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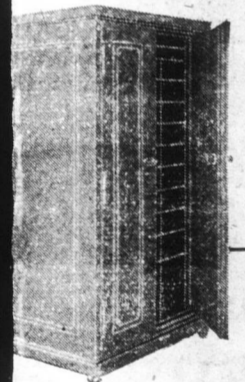

Household Notes.

It is best always to add a pinch of
salt to boiled milk.
The old-fashioned natural pongee
should be ironed rough dry. Sprink-
ling is very apt to spot it.
White marks on a polished table
caused by hot dishes or water may be
removed by rubbing camphorated oil
well into the wood.
Hang skirts and dresses on the
clothes on the straight of the goods
when drying, and you won't have an
uneven skirt when it is laundered.
Make covers for radiators of crash
or denim, and save both walls and
curtains from the dust that is blown
into them by the ascending heat
waves.
Rinse with cold water the utensil
in which you boil milk before putting
the milk in it, and there will be no
sticking or scorching in the bottom
of the pan.
Utile blankets that have lost their
fresh look by covering them with a
dainty silkline or saten for use be-
fore it is cold enough for the thicker
cotton or down puff.
When heating milk care should be

taken not to place it over the hottest
part of the stove. Set it to one side
so it will heat slowly and come to
the boiling point gradually.
The odor of fresh paint may be re-
moved from a room by simply stand-
ing a pail of water in an inconspic-
uous place. The water should be re-
newed every three or four hours.
A little powderedorris root placed
in the water in which fine linens and
lingerie are boiled after washing will
give them a deliciously faint odor of
violets after they are ironed.
New windows that stick may be
made to move readily by applying par-
affin to the groove in which the
windows slide. If stuck with paint,
run a case knife all around the edges
first.
A handful of coarse salt and a cupful
of vinegar shaken up well in a
cloudy decanter will clean it like mag-
ic. Rinse well with very hot water
several times to remove all taste of
salt.
If you wish to iron a starched gar-
ment and have not much time to wait,
try this scheme. Sprinkle, roll in a
damp cloth or paper and place in a
cool oven for about five minutes to
steam. It will then iron nicely.
An easy way to remove the tops
from pineapples. Hold the "pine"
with the left hand, and with the
right give the top a twist, as though
you were wringing its neck. Out
comes the top and part of the core.
Boiled potatoes make an excellent
substitute for soap if your hands have
become blackened with contact with
pots and pans. Take a little of the
potato and rub well into the skin,
then rinse it off with warm water.
A highly-polished table may be used
as a card-table without marking it.
Cut a piece of felt larger than the
table and run a casing around the
outer edge with an elastic in it. This
can be easily put on and will save
many a finger-mark.
Fill tub half full of boiling water,
then pour in half a can of concen-
trated lye and with an old broom
scrub sides and bottom well. Rinse
with clear water and wipe with soft
cloth. This will remove all spots and
make the tub look new.
For removing the dark stain which
is frequently seen in vinegar cruets,
make a suds of hot water and white
soap and put into the cruet about a

half teaspoonful of fine shot. Shake
the shot around and the discoloration
will entirely disappear.
When ironing a skirt or blouse hav-
ing a row of buttons, fold a turkish
towel over the buttonholes and lay
the skirt or blouse down on it.
Iron on the wrong side, and it will be
smoothly finished, the buttons sinking
into the soft folds of the towel.
When washing a striped bed-spread
never put it through the wringer after
the last rinsing water. Hang it on
the line dripping. It will dry with-
out a crease or wrinkle, will not re-
quire ironing, and the fringe will be
as straight and fluffy as when new.
An easy and sure way to keep rib-
bons fresh and smooth is to roll them
on a glass bottle when not being
worn. The bottle should be perfectly
smooth and round. Several sets of
ribbons can be wound on one bottle
and will wear doubly as long as
those that are folded or crumpled in-
to dresser drawers.

