Sanctum Suggestions.

It is now claimed by the hard and fast Liberals of Colchester that the principal reason for Mr. Hill's defeat was because he publicly announced that he would not support the government unless their measures met with his approval. It is true Mr. Hill lost the seat but retains his self respect—which is an important matter to some men.

Speaking in Montreal this week, Evangelist Dawson said: "The great mass of the people in every country are not only the laborers and tradesmen. They are the ministers, the editors, the school teachers who are miserably paid. One of the scandals of the country is the beggary way in which these professions are paid."

Wolfville cannot afford to allow its principal street to remain in the present disgraceful condition. That other towns are no better off is not a sufficient excuse for further delay. In other improvements our people have not been afraid to lead the way. The time has now arrived for systematic advance in the direction of good and up-to-date streets. Let there be no further waste of public money on the present methods. This question is a vital one; every citizen should be fully interested.

Parliament will be asked by the Lord's Day Alliance to pass two amendments to the Lord's Day Act. One, the abolishing of the requirement of official consent of the Provincial Attorney General before a prosecution is begun. The other, the securing of legal rights of workmen to one day's rest in seven, by providing that employers not only shall not require employes to work seven days a week, but shall not permit them to do so. The Lord's Day Alliance has 40,000 members.

One of our best informed farmers stated this week that never in his remembrance had there been so much grain unthreshed at this season of the year in this section as now. The crop last season was an abundant one and the quality first-class. Farmers of this vicinity are evidently realizing far more than they have latterly the importance and profit of the crop. At fifty cents per bushel, the average price during the winter, we are informed that it pays better to grow oats than potatoes.

Parents, where are your boys in the evenings? Are they around the fire-side in the home, or are they on the streets, or down town attending some performance? The answer to this question will tell you what kind of citizens they are likely to make. Parents are too often lulled to sleep. A sudden awakening takes place, and then it may be too late. No possible good can come to boys who habitually spend their evenings on the streets, and as for girls, it is even worse. Parents should see to it that children find the most pleasant place at home.

The Westmoreland county (N. B.) Temperance Alliance met at Moncton on Monday afternoon of last week to organize for the Scott Act campaign in the event of an election being held. Dr. B. C. Borden, of Sackville, presided. The Alliance passed a resolution declaring the Scott Act the best temperance legislation in existence and pledging themselves to do their best to have it sustained at the polls, maintained and enforced. The alliance decided to unite with the New Brunswick Federation. Judge Emmerson's aid to the Moncton police magistrate, by his imprisonment sentence, has done more for the Scott Act than that of any ten men in the province.

The Department of Public Health for the Province of Nova Scotia has issued a pamphlet for public distribution. The booklet consists of three papers dealing with the three requirements of health: The Air we Should Breathe; The Food we Should Eat; The Exercise we Should Take. The Health Officer in his prefatory note says that 75 per cent. of the sickness, disease, worry, expense and death is preventable, and that one out of every three or four deaths is due to disease connected with the respiratory tract. This being so our people would do well to read the pamphlet, which is not so much a scientific treatise as a popular presentation of science in relation to the Public Health.

We wonder if any effort is to be made to secure the erection of a government building in Wolfville. This is a matter which has been talked about for a long time, but so far no concerted action has been taken by our citizens. It is pretty sure that unless our people indicate to the government that they want such an expenditure made here that no progress will be made. There is no doubt concerning the need of such a building here not only for the justice of our claim upon the government for its erection. The ACADIAN has repeatedly pointed out that other towns of less importance and revenue have long enjoyed the privilege of first-class post-office and customs buildings. We notice by the estimates brought down this week that no provision is made for a building in Wolfville, and we may be pretty well assured that there will be some other people ask for it in an uncertain manner.

Scandalous Delay of Justice.

It took the supreme Court of Canada four minutes to decide that the appeal of Messrs. Roche and Carney against the trial of the petition against them was frivolous. These alleged representatives of Halifax have managed, by evasion of service, by appeals and other dilatory proceedings, to hold their seats for three sessions. They are now safe for the fourth, for though the case is ordered back for trial it cannot be tried during a session of the house. The professed members for Halifax will, therefore, sit and vote in the house as if they and their associates had been declared innocent of the charges of corrupt practice. Mr. Borden, who believes himself entitled to represent Halifax, may well demand better election laws, when men may sit four years in parliament and stave off, during that period, the trial of the question whether they have a right to be there.

Another Old Landmark Gone.

