THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

About the time when Goderich town council obtained the charter to build a railroad connecting Huron's county town with the C.P.R. at Wingham, a charter was also obtained for a road extending from Simcoe to Port Rowan. That was in or about the month of June, 1887. The result of the efforts made at Simco and Goderich are worth comparing.

The distance from Goderich to Wingham by the proposed route was estimated to be about twenty-six miles. The length of the Simcoe and Port Rowan road was calculated at twenty-five miles. In Goderich, after some \$300 had been

expended in securing the charter, the provisional directors took no further action, and the charter was allowed to lapse on the 20th of June, of the present year.

TORONTO, Aug. 24. — Coroner Jo • 1 ad his jury, after four or five length ons, concluded the enquiry into the death of plasterer James Hicks at the Police Court