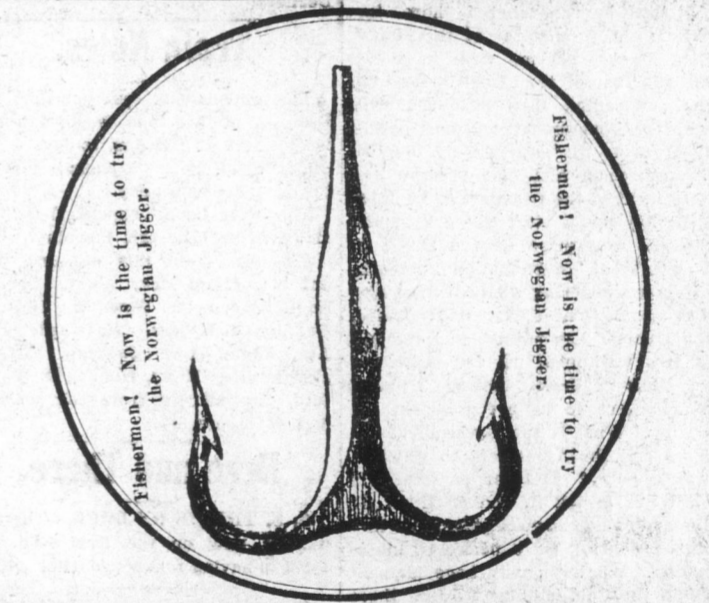

That Rush for Cold Storage.

It will be remembered how impatient the promoters of the latest Cold Storage scheme were to obtain the sanction of the Legislature for the proposition they had concluded with the Government, and how one of them wrote to "Dear Friend Morris" to urge upon him the prompt endorsement of the Legislature, in order that they might start to work on the gigantic enterprise they intended to undertake in Newfoundland. People are now wondering what all the hurry was about. Death of Mr. McNeily, K.C.



Close upon the death of his only senior in the roll of King's Counsel comes the announcement of the death of Mr. Alexander J. W. McNeily, K.C., who passed away at the General Hospital at 5:30 this morning. During the summer Mr. McNeily's health began to fail and he took a trip to Canada, accompanied by his son, Mr. J. A. W. McNeily, in the hope that the change might benefit him and that he might obtain expert advice. On the trip he visited Montreal, Toronto and Halifax. At Montreal he had the pleasure of meeting his son James who is engaged surveying for the Quebec Land Office. On his way back to Halifax he suffered from hemorrhage and at Halifax entered the hospital there until he could be brought here by the s.s. Stephano. The sea trip apparently braced him up, and his wondrously never to leave him. In his time he has played a large part in the social, political and legal life of the country. Mr. McNeily was born at Armagh, Ireland, on August 3rd, 1845, and was a few months younger than the late Sir James Winter. He was brought to Newfoundland when he was four years old, and though not a Newfoundland resident for sixty-two years, Mr. McNeily was educated at the General Protestant Academy in this city, and at Queen's College, Belfast. He graduated in Arts at what is now known as the Royal University, Ireland, and returned to St. John's to study law under the late Sir Hugh W. Hoyles. He was admitted to the bar in 1870, and for over forty years has been engaged in law work. In 1877 he took into partnership with him his younger brother and formed the law firm of McNeily & McNeily, which was maintained until the death of his brother. When his son became a legal practitioner, the firm's name was resumed and his son is now the sole survivor of the firm. In 1880 he took silk, and was called to the Inner Bar. Not only was Mr. McNeily, K.C., eminent at the bar, but he worked his way to the front in several other phases of public life. In 1873 he was elected to the House of Assembly as a member for Bonnavista District, and continued to represent it until he was elected for Twillingate and Fogo in 1879. In that year he became Speaker of the House, but he was defeated in 1892, and remained out of the House for three years, when he was returned for the district of Bay de Verde and was appointed Solicitor General. During the next year he resigned this high office and was elected a second time Speaker of the House, and in 1899 became Chief Clerk of the Supreme Court and Registrar of Deeds. This office he held for many years, after which he resumed practice as a lawyer. He has also had much to do with society life. In his early life he was a prominent member of the Loyal Orange Association. He was also prominent in Masonic circles, and a Past Master of St. John's Lodge, No. 579, R.E., F. & A. M. One of the most distinguished duties he was called upon to undertake was on the occasion of the Memorial Service to the late King Edward, when Past Master McNeily delivered a touching and eloquent funeral oration on one who had occupied the most elevated office in English Masonry. Not only was Mr. McNeily a graceful speaker, but he was a classic writer, with an ear for harmony and sonorous sound and apt in choice of words. Many of his musical critiques were a pleasure to those who read them. He took a delight in nature, books and general culture. He was as much at home on the barrens with his gun and dogs, or by the side of a stream or lake with his rod, as among his books, and he was always ready to assist in the promotion of societies which had such objects in view, as witness his connection with the Rifle Association, the Game Protection Association, the Inland Fishery Board, the Naturalists' Society, the Historical Society, and the Methodist College. He was also a most pleasing and entertaining conversationalist, and in his love of sport, literature and chat may be regarded as the Isaac Walton of Newfoundland. He married Jessie, a daughter of Hon. James Rogerson, who predeceased him some years ago, and whose demise was a severe blow to him. He leaves three sons—Mr. J. A. W., who is a barrister in the city, and James and Nicholas, who are in Quebec. To them the Evening Telegram extends sympathy.

