**Botha's Policy a New National Party.**

Pretoria, June 14.—Premier Botha in declaring his policy, said there was no other way possible than to form a government from the governments already existing. Other steps would have been most fatal to South Africa. Investigations clearly proved that the majority did not wish for a coalition ministry. The time had come for starting with a clean sheet. He hoped the old party organizations, especially his own, would be dissolved and amalgamated into a great party with broad, wide principles, named the South African National Party.

**Work for Government.**

He read a manifesto on various questions confronting the Government. Foremost among these was the task of welding the different races into one great people, and apply sympathetic treatment to natives and colored persons. It should also aim at the encouragement of the white population and prevention of Asiatic immigration. A broad educational policy, consideration of the needs of the workers, their duty to the Empire in regard to defence, the development of industries, mining, land settlement, the encouragement of capital and the opening up of foreign markets.

**Myrick's Idea.**

Editor Evening Telegram:

Dear Sir,—Now that our twelve aspirants for Municipal honours are lined up and ready for the fray, I hope that the best six, may be the chosen six.

In looking over the several addresses and noting the improvements outlined by the candidates as they came into the field, there was one idea that struck me very forcibly, that is to have all night soil carried to the sea through the main sewer, instead of having it, as at present, spread over lands adjoining our country roads, endangering the public health, by making those walks, which should be rich with the flower-scented breeze; nauseous with the odours of filth.

Our sewerage system was inaugurated at a great cost to the city, and not to avail of the use for which it was intended seems to me a strange piece of business. Mr. M. W. Myrick suggests that a house be built over or near the starting point of the great northern sewer, and connected with it, where the contents of the night carts be dumped, and by proper flushing carried to the sea. This idea should recommend itself to the incoming Council, and to the advocates of the A. P. C.

In connection with this I would like to tell a sanitary man's story: "One stormy night last winter as the night cars were going by the King's Bridge, they got stuck in the snow banks there, and the men in charge were on the road from one o'clock till six, in the drift and frost, beating a path for the horses to a field a mile and a half distant. Horses and men were half perished as a result." Another condition of things could be remedied by this "All the night soil to the sea" system, is the lateness of the sanitary forces hours, especially on Sunday mornings. I think the city and its sanitary staff as well would hail with pleasure the adoption of the above idea.

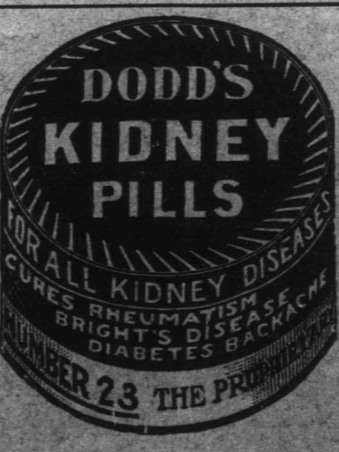
### Fishery News.

Friends and Fellow-Citizens,—I wish through the columns of this paper to publicly offer you my sincere thanks for the kind assurance of your support, and the splendid reception with which you honoured me throughout the campaign. I might not be able, in the short time now at my disposal, to personally interview every elector; any of you upon whom I have not, or may not be able to call, will please not look upon my failure to do so as a neglect on my part. 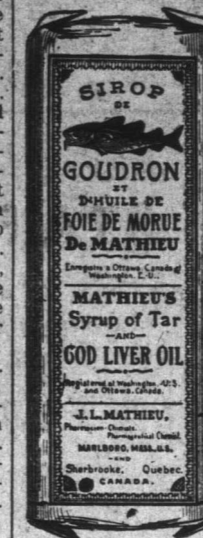

- 2nd—The installation of an incinerator or crematory in the new stables for the disposal of night soil and garbage.
- 3rd—Light, Water and Sewerage extension to all streets now without those conveniences.
- 4th—Substitution of concrete or other suitable and sanitary drains, for the old germ-laden cobble stone ones.
- 5th—Closer and more frequent attention to Gullies and Catch-pits.
- 6th—Economic expenditure of the public monies.
- 7th—Re-arrangement of taxation upon a simple and more equitable basis.
- 8th—A more satisfactory method of Sprinkling streets and Flushing Trains.
- 9th—Dredging the Public Coves.
- 10th—Conduct the business of the Council on strictly commercial lines.
- 11th—To make any other improvements necessary to the good health and comfort of the citizens which might be suggested from time to time, consistent with the means at the Council's disposal, keeping in view the fact that the burden of taxation MUST NOT BE INCREASED.
- 12th—Equal rights for all; special favours to none.

