Uncle Riley."

The deer have passed away and the pristine glory of the fishing, but sufficient of the latter remains to endow the lake with its irresistible charm for disciples of "the gentle fish."

The lake is very deep, and contains no marshes. There are, however, what the fishermen term "deep wood-beds," and it is while anchored at one of these that the majority of fish are taken with the rod and line. Many residents of Athens have come to regard Charleston Lake as their summer home, and so have created these lodges in the wilderness where they may rest from their labors.

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Here you have a choice of "two excellent hotels." The first, "Harbor View," (Edward Duffield, proprietor) was the sole and only anglers' inn of other days. About three years ago, increasing trade necessitated an enlargement of the premises and Mr. Duffield modernized the old building and added to it until now Harbor View has accommodated for thirty guests and was well filled on the occasion of our visit last week. The best evidence of the popularity of the house is found in the fact that guests are found returning to it with each recurring season.

Of fish to be found in the lake, and we here give a partial list: Salmon, trout bass, white fish, pike, Oswego bass, rock bass, moon fish, perch, etc. All these are found in abundance in Charleston, but the fish that constitute the lake's glory, and have served to attract sportsmen from every state in the Union and from all parts of Ontario. These fish are found in satisfying numbers, and with one of the numerous experienced fishermen to be had, a visitor is certain of a good catch. A New York party, Messrs. W. H. VanAllen and wife, A. W. VanAllen and wife, Miss VanAllen and Master VanAllen, at present at the Park, have had good success fishing for salmon in one day weighing respectively 12, 11, 11, and 6 lbs.; 31 bass in one day, none of which weighed less than 1 1/2 lbs. From this it will be seen that Charleston has more than fresh air, fine scenery and fish stories which with to entertain visitors.

He preached his farewell sermon on Sunday and created quite a sensation by some of his remarks. There was a fair turnout and a number of Orangemen in regalia were sprinkled among the audience.

His discourse was based on the words, "The Kingdom of God is within." He said the Kingdom of God was free as the atmosphere surrounding the globe and open to all creeds. "As far as I am concerned," added the preacher, "I shall never preach the doctrine that anyone is excluded from Heaven. I sometimes think that one of the greatest surprises to me will be to find myself there." Then, leaning over the desk there, and pointing his finger towards his congregation, he, in measured tones added, "but a still greater wonder to me when I get to Heaven will be to find some of you there." (Sensation.)

"I believe that some people in this house are offended because I did not tell them where I was going, and I thought it was allowed to keep to himself three times as much as anybody else. (Laughter.) But let me say right here that it is nobody's business where I go. A congregation has no right to ask for details from its pastor. I tell you this not for my own sake, but for the advantage of him who may follow me, so that you may know what to expect from him when he leaves you." (Laughter.)

Addressing himself to the Orangemen he earned loud and repeated applause when he thanked them for the kindness they had shown him, and pledged himself faithfully to the principles of the order. "Some of the members of this congregation don't like me because I am an Orangeman," delivered amid hand-clapping and feet-stamping.—Ex.
