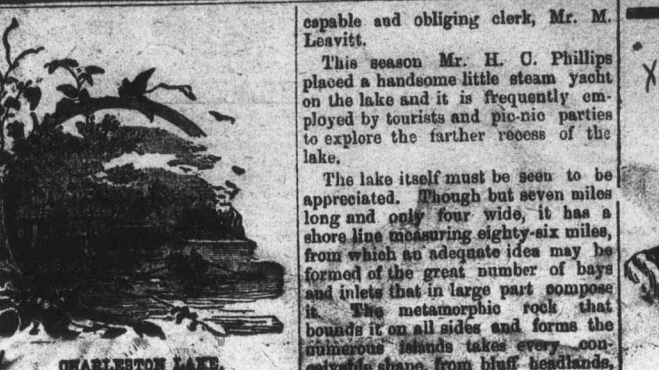

capable and obliging clerk, Mr. M. Leavitt.
This season Mr. H. C. Phillips placed a handsome little steam yacht on the lake and it is frequently employed by tourists and picnic parties to explore the farther recesses of the lake.
The lake itself must be seen to be appreciated. Though but seven miles long and only four wide, it has a shore line measuring eighty-six miles. The lake is so deep that it is formed of the great number of bays and inlets that in large part compose it. The metamorphic rock that bounds it on all sides and forms the picturesque scenery takes every conceivable shape, from bluff headlands, that echo back the slightest sound, to shelving beaches upon which the foot of your boat greets you as you approach the shore. The foliage that covers shore and island is dense and varied, adding to the landscape a pleasing variety that catches the eye. From many points and islands deep fathoms are reached, and the rocky banks are encircled green handsome cottages with grounds wherein art has aided (if that be possible) nature in producing a beautiful scene. Many residents of Athens have come to regard Charleston Lake as their summer home, and so have selected these lodges in the wilderness where they may rest from their labors.
The lake is very deep, and contains no marshes. There are, however, what the fishermen term "deep wood-beds," and it is while anchored at one of these that the majority of fish are taken with the rod and line. Many of the anglers look with disdain on the method of catching bass, and lure their finny favorites with a fly cast ahead of the boat while being rowed slowly along the shore. A good idea of the sport to be had may be formed from a consideration of the kinds of fish to be found in the lake, and we herewith append a list: Salmon, brook bass, white fish, pike, Oswego bass, rock bass, moon fish, roach, perch. All these and many others make their home in Charleston, but it is the first named—the salmon and black bass—that constitute the lake's chief glory, and have served to attract sportsmen from every state in the Union and from all parts of Ontario. These fish are found in satisfaction, and in one day some of the numerous experienced fishermen to be had, a visitor is certain of a good catch. A New York party, Messrs. W. H. VanAllen and wife, A. W. VanAllen and wife, Miss VanAllen and Master VanAllen, at present at the Park, have had good success fishing, and we here give a record of a catch made by Mr. A. W., who is a well-known fisherman. A salmon weighing 12 1/2 lbs., one of which weighed less than 1 1/2 lbs. From this it will be seen that Charleston has more than fresh air, fine scenery and fish stories from which to entertain visitors.
The protection of the fish from pirates is looked after by Wm. Hicks, for the Dominion Government, and by Justin Smith for the Ontario. In addition, an efficient Anglers' Association, of which Mr. W. G. Parish, Athens, is president and Mr. M. A. Everett, Athens, secretary, maintains a general supervision of the lake and attends (with the inspector) to re-stocking it from the government hatchery.
A meeting of the board of directors of Unionville fair was held at Fortiton on Wednesday last week. Present: Messrs. Beecher, Baunders, Welton, Forth, Lovrin and treasurer and secretary. CHARLESTON LAKE.
Black-headed Smelt—Crucial—The Peerless Beauty of Many Strains.

Long before Leeds County had a name, the waters of the Charleston Lake fishing ground were a large section of country, and the Indians and early pioneers were wont to supply their larder from its crystal depths. Then, too, on its wooded shores the red deer roamed in numbers, so that it must have been to use of a somewhat hackneyed phrase, a veritable "sportsman's paradise." But as settlement increased the deer were either slaughtered or driven back until now scarcely a trace remains of that noble game, save were occasionally a few bleached and weather-worn animals that have withstood the test of time, or when the fact of their past existence is pleasantly impressed upon a visitor while listening to the stories of Charleston's "oldest inhabitant," "Uncle Riley."