### Methodist Conference.

TEMPERANCE ADDRESS.  
On Thursday evening, 7.45, Rev. Edwin Moore and Rev. Mr. Aiken ascended the rostrum of Carbonar Church to deliver speeches in the interests of Temperance and Moral Reform.  
Rev. Mr. Moore in his opening remarks declared that because the liquor question had been so long before the public it was time to have the verdict from the public. The traffic had no right to be licensed, and no amount of argument to the contrary carried any conviction in the face of facts and circumstances, and the statement of this speaker was this viz., that the State should not receive revenue at the expense of the public good. The speaker outlined the various theories set forth by the defenders of the traffic, and in his confutation gave some concrete illustrations of the fallacies in the argument. His last appeal was to the intelligence of the people, and closed by saying that it was high time that the general conscience be appealed to and that to a man the country should rise, while the death knell of temperance tyranny was being sounded.  
Rev. Mr. Aiken followed and on rising declared his admiration for the men who lived by the sea shore. During his remarks he said:—(1) That a great wave of temperance was being produced; (2) That decent people would encourage intemperance. Leading men as an example of this were quoted:—President Taft, of the U. S. A. became a total abstainer on his election to the Presidential honor; and so Emperor William, Rudyard Kipling, Admiral Boscawen, and General Grant are concrete illustrations of this position. The Nations would encourage intemperance; the U. S. A. were shutting up the saloons at the rate of 40 per day. We must face the crisis, said the speaker, from the shadow of Calvary. The cross stands for that which is outwardly repugnant but inwardly glorious. The salute stands for that which is outwardly glorious but inwardly repugnant. There is an awful charge to lay at the door of the saloon; the rum-seller gets from life exactly what he is putting into it, and to be contented ought to contribute of his own self and happiness to the continuity of the bar-room. Genius, cried the man from the pulpit, has again and again been dragged from its loftiness to the mire and power to degradation and contempt. The bar-room reduces the legitimate business of a place in the city as well as in the country, and the country can't be dry until the city is dry, and what was more the city was saved by the country. In closing, after speaking about how the saloon dominates the city, Mr. Aiken

### Municipal Matters.

MR. LARACY WRITES.

Editor Evening Telegram:—Dear Sir,—In asking the ratepayers of the city to support my candidature on Monday next I do so with the belief that a better state of municipal government than at present exists can be maintained, and that better results can be got out of the taxes we are now obliged to pay.

During my visits to different portions of the city within the past few weeks I have heard general complaints on matters which have been brought to my notice, and particularly on the subject of the necessity for more lights in certain localities and for cleaner streets and surface drains within certain areas. I see no reason why both these questions cannot be satisfactorily adjusted without anything more than a more economic supervision of the amounts already spent in this direction.

The necessity of public play grounds is also evident to all. At present the children of the working-man, who have not the luxury of private grounds, cannot participate in healthful games within the city limits without being subject to the risk of being brought before the Magistrate. At very little cost three such playgrounds could be created in different sections of the city, and the good effects of such a policy would be soon perceived in the good health of our younger generation.

A revision of the present system of taxation is also absolutely necessary, so that the burden of the city's expenditure may be properly borne.

An extension of the water service so as to furnish a complete system of water pipes all over the city should be taken up at once, and in certain localities where the residents are at present obliged to carry water for the length of the street, prompt attention is particularly required.

My opinions on the subject of the extension of our sewerage have already been intimated, and my earnest desire is directed to bringing this improvement into effect having particular regard to the financial position of our industrial classes.

These, Mr. Editor, are a few of the points which I feel I can, if given the opportunity, do my fellow citizens some service and I only respectfully ask them to give me a trial.

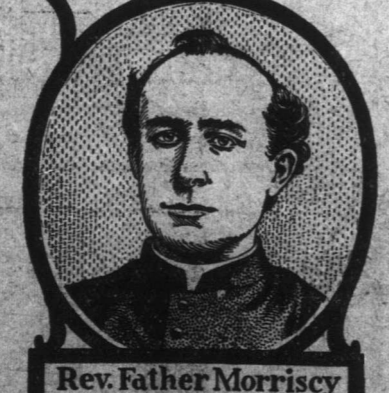

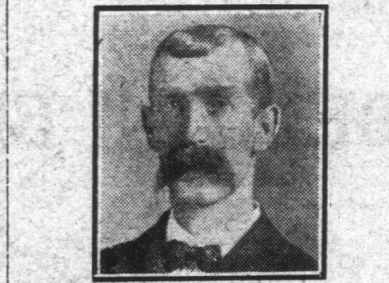
