"Mistakes" Taking Human Toll.

"By mistake" a signal repair "man on the New York Central threw a wrong switch near the Erie, Pa., depot, and in the sideswiping of one passenger train by another twelve passengers were killed and twenty-two hurt. "By mistake" a switch on the Norfolk & Western, near Roanoke, Va., was left open, and the collision following killed three trainmen and injured five others. Are these mistakes due to green men or to lack of efficiency on the part of trained railroaders? The establishment of this fact would not bring the dead to life or ease the suffering of the injured, but it might be the means of preventing other errors, nearly always costly in any line of business, but especially so in operation of railroad trains -Syracuse Journal.







Ware Gasolene.

Gasolene fumes came 'in contact with a lighted lantern. Ten buildings destroyed; loss, \$250,000. Gasolene is dangerous. It is one of the most rapily volatilizing fluids. One pint of gasolene will impregnate 200 feet of air and make it explosive. Many serious fires have been started from the careless use of gasolene. Gasolene should only be used in the open air, and clothes, after been cleaned with it, should be hung outside to allow it to evaporate. It should always be kept in tightely closed metal cans, never in glass bottles or jars. The latter are liable to breakage and the consequent freeing of the dangerous fumes when open flames may ignite them and cause a serious fire.



XIX.), and with the approval of the Governor-in-Council, the Board of Governors of the St. John's Hospital hereby give notice that they have fixed and prograting that they have fixed and prescribed the following scale of fees to be levied from and paid by all persons who oc-cupy beds or undergo treatment at the Hospital. The scale is to come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1921.

SCALE OF FEES. Every person receiving treatment in the General Hospital shall, after December 31st next, pay fees according to the following scale:

Persons admitted to the public

wards \$1.00 per day; persons occupying private rooms \$10.00 per week, in addition to the daily fees of \$1.00. Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring with him or forvard to the Superintendent of the Hospital certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital

treatment.
Under the provisions of the General Under the provisions of the General Hospital Act, 1915, all patients who are unable to pay fees shall be required to bring with them a certificate of their inability to pay, which shall be signed by the resident Relieving Officer, or where there is no such officers or where there is no such officers or where there is no such officers of the Person of cer, by a Justice of the Peace, or Clergyman or other responsible person. The fees of such patients thereupon become payable by the Commissioner of Public Charity by virtue of

the said Act.
