



THE INFORMATION that the civic authorities are moving in

THE INFORMATION that the civic authorities are moving in the matter of securing more efficient street lighting for the town will be regarded by citizens generally as good news. Tenders have been invited, so we are informed, for the supply of the materials required and the installation of a modern system. We have been spending a considerable amount yearly for the lighting of our public streets, but have not received adequate service to repay for the amount invested. This is due, so it is stated, to the fact that the whole system is antiquated and badly arranged.

With the new arrangement it is thought the lighting may be very considerably improved without great additional cost, and even if more money is required to be expended the additional outlay would be well justified, as well lighted streets add very much to the comfort of citizens and the reputation of the town generally. It is to be devoutly hoped that the work may be speedily proceeded with so that we may have the advantage of the improved service during the season of short days and dark nights.

In this connection we would recommend to the consideration are

In this connection we would recommend to the consideration of the town government the making of an agreement with business places on Main street to keep their window-lights on every evening during the week instead of only two nights as at present. The same policy might be pursued with advantage in the matter of verandah lights on the residential streets, which now present a deso-



TELLS OF PROGRESS IN THIS PROVINCE

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—In summarizing the activities of the province for the last season, F. G. J. Comeau, general freight and passenger agent, Dominion Atlantic Railway, said here today that more attention than ever before has been given to the apple growing industry of Nova Scotia and that the tourist traffic increased more than 20 per cent. over the volume of last year. Apples are the chief product of the country and given a British preferential tariff, Nova Scotia may be looked upon as the logical place for Britain to buy her apples.

the logical place for Britain to buy her apples.

"As a matter of fact," Mr. Comeau said, "Several British apple buyers are acquiring large orchards in Nova Scotia and large tracts of land which they intend to put under fruit.

With the apple growing industry increasing from two to three hundred per cent. every decaie, only twenty per cent. of available orchard land is yet under crop.

In respect of the tourist traffic Mr. Comeau stated that bureau estimates place the number of visitors to the province at more than 1,000,000, this representing in wealth left in Nova Scotia a sum approximately \$7,500,000.

CANADIAN APPLES IN BIG DEMAND

Commissioner Tolmie Says Wembley Has Revolutionized the Trade.

LONDON, Nov. 13—Wembley has revolutionized the British-Canadian appet trade according to A. W. Tolmie, Commissioner General of the Canadian Pavilion.

"Thousands of pounds worth of apple orders have been booked by British firms, to say nothing of the German in softman is still unshaken.

HABITANT

By November the apples will all have been picked in most places in Canada and got safely under cover. The trees are now dormant for winter. Before leaving the orchard it is important to see that the young trees, especially, are protected from the depredations of mice, and, if possible, from rabbits. Protection is given either by wrapping the trees with, building paper or encircling them with a wire mesh, and partial protection, later, by tramping the snow about the trunks.

While pruning in November is not recommended as the most economical or best time, it can be sone then without any serious harm if one is not able to do it in the early spring.

The removal of all broken, or dead limbs or any rubbish from the orchard before winder is desirable.

The vegetable garden should be cleared of all old tops or unused vegetables, which might carry over insects or disease, and, if it is most convenient to apply a heavy coat of rotted manure now, it should be done with the object of digging or ploughing it under as soon as the ground is fit to work in the spring.

In the flower garden, roses will, in most places, need some protection. Covering the plants with earth just before winter sets in is one of the most satisfactory practices, giving a broad base to the mound of soil, so that the roots will have some additional protection. A few evergreen boughs thrown over the mound of soil will help hold the snow and give further protection. Climbing roses are best protected by covering with a box, which is filled with dry leaves and given a water-proof cover.

A little care taken in November will often save many, valuable trees and smaller plants, and ensure better results the following year.

Unless it is very deep, or the material is actually burnt, a scorch mark can be removed from white fabric by the following treatment: Mix two ounces of Fuller's earth with half a pint of vinegar, add two onions which have been finely chopped, and boil all together for about ten minutes or unfil the mixture has taken on the form of a thick paste. PIETERMARITZBURG, Sept. 24.

The Governor General and High Commander of South Africa, the Earl of Athlone, on Wecdnesday afternoon, Sept. 17. unveiled in King's Park, Bloemfontein, the handsome monument erected to the memory of the gallant Canadians who fell in the South African war at the commencement of the present century. Many causes—chief of which was the World War—contributed to the protracted delay in the erection of the memorial. The monument is a noble column of Canadian grey granite, containing the names of places where engagements were fought by the men from the Dominion of Canada, and it is supported by a rectangular base embellished with representations of the maple leaf, and containing the names of the men and their regiments.



if he left an opening. There were those who would like to pick his bones. He was aware of this attitule. It burgeon-ed forth in many aspects of his affairs. If he had looted the Norquay Trust within the law and let the plucked victims pick themselves bewildered out of the ruin, while he sat back with his share of the plunder and the great Norquay estate still firm in his grasp, these contemporaries of his would have esteemed him as a clever man, almost a great man certainly a man with a genius for affairs. A man of affairs; a man who could safely and expeditiously get possession of large sums of money. What was the lifterence?

He might have been execrated by some who lost their money. The losers, they said cynically, always squeal. But if he had shrupged his shoulders and stood aside, his own class would have backed him to a man. They would have talked round his standard. They would have upheld him in the press, socially, by every means within their power. Their admiration would have been tincured with envy. They would have understood so clearly that genuine greatness was involved in making such a coupand getting clear when the crash came. His own people,—no, by God, the Walls and Dcanes and Richstons were not his kind of people, not one of the whole pushing caravan, the petty tradesmen swollen to greatness with one generation of a rich country's development, grown greater with exceptional profits derived from a war which had been fought for them but not by them. They were Grove's kind of people. And Grove had been a— a— Well, he didn't like to ponder on Grove. There was no encouragement in
