VALUABLE **ANGLING LEASES** FOR SALE SOON

The sale of angling leases in sal mon and trout waters, will be held on the 22nd inst at the Crown Land Of fice. The leases on the Restigouche River will be for a term of five years and those on the other waters of the Province for ten years.

Valuable Leases

. Eleven salmon leases on the Rest gouche River for five years were sold at the last sale. These were the most valuable of all. The highest price bid was \$3,500 for the fifth stretch by the Rsstigouche Salmon Club an organization of American millionaires with a magnificent clubhouse on the Restigouche. Two other leases on the same stream brought \$3,000 each. James B., Taylor with the second stretch at that rental and Rogers with the ninth stretch at a like amount held the most valuable privately owned angling privilege in the province.



Such a method of disposal is practicable only in thos-cases v.c.e the ties can be delivered at a public crossing, or other point where they can be obtained safely by the users, and where the cost of by the users, and where the cost of by the users, and where the cost of so delivering them is not greater-than the nominal prices obtainable "The Company cannot sanctio" the public going promiseuously over tracks and through yards to gathe-up old ties. To do so would be prac-tically letting down the bors against tresnassing on the tracks. an evi which has been the cause of about half of all the fatal accidents of railroads in the United States. "Efforts have been mids to inter-est dealers in firewood in buying the old ties, but not thus far with much success. The causes appear to be that the old ties are often dirty that they contain more or less stone

that the old ties are often dirty that they contain more or less stone grit and slag wedged in the cracks which might injure the saws used i cutting them; that in many case they are nartly decrared; that they are dried out, and that their fibre-is more or less crushed so that they burn out too quickly.