Lord's Day Alliance.

Over 500 people attended the meeting of the Lord's Day Alliance in the British Hall Sunday night. His Lordship Bishop Jones occupied the chair and delivered an encouraging address on the subject of the Lord's Day. The other speakers were Rev. J. S. Sutherland and Mr. A. Mews, both of whom delivered convincing arguments showing why the Lord's Day should be strictly observed. Appropriate hymns were rendered, the C.M.B.C. band giving the music under Rev. J. Bell's direction. At the close votes of thanks were accorded the speakers and the band.

K. of C. Banquet.

The Knights of Columbus on Saturday night tendered their visiting brethren, Messrs. McNeven and Dunne, to a banquet at Donovan's Topsail Road. Upwards of 170 Knights were present. After the banquet the gathering was addressed by Messrs. McNeven and Dunne. Their speeches were of a very high order especially Mr. Dunne's. The singing of the National Anthem brought this very interesting event to a close, and at 12 o'clock they arrived in the city by special train.

Admiral Schley Dropped Dead

New York, Oct. 3.—Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley dropped dead yesterday near the corner of Forty-fourth street and Fifth avenue, while on his way down town. The Admiral died before medical aid could reach him. Admiral Schley had been out of town over Sunday and on his return here had gone to the New York Yacht Club on West Forty-fourth street. After a short stay at the club Admiral Schley left the clubhouse and started to walk along Forty-fourth street towards Fifth avenue when he was suddenly taken ill. A hurry call was sent for physicians and an ambulance, but before aid could reach him the naval officer was dead.

As Admiral Schley walked along the street a chauffeur of a taxicab, who stood alongside the curb, bowed to the Admiral and then turned to a fellow chauffeur and remarked how well Admiral Schley was looking. Near the Berkeley Theatre Admiral Schley started across the street, and as he stepped up the curb passers by noticed that he staggered and fell in a heap. Several persons rushed to his aid and traffic policemen sent in a hurry call for physicians and an ambulance to Flower Hospital. A large crowd quickly gathered and the police had difficulty in keeping them in check. When the ambulance arrived the physicians said that Admiral Schley was dead. The dead body was placed in the ambulance and driven away. Admiral Schley died shortly before one o'clock.

Dr. Miller of Flower Hospital, after a superficial examination of Admiral Schley, said that the naval officer's death came from a stroke of apoplexy. The body of the Admiral was taken to the East Fifty-first street police station, where it was taken in charge by Admiral Schley's son. Later the body will be removed to the home of Dr. Schley. Dr. Schley was greatly shocked over the death of his father, and said that he could not tell where or where the funeral will take place.

It is now reasonably certain that within four years Ireland will have her own Parliament. A great many Englishmen are asking what she is likely to do with it. It is natural that they should feel that anxiety, and it is equally natural that an Irishman should wish to relieve it.

The sentiment of 'Ireland a Nation' is not a sedition one. The object is not that of a small Power supplied with gun-boats and a miniature army. It is not armaments that make a nation; it is tradition, loyalty to old and true ideals of spiritual freedom, every good thing that is comprehended in that much abused word, 'riotism.'

And yet there are some misguided people left in England who imagine or pretend to—that a self-governing Ireland would be a militant Ireland, ardently anticipating the arrival of the German Fleet in Queenstown harbor. Strange as it may appear, the Irish have no passionate love for Germany.

There is, too, the question for Ireland of raising an army and navy out of Irish revenue. It really can't be done. The money will not be forthcoming. Englishmen who have seen the terrible Irish-German coalition vision may get about their usual cautious undismayed.

Ireland's request for Home Rule is so moderate and reasonable that it cannot too often be stated. It is, briefly, that the people of Ireland shall have control of their own affairs—their own purely Irish affairs—leaving to England all that is England's—Army, Navy, Foreign Relations, Imperial Taxation, Customs, etc. The demand is not a revolutionary one.