The deer have passed away and the pristine glory of the fishing, but sufficient of the latter remains to endow the lake with its irresistible charm for disciples of "the gentle fish."



The lake, though somewhat out of the beaten track by tourist traveling, is quite easy of access. A traveler leaving Brockville would take the afternoon train on the P. & W. and reach Athens about 5 o'clock after a ride of an hour and a quarter through a fine scenic route. Here, he would be met by a comfortable bus and driven rapidly to the lake, four miles distant. Approaching the lake, there is nothing to suggest its presence until the traveler gets quite near his destination, when from the top of a high elevation the lake comes full in view, stretching away to left and right, so many islands dotting its surface that the lake appears to consist only of narrow water-ways between them. A dash down the long, steep hill and the shore of the lake is reached.

Those who have a "choicé" of two excellent hotels. The first, "Harbor View," (Edward Duffield, proprietor) was the sole and only anglers' inn of other days. About three years ago, increasing trade necessitated an enlargement of the premises and Mr. Duffield modernized the old building and added to it until now Harbor View has accommodated for thirty guests and was well filled on the occasion of our visit last week. The best evidence of the popularity of the lake is found in the fact that guests are found returning to it with each recurring season.



"Cedar Park" hotel (a cut of which illustrates this article) is very appropriately named, as it is situated in the midst of a beautiful grove of cedars, which stand separate or in groups, with grassy lawn extending between, their dense foliage of darkest green ever pleasing to the eye, while the ozone added to the breeze by their evergreen branches is at all times refreshing. The house was erected by Mr. Adam Armstrong, presenter for the accommodation of summer visitors, and it fills the bill most admirably. All the rooms on the second and third floors are large and well furnished, and the spacious dining, sitting and reading rooms meet with favorable appreciation from the wealthy and refined visitors who for a few weeks each season make Cedar Park their home. The house is under the popular management of Mr. Harry Johnson, who has a very

capable and obliging clerk, Mr. M. Leavitt.

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Death of Henry Lee.
Died at Lyn, July 27th, 1892, Henry Lee, in the sixty-fifth year of his age.

The above cut will be recognized by almost any of our readers, as Mr. Lee was one of the most widely known and respected residents of these counties.

One of a large family, consisting of thirteen sons and one daughter, on the death of his father, Gordon Lee, he started out at 18 years of age in the battle of life with little but health, energy and integrity. Gradually he purchased piece by piece from other heirs until at his death he was owner of the homestead upon which he was born.

In addition to carrying on his farm, he, in former years, did a large business in horses and other stock, principally for the American market. The writer has heard him remark that he had been over every road and visited nearly every farm house in the county. Being of a genial, social disposition, his companionship was highly prized, and a party on a hunting or fishing excursion was not quite complete unless he was one of the number.

Being a successful farmer, he took great interest in the annual exhibition of the agricultural society, and had been a member of the board of directors almost continuously since the establishment of the fair at Unionville.

His Parting Address.

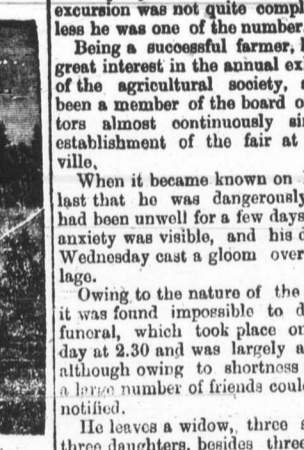
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There was a fair turnout and a number of Orangemen in regalia were sprinkled among the audience.

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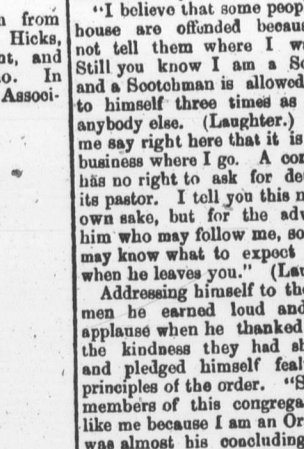