We refer to the death of Capt. Ephraim Lockhart, at the good old age of 82 years and 7 months. He had been hopelessly ill for 14 months, and on the morning of Nov. 22nd, 1907, passed away. On his father's side he was a descendant of David Lockhart, who came from Scotland with his parents, who settled in Rhode Island. At the close of the American revolution, rather than become an United States citizen, he came to Nova Scotia and settled in the eastern part of the township of Horton, where both the deceased and his father were born. On his mother's side he was a direct descendant of Samuel, Fuller, M. D., the first physician with a diploma to set foot on American soil, who landed from the Mayflower in the fall of 1620, at Plymouth, Mass. The deceased was a shipmaster of the old school, and when wooden ships were in vogue was considered one of the best in the country. He followed the sea from early youth, until the weakness of old age began, when he retired after a seafaring career of upwards of 45 years. His first command was the Gleamer, in which he crossed the Atlantic Ocean for the first time. He was in command of Brig Dumbarton, Barques I. E. Lockhart, Queen of Scots, Avoca, J. W. Holmes, Lansdowne, Avonport, and ships British American and Forest.

In 1850 he married Lucy Smith, daughter to Capt. David Smith, of Falmouth, whom he survived to years 1 month. Four children out of a family of six, survived him—Joseph S., a physician, and Benj. A., Attorney at Law, of Cambridge, Mass., and Leonard E. and Ada F. at home. He was a man given to philanthropy, having done more for the benefit of his native place than any other person. He was kind to the poor, a friend to those in distress. His funeral, which was largely attended, took place Nov. 24th, 1907. Rev. J. E. Barrett, pastor of the Methodist church, preached the memorial sermon, taking for his text "If a man dies, shall he live again?"—Hants Journal.

Canadians Ahead.

Chicago, Dec. 2.—The Ontario Agricultural College and the boys who compose the team for live stock judging competition are coming in for a deal of praise, owing to this being the decisive trial for the holding of the cup by the O. A. C., they having won the two previous years.

Against them were brilliant representatives of the Agricultural Colleges of Iowa, Indiana, South Dakota, Kansas, Texas, Ohio and Missouri. The trophy was given by the Union Stock Yards and is valued at \$500. The judging had to deal with Percherons, German Coach and Shire horses; Shropshire, Cotswold and Rambouillet sheep, Hampshire, Berkshire and Yorkshire sows; Shorthorn, Aberdeen Angus and fat grade cattle. Each student was allowed eighteen (18) minutes to judge each class. The team from Guelph was composed of Messrs. E. S. Archibald, Truro, N. S.; R. H. Hodson, son of ex-Commissioner Hodson, Myrtle, Ontario; D. A. Mackenzie, Bruce County; L. A. Bowles, Meaford; and R. T. Arkell, Wellington County. These are all fourth year men at the College and secured general efficiency that enabled the cup to come "for keeps" to Ontario. Wolfville people will be particularly interested in the above as Mr. Edgar S. Archibald of this town, is a member of the successful team.

Political Meeting in College Hall.

SIX STUMP SPEECHES ON CANADIAN AFFAIRS DELIVERED SATURDAY NIGHT.

A rousing political rally was held by Acadia students in College Hall last Saturday evening.

Three speakers appeared for each side. The Conservatives were represented by W. B. Foster, of Torbrook; George F. Keirstead, of St. John; and L. V. Margeson, of Berwick; and the Liberals by G. V. White, of Wolfville; F. C. Atkinson, of West Brook; and L. N. Seaman, of Wolfville.

That the interest in the meeting was very great was shown by the attendance and by the loud and persistent cheering.

When the speakers took the platform they were greeted by a storm of applause. The mention of John Stanfield's name was the signal for renewed and continued cheering.

Mr. Margeson was the first speaker. In a pleasing speech he spoke of the record of the Conservative party, claiming that the people of Canada owed to it a debt of gratitude. He said that the party had never violated a pledge nor broken a promise.

Mr. White opened the debate for the Liberals, claiming that graft was not a product of the government, but of the people. He ridiculed R. L. Borden's purity cry, and said that one party was as corrupt as the other.

He was followed by W. B. Foster, who unsparringly condemned the government for its eleven years of maladministration, and charged that the Liberals had broken into kindling wood every plank of their platform. Considerable attention was paid to the Halifax round-house scandal, the Moncton land deal, the Arctic expedition and other instances of graft.

Mr. Atkinson, in a clever speech, made a brave but intellectual attempt to refute the charges of malfeasance and corruption made against his party.

He spoke of Puley's charges, and said that R. L. Borden was afraid to have the Conservative campaign fund of 1904 investigated.

George F. Keirstead followed. In a fluent and forceful speech he made a splendid presentation of Borden's Halifax platform.

Mr. Seaman said the Observative talk was summoned up in the one word 'scandal.' He claimed that the party had no platform to offer the people, and was unworthy of the public confidence.

The debate was closed for the Liberals by Mr. White. He claimed that the Conservatives were muck-rakers, and ended by paying a fine tribute to his leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Mr. Foster summed up the matter for the Conservatives. He reiterated his charges against the government and said that as long as the Liberals supply the muck the Conservatives would supply the rakes and rakers.