Why does Ireland desire a national Parliament with an Executive responsible to it? I have mentioned the question of nationhood in its ideal aspect. But when the practical aspect of England's government of Ireland is referred to it is only necessary to recall the words of Lord Rosebery, the years when he was considered a serious politician. 'In Ireland (as the noble lord in those remote days) we have the worst and most inefficient government in the whole world.'

Under Home Rule economy will be practised. The Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland gets a yearly salary of £2,000 for Dublin Castle festivities. The President of the United States is half that sum as head of the great republic the world has ever seen.

The cost of the civil government of Ireland is double what it is in England, and three times what it is in Scotland. In the last fifty years taxation per head of the population in Ireland has doubled, while the taxation per head of the population in Scotland has been diminished by one-half.

In the last sixty-five years Ireland's population has fallen from over eight millions to four and a half million. In the last twenty-five years the population has fallen by one million. What the Irish Want.

(L. J. McQ., in the "Eye-Witness," London.)

It is now reasonably certain that within four years Ireland will have her own Parliament. A great many Englishmen are asking what she is likely to do with it. It is natural that they should feel that anxiety, and it is equally natural that an Irishman should wish to relieve it. The sentiment of 'Ireland a Nation' is not a trifling one. The objective is not that of a small Power supplied with gun-boats and a miniature army. It is not armaments that makes a nation; it is tradition, loyalty to old and true ideals of spiritual freedom; every good thing that is comprehended in that much abused word, patriotism.

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Under Home Rule economy will be practised. The Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland gets a yearly salary of £20,000 for Dublin Castle festivities. The President of the United States gets half that sum as head of the greatest republic the world has ever seen. The cost of the civil government of Ireland is double what it is in England, and three times what it is in Scotland. In the last fifty years taxation per head of the population in Ireland has doubled, while the taxation per head of the population in Scotland has been diminished by one-half.

In the last sixty-five years Ireland's population has fallen from over eight millions to four and a half millions. In the last twenty-five years her population has fallen by one million. Those sixty-five years have been years of prosperity for the rest of Europe. During all that period Ireland has had no effective voice in the management of her own affairs. The English Government of Ireland in our own time cannot be attributed to mal-

ice or cruelty, but purely ignorance. There are sixty-seven Boards, Departments and Offices in Ireland. Most of these Boards are responsible to nobody except small Committees of privileged and highly-salaried persons. A score of them are supposed to be under the control of the Chief Secretary. But has Mr. Birrell time to guide the operations of each of these Boards day and daily? Why, Sir Boyle Roche himself could not have coped with them. All these Boards are worked by permanent officials. A permanent official is a man you can never get rid of and who will never give any account of himself. It is as true of England as it is of Ireland that whatever Government is in power, Tory or Liberal, the Conservative Permanent Official is always in power.

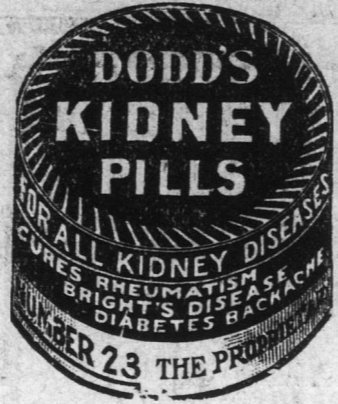
The industries of the country are, for the most part, allowed to sink or swim. There is plenty of money for useless officials, while there is little or none for the teachers of the country, for industrial works, for railway extension, arterial drainage, afforestation, etc. A local Parliament will look to these things.

We hear a great deal about the British Treasury and British grants to Ireland. What is the actual fact? We contribute more than we get back every year. You hear of free grants for Ireland for various purposes. Every penny of money granted, as it is called, for such purposes, which Englishmen talk of as British money, is paid for by Ireland herself. Naturally the people who benefit by the money, who have the uncontrolled expenditure of it, and who have no responsibility to any one for this expenditure, have no interest in economy. They will not decrease their fat livelihoods out of any consideration for the good of the country. If Ireland were self-governed she could easily be governed as cheaply as Belgium or any of the small nations of Europe.

Another matter to which an Irish Legislature, will undoubtedly turn its attention is the administration of Justice.

