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





Victim of Lightning

NOW IN HOSPITAL.

ing with fresh meat, milk and butter-FRESH MEAT.

We find that the business of purying fresh meat to the City, as arried on by the local butchers at the present time, calls for the import from Prince Edward Island. Toronto, and other Canadian centres of about three-fourths of the annual upply, the remainder being obtained cally. The trade is mainly in animals weighing about an average of 300 lbs. on the hoof, and which yield, when killed, about 400 lbs. of dressed

We find that during the winter onths, when the frost permits of resh meat being brought here by rail nearly every day, it can be imported into St. John's for, at the most, 20c. per lb. and at times for 18c. Taking d-quarters with fore-quarters, 400 bs. of dressed meat costing \$80 and representing an animal, will yield cording to the evidence: 80 lbs. Steak at 40c. lb. \$ 32.00

140 lbs. Choice cuts at 30c. .. 42.00 180 lbs. Stewing meat at 25c.

.. .. ., \$119.00 This is equal to about 30c. a lb. as e average return, or about 49 per cent. on the cost to the butcher. When the meat is imported for less than 20c. which is mostly the case, the profit is of course larger, and furthermore, ome butchers charge prices in excess

of the above.
Similar, if not larger margins, are obtained by butchers through the sale of locally-raised animals during the spring and summer months, for the highest price that we can find to have yet been paid by butchers in the City is 17c. a lb. for local dead meat; and in the sale of such no reduction is made in the prices charged to the consumer. We find that in the sumner months when live cattle have to be imported, the cost of the dressed neat runs from about 26 to 30 cents a lb. and may be averaged at 28c. or at about \$112 for the 400 lbs. of dress ed meat representing an ox weighing 800 lbs. on the hoof. MILK. We find with regard to the supply of milk to the city by the farmers ing in the suburbs that it is not charged for at an excessive rate. The orice of feed has advanced steadily, and the present prices for milk are not unduly high, provided that the milk is not adulterated or skimmed so as to secure the cream for sale apart from the milk itself, and provided also that the cattle get a proper proportion of hand feed or milkproducing feeds; on which point owever, there is some difference of pinion. We have reason to believe that the practice of skimming the milk exists to some extent, and while it may not come within the scope of our investigation, we take the liberty recommending that steps be se on foot by the authorities proper standrads for milk fixed by regulations under existing legislation and tests made from time to time which would determine if such regulations were being lived up to.




