



LORD KITCHENEN'S SPEECH.

LONDON, Jan. 6. War Secretary Kitchener seized the occasion this afternoon at the meeting of the House of Lords to inform the Nation of the progress of the war and of the military exigencies permitted. The House of Lords had assembled for a brief session.

Addressing it, Kitchener said:
During the month of December the
Allied forces made progress at various points but the tide of battle ebbed and flowed with varying success.
In spite of unfavorable weather, the
French army made noteworthy progress to the east of Rheims and in
Southern Alsace. Notwithstanding Addressing it. Kitchener said: the transfer of German troops to the eastern theatre of war, they left sufficient strength to hold their trenches

German aspirations in Poland had suffered a severe check, and it is evident they realized the infinite difficulty of winter operations in Russia. One of the brightest spots in military operations during December, has been the extraordinary achievements of the gallant Serbian Army.

Dropped from an average flying height, one of these will hit its man with a driving force of 100 lbs. It will go clean through a rider and his horse. The airmen carry several thousand on each flight. An airman was recently mentioned in despatches for the skil and daring with which he used hi

bombs and arrows. (2) The quick-firing air gun. This s carried in many of the French monoplanes. Two have been mounted on biplanes in order to command the whole field of flight. They have accounted for many of the enemy's machines.

(3) The shell pistol, reserved for shot from one of these will put a Zeppelin out of action. (4) The dynamite bomb. This



### Sir Conon Doyle Predicted Raid.

Suggested That Britain Might be Starved Into Submission by Sub-

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was the first man to suggest that Great Britain might be starved into submission by destroying her mercantile fleet and keeping foodstuffs out of the country. He wrote last spring a short story called "Danger" which was published in Collier's Weekly on August 22 and 29. In a box with the story was this

statement: "This remarkable story was finished by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle before his last visit to America. He wrote it as a last anxious warning to England before she embarked upon another war. And the war has come sooner

than ever he feared." Sir John Sirius, the hero, belonged to the navy of one of the smallest Powers of Europe. A dispute had arisen between this Power and Britain over a colonial frontier and an ultimatum had been sent to the small nation. The king and his ministers were in favor of surrender, but Capt. Sirius protested and said: "I will stake my life that if you follow my advice within a month or six weeks we will

bring proud England to her knees." The King became interested. He asked his admiral how many vessels there were in the fleet and learned there were two battleships, four cruisers, twenty torpedo boat destroyers and eight submarines.

Sirius explained his plans. "Gather the fleet." he said, "under the forts of the Blankenburg where they will be protected from attack by booms and piles. They can stay there till the war is over. The eight submarines

you may leave in my charge." The English were defied and the submarines, named for the first eight letters of the Greek alphabet, took on supplies and went to sea. The English fleet blockaded Blankenberg. Sirius took the Iota, and the next morning was off the coast of Norfolk, and later stood guard between the Mapsin Sands and the Nore. A merchantman, the Adele, of 15,000 tons, was sighted loaded with frozen mutton from New Zealand. That day six British food ships aggregating 50,000 tons were sent to the bottom. The other submarines attacked vessels off Southampton, Bristol, Liverpool and

# Cotton Cargoes for Germans.

The Hague, Dec. 30.—The American steamer A. A. Raven, which arrived at Rotterdam, December 24, from Wilmington, N.C., with 6,600 bales of cotton, was the first vessel since the outbreak of the war to reach a Dutch port with a cotton consignment for

> Germany. The steamer was held up in the English Channel by British warships for an examination of her papers. which delayed her 24 hours

The freight charges for the Raven's cargo was \$10 per bale, which is five times the normal rate. This increase was due to the great war risks attending imports destined for Germany. It was stated here to-day by an American agent that the alarmist reports concerning the dangers of navigation in the North Sea might have a tendency to drive the rates still higher.

Since the war started the German imports of cotton are said to have amounted to fifty thousand bales, most of it going by way of Gothenburg, Sweden, to which port sixteen vessels are now steaming. They are due to reach Gothenburg inside of two weeks. Their cargoes aggregate about 75,000 bales.

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
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