English Justice is suspect in Ireland, and justly so, seeing that her most powerful Judge obtained his position by reason of his facilities for packing juries who would bring home a conviction whenever a conviction was wanted. The late Lord Ashbourne said that it was common at Assizes in Ireland, as he had seen it himself, to have 50, 80, 90 and 100 persons commanded to 'stand by' in order to get a jury that could be 'relied on.' Would such a thing be tolerated in England for a day?

I will recall a remarkable instance of an Irishman's fear of English Justice in Ireland. It is the notorious case of Sergeant Sheridan. In that case a number of respectable young men were arrested on the hideous and abominable charge of cattle-maiming, one of the basest of crimes, and one especially abhorrent to an agricultural population such as exists in Ireland. These young fellows were tried for the offence and convicted and sentenced to long terms of imprisonment for a crime committed—by whom? Why, by the zealous Sergeant Sheridan himself. A pitiful feature of this travesty of justice was that one of



these young fellows was induced by his solicitor and counsel to plead guilty as this might mean a lighter sentence. He was so distrustful of the course of justice that he branded himself with the name of cattle-maimer rather than depend upon execution in a trial in which the sole object of the Crown was to obtain a verdict. All these young men (save one who died in prison) were afterwards released on the discovery that Sergeant Sheridan had maimed the cattle himself. In the case of the sergeant the wind was very greatly tempered to the shorn lamb. He was never punished and he was assisted with public money to leave the country. Such injustices will prevail in Ireland until the Judges cease to be counsels for the prosecution where Nationalist defendants are concerned.

Dear Sir,—Kindly allow me a small space in your widely read paper to answer some of many enquiries made of me relating to the "New Drawing Course" now being taken up so largely by our teachers.

First of all, let me state that all the necessary materials required are very inexpensive and can be obtained at any bookstore in St. John's. It will not be possible to have an exhibition of school drawings before Christmas, but I hope to announce later on that one will be held in the Capital about next Easter. Let every teacher in every school in every town, make up his or her mind to have some good drawings ready by that time. The children are eager, I know. Don't delay preparation until Christmas. Begin now.

I believe a very generous prize list may be expected. Some teachers are a little in doubt as to what work to take up this year. I would strongly advise that every teacher begin this October on the "Plan of a year's work," which most teachers now have. If any teacher has not been able to start the New Drawing Course so far, let him or her begin at once. Start your Kindergarten class, and then begin your Primary classes, etc., with Standard I. Don't wait for best materials, use states and pencils until better materials come. Make a beginning now.

To those teachers who started the work last year I would simply say repeat the two courses again in your schools. The children will be all the better grounded in the course by doing so. They will make all the more rapid progress in the three higher standards next year. The teachers might, for a little change, substitute a few new models for some taken last year. But be careful to give easy models.

Rally Day Service.

He returned thanks to the Almighty in the opening prayer for the progress of the Sunday School work and particularly for the life of Robert Raikes, the founder. An interesting feature of last evening's service was the roll call and the gaining of a prize to the person who brought in the greatest number of scholars. Miss Bessie Cummings, the winner, was presented with a Bible and Hymn Book. Miss Rogers address on "Why Robert Raikes started a Sunday School," was very beautiful and furnished food for much reflection. Mr. Soper spoke on "The Man and His Work," meaning Robert Raikes, whose work gripped him and would not let him rest till put into practice. The boys and girls of to-day would do well to reflect on his life and work.

Bad Season for French Fishermen.

Fifteen Vessels and 58 Men From the Miquelon Fleet Were Lost.

St. Pierre, Miq., Oct. 2.—This has been a season of ill fortune with the fishermen of Miquelon and those who came from France to make St. Pierre headquarters for Grand Bank fisheries. Fifteen vessels, three of them former Gloucester craft, the value of which runs into hundreds of thousands of dollars, have been lost with full or partial cargoes, and 58 fishermen have been drowned.

Despite the large number of vessels of the fleet which have escaped without accident, the season has been far from a successful one, though fish is nearly one-third higher than last year. The catch has averaged 40 per cent. less than that of last year.

The native fleet and that from France suffered about equally in the vessels which met with accidents. Reflections were cast upon the seaworthiness and longevity of Massachusetts-built craft by the fact that two of the three former Gloucestermen lost sank following leaks. The Victor Helene, which was built at Essex, Mass., in 1883, as the Stranger, sank on the Grand Banks, April 8, as the result of a leak. She was schooner Ville de Bordeaux, formerly the Masconomo, which was built at Essex in 1888, went down similarly June 12. The Valkyrie IV, formerly the Mabel R. Bennett, built at Gloucester in 1892, also was lost.

Collision with icebergs caused the loss of two vessels in the same day, April 19, when the brigantine Berling and the bark Guillaume Tell, both French vessels, went down. Their crews, like many others, escaped to their vessels.

The brigantine Agonaisse and the bark Simone, from Greenville and St. Malo, France, respectively, were crushed under the bows of transatlantic liners while anchored on the Banks. Several men were killed aboard each. An unknown steamship sent the Agonaisse to the bottom May 22. The French liner Lorraine drove her great how into the Simone in July.

A storm which swept the North Atlantic on Aug. 19 and 20, causing great loss of vessels on the coasts of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, with some loss of life, caused the sinking of three vessels of the St. Pierre fleet. The tug boat Progress sank off Cape Pine, and the schr. Madonna struck on the St. Pierre coast and sank.

Fire forced a hasty abandonment of the schr. Terre Neuve, and she sank May 5.

The four other vessels which went down, some with parts of their crews, were the schooner Denise, July 10; the Mirande, July 20, and the Leon Emille, Aug. 12, of the St. Pierre fleet, and the Bretonne, Aug. 2, of the vessels from Granville, France.

Mongolian Here.

The R. M. S. Mongolian, Capt. Peters, from Halifax, reached port at 3 a.m. yesterday, making the run in two days in favorable weather. The passengers for this port were Dr. Tait, Miss Radford, Miss Goldstone, Mrs. M. W. Furlong and three children. The ship brought 300 tons of cargo and will leave to-night for Glasgow.

At 11.15 yesterday morning the s.s. Stella Maris arrived here from Labrador, having completed the mail and passenger service on that coast for the season. The ship brought up about 30 passengers, who were landed at Wesleyville, Carbonar, Brigus and St. John's. The fishery on the northern part of the Labrador is over and there were no schooners below Nain when she came up. There are about half a dozen vessels still on the upper part of the coast loading dry fish for market—one at Black Island for McRae; one for Jerrett at Indian Harbor, and one for Hiscoc at Holton.

The Newfoundland Highlanders paraded yesterday morning and attended service at the Kirk where Rev. J. Sutherland preached an eloquent and helpful sermon. Although the weather was not favourable, the turnout was quite large. The route of the procession from the Armoury was around Rawlins' Cross and along Queen's Road.

Schooner Lost.

Word was received through the marconi system from Battle Harbor Saturday night by Mr. Piccott, Minister of Fisheries, that the schooner, Kersey, of Burin, was wrecked and asking to have the crew brought home in the s.s. Solway. The Kersey belongs to Hollett, of Burin, and was banking off the Labrador coast. Bowring Bros. also received a message saying that the schooner was leaking badly and could not be refloated without the help of a tug. She is insured in the M. M. Co. for \$1,800.

Bad Season at Miquelon Quebec Planning Big Reception.

Fifty-Eight Men and Fifteen Vessels Lost.

St. Pierre, Miqu., Oct. 1.—This has been a season of ill-fortune with the fishermen of Miquelon and those who come from France to make St. Pierre the headquarters for the Grand Bank fisheries.

Fifteen vessels have been lost with full or partial cargoes, and 58 fishermen were drowned with these or from other vessels.

With the large number of vessels of the fleet which have escaped without accident the season has still been far from a successful one, despite the fact that fish bring a price nearly one-third higher than last year. The catch this season has averaged 40 per cent. less than that of last year.

Will Spend \$3,000 on Banquet

For Ecumenical Conference Delegates—Some Class to This.

Extensive preparations are being made for the complimentary dinner to be tendered by the Toronto Methodist Social Union on October 13th to the delegates attending the Ecumenical Conference. Eight hundred persons will sit around the tables in Massey Hall, including in addition to the five hundred delegates, representative Methodists of the city, while the galleries will be occupied by the ladies accompanying the delegates who are not delegates themselves.

The chief guests will be accommodated at a crescent-shaped table on the platform and on a slightly raised position behind them will be the officiating, so that about 80 will be seated on the platform.

To the front, on the ground floor, will be three circular tables, one for eight persons and the others for seven each. The other tables will be ranged in convenient position, and graded in height. About 300 will be spent on floral and other decorations of the hall and the cost of the banquet will be about \$2,500 or \$3,000.
